

Editor's Note: The following list of germination periods for garden flowers was given to the Garden club by Mr. O. H. Palm of El Paso who spoke before the club last week. Because of its general interest it is reprinted here. The advice on planting bulbs, also given by him, was prepared for The Reporter-Telegram by a member of the Garden club,

ence for the planting of seed.

PLANTING FALL BULBS

Bulbs that bloom in the early spring should not be planted until late in the fall. They are essentially cool weather plants and for this reason they should be planted on the north side of a home to advantage. If top size bulbs are purchased and given good drainage they are sure to reward the grower with beautiful flowers.

The narcissus bulbs thrive in cool weather just as well as the tulips and hyacinths. Some members of the bulb family, like paper whites, which grow in water must be grown in cool locations and should never be put near a stove or a sunny win-

dow.

Chinese lilies, like paper whites, must be grown cold. These two bulbs can be grown in water that freezes mildly during the night.

Tulips and hyacinths should not be planted in warm ground. Wait until a heavy frost falls before planting and put underneath the bulbs at least an inch of coarse sand for drainage. Cover these bulbs with at least 6 inches of soil. They should be kept moist at all times as soon as the flower stalk appears.

Good garden soil will grow all bulbs to perfection.
The only safe fertilizer to use with bulbs is bone meal. This should be applied in small quantities after covering the bulbs with 2 or 3 inches of soil. After applying the bone meal, the additional 2 or 4 inches of soil is put on top of the bone meal. This method keeps the bone meal at least 2 inches removed from the bulb.
