
Gist Sells Cattle To New Mexico Men

UN-AMERICAN DISTINCTION

An Italian woman living in New York and working at the somewhat humble trade of dress finisher was hurt in an accident on an elevated railway some little time ago. She sued for damages and was awarded \$10,000. The railroad appealed the case, with the rather surprising argument that this sum was out of all proportion for a woman in her "social class".

The appellate court has finally passed on this appeal, and—naturally enough—has tossed it out of court. Its opinion remarks caustically that "medical science has never demonstrated that persons of alleged inferior social position suffer any less from injuries than those of putative or assumed social superiority."




