## AMBULANCE UNIT WIPED OUT BY AN ITALIAN AIR RAID

### 9 Swedish Troops in Body Slaughtered By Bombs

### ITALIANS MOVE Soldiers on Northern Front Preparing For Battle

Ethiopian officers on the southern front today reported that Italian aerial bombs had slaughtered a Swedish-Ethiopian ambulance unit of 32.  
Ras Desta Dementu, Solasie's brother-in-law, wirelessed Addis Ababa that the Swedish troops and 23 Ethiopians had died under a bombardment near Dolo.  
To the north, Italian invaders moved up reinforcements, anticipating the long campaign. Italian new year's day celebrations at home and abroad were narrowly restricted, but soldiers were given extra wine, cognac, and special rations.

## VIOLENCE FLARES AGAIN IN CAIRO

CAIRO, Dec. 31. (AP)—New violence flared here today with the opening of the International Surgical congress. Two British officers escorting Premier Nessim Pasha's automobile were roughly handled by a crowd yelling "Down with England, Egypt for Egyptians."  
The Egyptian minister of justice was manhandled and the premier was prevented reaching the meeting hall by students who rushed his car.

## GANDHI EASES PARTY TENSION

### Recommends Nehru Be Made President of National Congress Party

BOMBAY, India, (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi has recommended that his former arch-rival, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, be elected as next president of the Indian National Congress Party, it is reliably reported here. The election will take place at a forthcoming session of the Congress Party, to be held either at Lucknow or Madras on a date as yet undecided.  
This coalition of Gandhi and Nehru assumes a unified front in the policy to be adopted by the Congress Party in its opposition to the new Constitution, observers believe.  
Nehru, in a recent issue of the Bombay Chronicle, defined this Congress policy. He believes that the great agrarian problem can be met only by Agrarian Socialism and that the National solution is in no way sufficiently forceful.  
He further contends that only a basic and fundamental change in the direction of collection and redistribution of land revenue, and he points out strongly that petty efforts at reform are doomed to failure. To him the Government of India Act is a disaster.  
Feeling it is reported, that the masses must be aroused, Congress leaders have begun a systematic tour of interior districts and remote villages. This is a departure from the regular procedure of confining activity to the cities and big urban towns.

Babu Rajendra Prasad, one of the Congress leaders, recently made a tour of South India, in which he visited all 14 districts of the area and addressed more than a hundred meetings. His audiences sometimes numbering as high as 10,000.  
Another leader of the party has issued a statement declaring that the Congress will seek a verdict from the electors to generate pressure through the legislatures to get the present unwanted constitution replaced at the earliest possible moment by an agreed constitution.  
Observers believe this statement to mean that Congress will attempt to wreck the provincial legislatures so that even before an All-India Federation is set up the units of such a Federation would have collapsed.  
There is a rumor current here that what the Congress Party wants in place of the new government provided in the Government of India Act is a state similar to that of Ireland under de Valera. Certain it is that the Party's opposition to the new government is as strong and well organized as ever, experts believe.

## Fire Destroys 3 Stores At Ackerly

ACKERLY, Dec. 31.—The worst fire in the history of this county since the town Monday morning destroyed three buildings and caused damage estimated conservatively at \$1,000. None of the loss was covered by insurance.  
Starting from a gas stove explosion at 10:30 a. m. flames razed the filling station and grocery store operated by W. S. Morrow and spread quickly to the Jones and Big Spring grocery store and the Tom Snow meat market.  
Fighting valiantly with buckets and garden hose, Ackerly residents prevented the blaze from spreading to the Coleman hotel, which, had it caught, would have meant the destruction of practically every structure on the west side of the business district.  
J. W. Coleman, manager of the hotel, estimated \$300 damage occurred to the roofter, two-story building which also houses the Majestic theatre.  
Joel Brittain, who with W. N. Jones owned the grocery store next to the Morrow station, was overcome by smoke as he attempted to move part of the stock out.  
Calls were made on the Big Spring and Lamesa fire departments, but neither sent trucks because there was no source of water supply to feed pumps.  
Feeling it is explained that they would have rushed to the scene if they could have secured water.  
One hundred gallons of lubricating oil in the Morrow station kept exploding intermittently throughout the morning and caused the ruins to flare at intervals during the afternoon.  
Extra equipment for the Sparrenburg (Dawson county) school went up in flames which consumed the garage building. No estimate of the loss on the school supplies could be had.  
Two cars were saved from the garage but checks and cash amounting to \$260 were burned. A safe was salvaged from the smouldering ruins early in the afternoon.  
While most of the Jones and Brittain stock was saved, expensive equipment and fixtures went up in flames.  
Loss to the garage was estimated at \$5,000 and the grocery store \$1,000.  
While flames licked at the Coleman hotel, the telephone exchange was operated steadily on different circuits as fire filled one line. Several people took turns operating the board and fighting the fire.  
Morrow saved his wife from possible serious injury or death when she attempted to rush back into the burning apartment above the filling station.

## HAUPTMANN SAID TO RUN SWAB ON GULF 1 WADDELL

### Shows Nervousness as Negro Fellow Inmate Led To Chair

TRENTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—Bruno Hauptmann's counsel said today in Gulf No. 1 Waddell, much discussed Crane county deep discovery, and results should prove interesting since this will be the first test made since the well was shot over a week ago. When last reported the cleaning-out job was nearly finished, depth of 5975 feet having been reached. Fluid in the hole is within 250 feet of the top, but of this, the 220 barrels of oil used as cleaning-out fluid must be discounted. Prior to the shot, the best production made by the No. 1 Waddell was 197 barrels of oil swabbed from it in eight hours. The well received a shot of 440 quarts from 6186 to 6300 feet, but failed to clean itself out. For the past week results of the shot has been delayed while the bridge was being loosened and the hole cleaned out. The Gulf prospect is producing from the Simpson, upper Ordovician, and has opened the Tubbs area of Crane county to more deep exploration. It is in section 4, block B-27, public school land.  
According to reports, the fishing job in the Ector county test, Crafton Oil Co. No. 1 E. P. Cowden, has been cleaned up and 8 1/4 inch pipe has been run. The well had drilled down to 2975 feet when it was delayed by losing the cable and tools. Location is in section 19, block 43, township 2 south.  
Rapid progress is being made in Wahlemaier, York & Harper No. 1 Ed Jones, Gaines county test and one of the most closely watched wildcat wells in this area. Since held up by gas encountered in the Yates sand section, it has been drilling ahead without incident and is now being 3720 feet in length. An air pocket caused slight caving when run into at 3490 feet, but no time was lost. The well is northwest of Seminole in section 414, block G, C. C. S. D. & R. G. N. G. survey.

## Christmas Seal Fund Receives More Cash

He pointed out that a recent delivery of mail to the Tuberculosis Association contained letters from two contributors each of whom sent a check for \$4.00. Each donor wrote that last year's seals had been missed and forgotten until the current seals arrived and he remembered that he had not paid for the ones received in 1934.

## Lindbergh Family Reaches England

LONDON, Dec. 31. (AP)—The Lindbergh family, declared by members of the ship crew to have left the United States for the execution of Bruno Hauptmann, landed here today and went into seclusion in a hotel downtown.  
The family was met by a producer gangplank and went directly to a hotel escorted by a carload of detectives.  
Ship employees reported that Lindbergh once said, "We are not going to Paris; we are staying in England." Whether or not he meant permanently was unlearned.  
The party was swept through the lobby without registering and went to their rooms, the numbers of which are being kept secret.  
Some of the crew understood that Lindbergh had a plane ready at an undisclosed airport until last night, when the orders were canceled. Ship line officials said that Lindbergh had indicated that he would not consent to an interview, but his elimination when his Morgan, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Lindbergh, said that the family will be guests in the Morgan home near Cardiff, Wales, for "some time."

## SUBSTITUTE FOR AAA PROPOSED TO END ACREAGE ADJUSTMENTS

### Master of Kansas Grange Offers Farmers Of Country 7-Point Program

LIBERAL, Kans., Dec. 31. (AP)—C. C. Cogswell, master of the Kansas State Grange, has formulated a seven-point program which is being studied widely by prominent farm leaders of the Middle West.  
Cogswell's farm program was planned by him and is being criticized by the Agricultural Adjustment Act, and "so many people who do not believe the AAA has anything to offer in the future."  
His seven-point program and accompanying comment follows:  
1. Prohibit the production of any basic commodity by a producer who is already receiving government checks for reduction of one basic commodity. This would prevent "chiselers" by the farmers who are already receiving government checks for reduction of one basic commodity. The southern cotton planter paid to decrease his output could not plant corn or potatoes on his idle acres and the wheat producer could not plant corn.  
2. Make all adjustments of production on a quantity basis over a seven-year period rather than acreage, thus permitting the farmer to make amends if the weather causes a poor crop. Thus, a bad crop one year would permit him to increase production next year and he would not have to depend entirely on reduction checks.  
3. Basis all benefit payments on a quantity basis rather than acreage. This would encourage quality production and pay based on bushels of grain produced. Such surplus not to compete in any way with the protected portion and to be sealed and held there for the use of the government. This would make the processing tax or whatever method of obtaining a protected price for the home-consumed products function in the same manner that the tariff now protects industry. It would increase the opportunity for employment of farm labor and production by allowing those who wish to compete with the world on their export products to do so on reasonable limits. This would make the farmer's protection equal to that of other industries.  
4. Provide for adjustments of production and benefits in advance of planting time of the crop to which they apply. This would eliminate the necessity of preparation in seeding of crops which might later prove to be outside compliance.  
5. Create a crop insurance feature to insure the thrifty farmer sufficient revenue to recompense him for his labor and seed and prevent his elimination when his crop failed through no fault of his. This could be done by taking a certain percentage of all the surplus produced in any year over that entitled to receive benefits. The percentage over the allotted acreage or production should not be more than sufficient to recompense the farmer for his seed and labor in planting. The percentage surplus could be turned into revenue and placed in a bank for withdrawal if the crop fails. A farm organization could act as agent.  
6. Build the entire program around and for the benefit of the family sized farm to eliminate advantages now given large operators and landholders.  
7. Presenting his program, Cogswell said, that certain conditions and developments might necessitate certain additional alterations in the program.

"I don't propose it as an inflexible farm program," he said, "but I do believe that it will remove certain inconsistencies in the AAA."  
Cogswell declared the AAA had served admirably as "an emergency program" but that drastic changes are necessary if it is to be long time practical and economically sound program.  
"The farmers themselves must learn to take over and control the machinery of reduction and adjustment. There is no justification for continuance of a program which increases the dependence of agricultural products. The injustice of the hog slaughter and destruction of grain were not made the fault of the AAA itself as the administration."  
Cogswell also criticized the continuance of farm loans to farmers charging the farmers are rapidly becoming subsidized by the government.  
"Loans are vital and necessary in time of emergency but the present is such that farmers are being subsidized and the never-do-wells are kept on farms at the expense of taxpayers which includes the farmer who has to work hard and doesn't get a loan. It is time that someone drew a sharp line between subsidization and sound business loans."

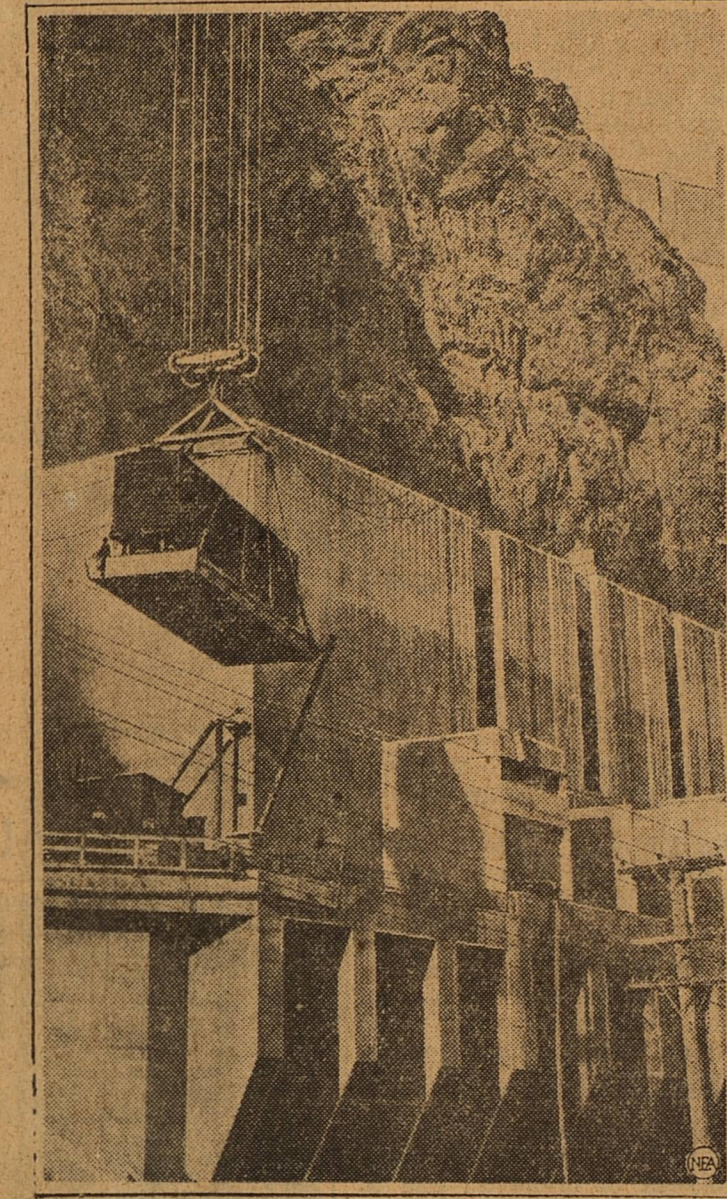
## NEW HIGHWAY FOR MIDLAND COUNTY

## 200 SUPPORTERS OF COWBOYS STAY HERE FOR 1 HOUR

### On Way to Sun Bowl Game in El Paso Wednesday

### BAND PARADES Colorful Street Show Is Staged by Band

The Abilene Reporter-News special train, bearing the Hardin-Simmons university football team and more than 200 supporters, left the team spent one hour here today at lunch time as a break in their trip to El Paso where the Hardin-Simmons Cowboys will tangle with the New Mexico Aggies in the annual Sun Bowl game.  
Led by the famed Cowboy band and pep squad, the Abilene delegation paraded through the streets of Midland immediately after leaving their train, before going to cafes for lunch.  
It was a noisy pleasure-bent crowd of supporters, each one supremely confident that the team would take the measure of the Aggies when the clubs clash tomorrow afternoon. All were willing to make wagers on their club, either giving points of odds.  
Coach Frank Kimbrough, formerly a member of the Midland Colts, a semi-professional baseball team here, was accompanied by 22 members of his squad, all of them in good physical shape and ready for the game.  
Eighty-two-year-old John Hardin of Abilene, whose liberal gifts to the former Simmons university changed its name to Hardin-Simmons, accompanied the Cowboys when they traveling 600 miles from his home to El Paso to see them "whip the New Mexico Aggies."

In company with Dr. J. D. Sandefor, president of the institution, he was enjoying the good fellowship of the special train crowd also the opportunity to make new friends at points where the train stopped.  
Gilbert H. Sandefor, manager of the famous Cowboy Band, was in charge of arrangements for the big party. Even while looking after details of feeding the team and the band, he found time to "talk up" other attractions coming to Abilene this season under auspices of the band.  
Johnny Reagan, famous trick rope artist and internationally known entertainer of the Cowboy Band, led the organization and the pep squad as they paraded through the Midland streets. The circus native of Australia "put the power" into the quick stepping, high heeled boot musicians as they paraded.  
Judge C. C. Stinson, Mrs. Bernard Hanks and many prominent Abileneans visited friends during the brief stop here.

Kimrough's starting lineup, except at right end and right tackle, is the same which started against Texas Tech in the season opened Sept. 20, and except at the end slot, is the same which began most of the other eight games of the regular season. 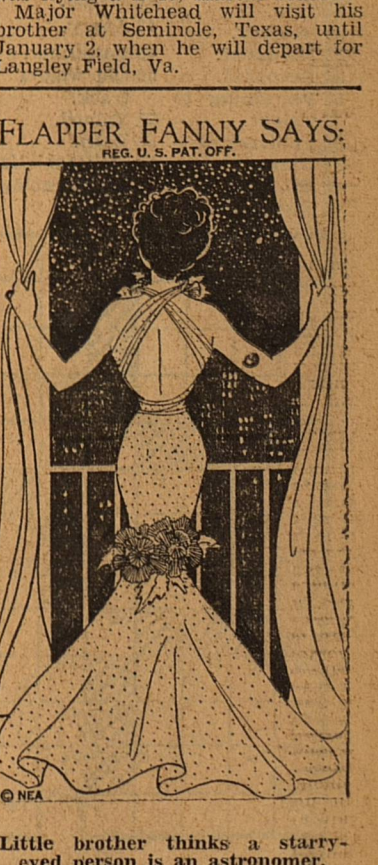
## PILOT VISITS BROTHER

## Take 1700 Teachers From Relief Program

SAN ANTONIO—Seeking to extend educational privileges to 100,000 adults in Texas, Works Progress Administration officials today had enrolled 1,700 teachers in the Texas Relief Commission program which was closed December 26.  
We intend to employ 2,500 teachers on the WPA emergency education program and are hopeful that all sponsors will have all teacher applicants registered with the National Relief Commission as quickly as possible," declared A. A. (Pat) Bullock, state director of the education project.  
Previously operated by the Texas Relief Commission, the Texas education program gave employment to 2,000 teachers and extended educational advantages to 34,000 persons. It was estimated, under WPA the project will be financed by grants of \$1,865,650 for general adult education and \$94,450 for nursery school projects.  
In addition to the extending of free school facilities to thousands of Texans, this project is proposed for the purpose of providing work for teachers and persons competent to teach who were receiving relief during May, 1935, and those certified for relief subsequent to that date and whose eligibility has not been cancelled by the Texas Relief Commission. Unemployed relief teachers who were relieved from any time between May 1 and November 1 may be given jobs on the program if all available eligible relief teachers have been employed.  
Types of training which will be considered by project officials are Freshman college centers, general adult education, literacy education, nursery schools, parent education, recreation and leisure time education, vocational training, and workers education.

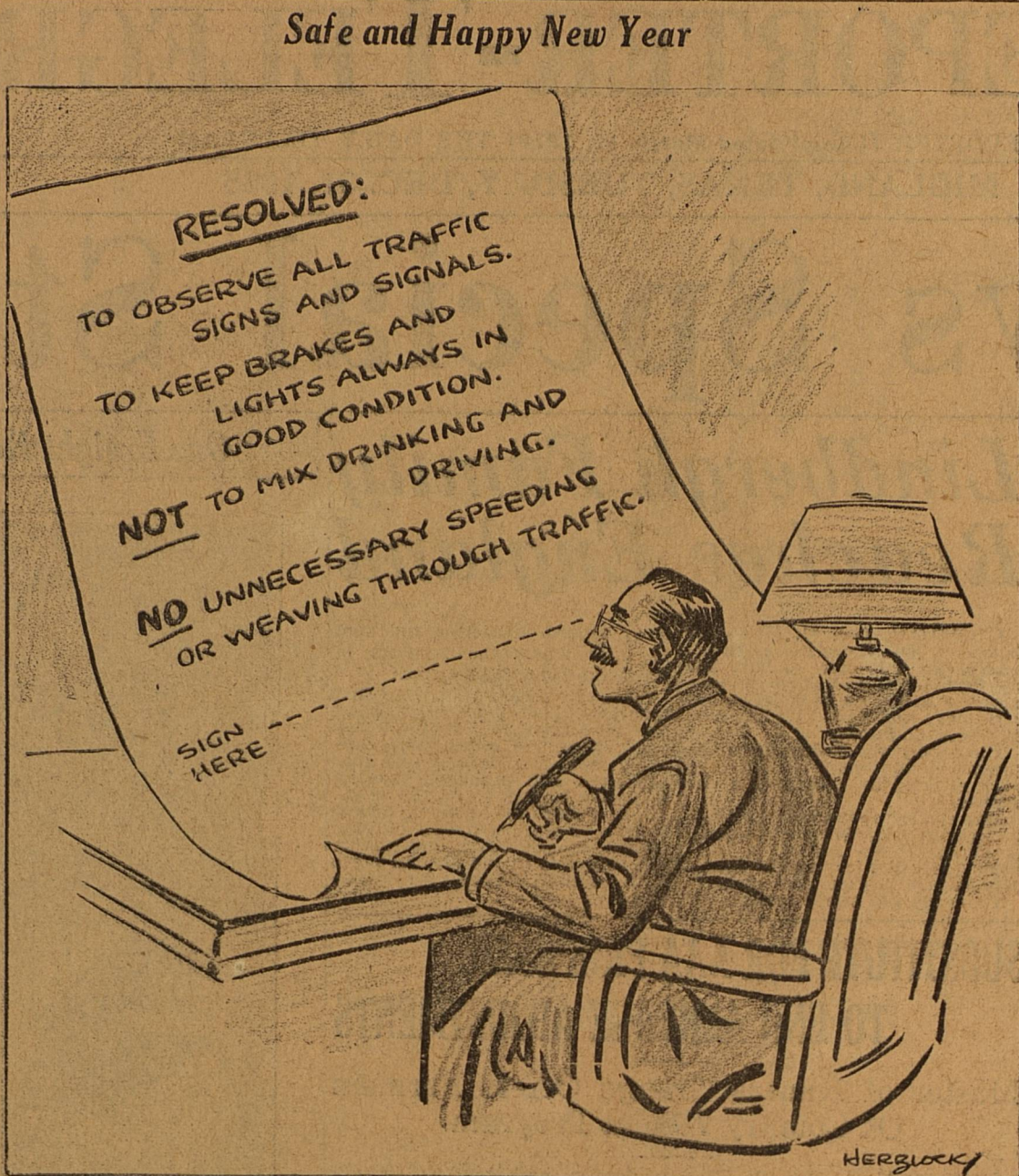

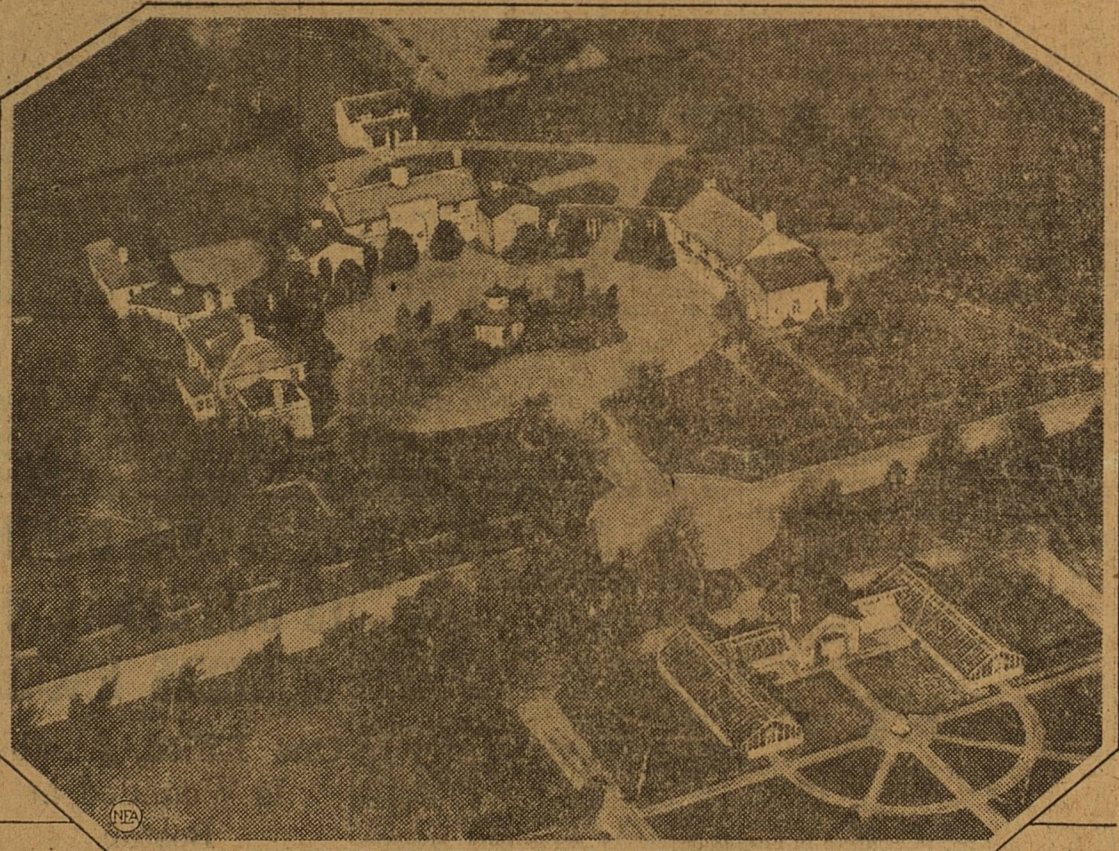

Landscaping Is Striking Feature of Leeds' Estate

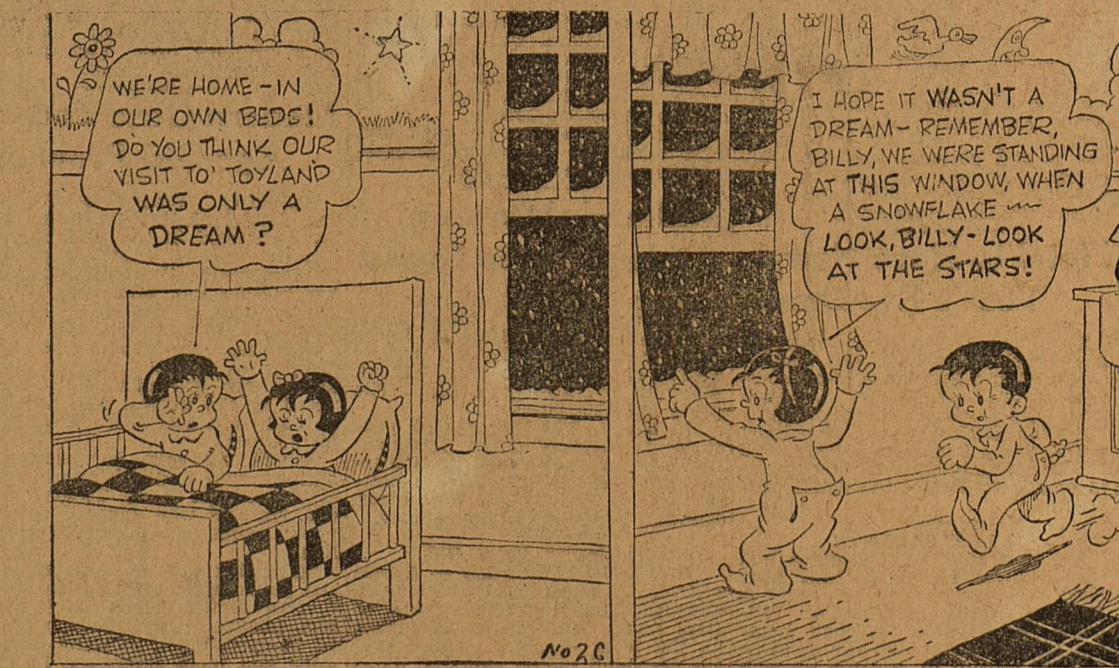

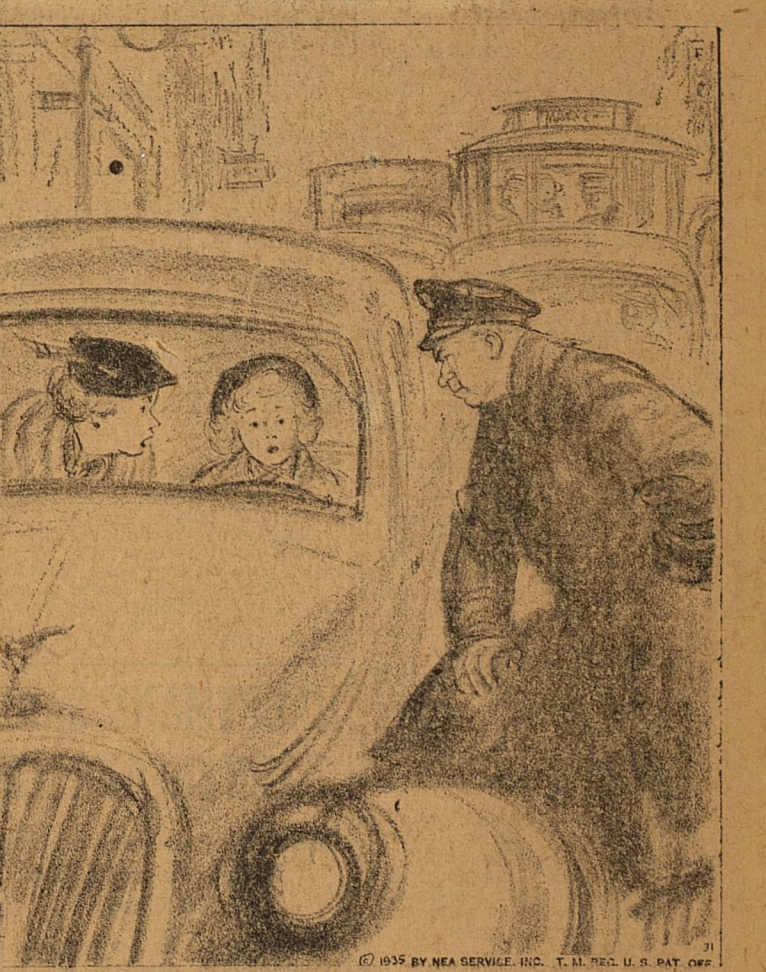

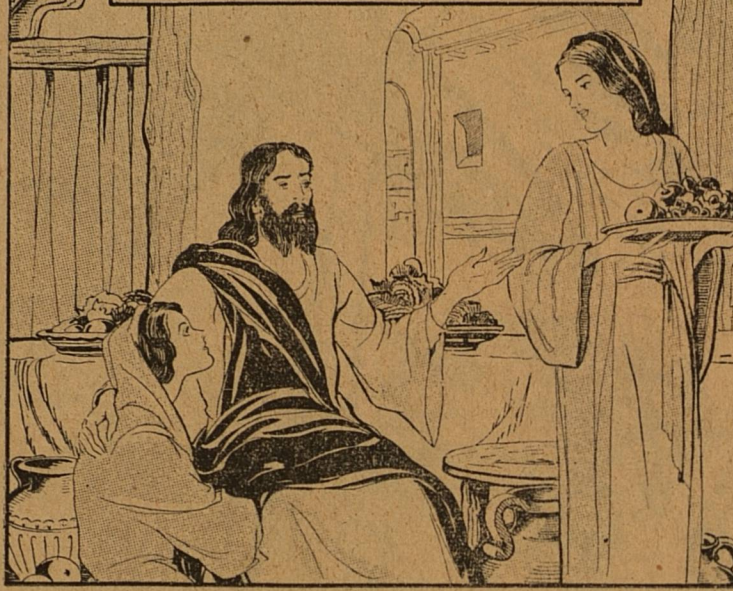

## Serve New Dishes On New Year's Day

New Year's dinner is the perfect time to christen the gifts that home, sweet home, got for Christmas—all the new linen and china and chromium.

You might have all the new things in the market to eat, too—new potatoes, new peas. And if you've learned any new dishes include these, served in the most up-to-date way to greet the New Year.

- New Year Dinner
- Pineapple and Strawberry Cocktail
- Broiled Capon with Chestnut Dressing
- New Potatoes in Parsley Butter
- New Peas
- Hot House Tomatoes Stuffed with Cucumber
- Mint Parfait with Hot Chocolate Sauce
- Salted Nuts
- Coffee
- Bonbons

Use fresh pineapple and strawberries for the cocktail. Arrange the fruit in layers and chill thoroughly before serving. Have the capon split for broiling. Wash thoroughly and dry. Dip in melted butter and fill the inside of each section with chestnut dressing. Broil in a very hot oven in a dripping pan. Arrange halves or quarters, depending on the size of the birds, stuffing side down in a dripping pan. Bake every fifteen minutes while broiling with a mixture of melted butter and boiling water. It will take about an hour to cook the birds.

Stuff the tomatoes with a mixture of chopped cucumber and horseradish in whipped cream. Add lemon juice to make tart if the horseradish doesn't do the trick. Serve the parfait in meringue shells and pour hot chocolate sauce over. If you make your own parfait, color it a delicate green for a fine color combination—green ice cream in white meringue shell with brown chocolate sauce.

Mint Parfait  
One pint whipping cream, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup water, whites 2 eggs, 2 or 3 drops oil of peppermint, few grains salt.

Cook sugar and water to 236 degrees F. and pour in a thin stream over whites of eggs beaten until stiff, beating constantly. Fold into cream whipped until firm and flavor with peppermint. Add a few grains of salt and beat until well blended. Color a delicate green. Turn into freezing tray and freeze without stirring. Or turn into mold and pack in eight parts ice to one part ice cream and let stand four hours. Freeze without stirring.

Chocolate Sauce  
One and one-half cups milk, 3-4 cup sugar, 3 squares baking chocolate, 1 tablespoon cornstarch or arrowroot, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Mix sugar and cornstarch thoroughly. Cut chocolate in small pieces and put in top of double boiler with milk. Heat and stir until chocolate is melted. Add sugar mixture and salt and cook over hot water until thick and smooth. Stir occasionally to keep smooth. Add vanilla and beat well before serving.

## Opinions Differ on Rules of Makeup

On the question of using make-up to enhance your natural coloring or to change it to harmonize with whatever shade you happen to be wearing, cosmetic authorities are divided into two schools of thought. One claims it is ridiculous to buy a dress whose color makes your skin look sallow, then try to find rouge and lipstick in some unusual tone to alleviate the sallow look. Cosmetics in this group tell us to pinch our cheeks while we stand at the cosmetic counter, then to pick rouge to match the shade our cheeks become after the natural color rises. They insist, too, that lipstick must match the tone the lips become after they have been rubbed against each other for several minutes.

They go on to say that one should apply these natural looking articles before she tries on a new color. If, in spite of the rouge and lipstick, the color isn't flattering, it is a waste of money to buy the gown.

The second school, on the other hand, insists that any woman can wear any color under the sun, providing her makeup is right. One member of this group puts out a set containing six lipsticks—one to wear with a blue dress, another to go with a red frock, and so on. Others make powder, rouge and lipstick sets, especially designed to be worn with specific colors.

The problem, in the final analysis, is largely up to the individual, of course. If you are content with cosmetics that dramatize and enhance your natural skin tones and with colors which are flattering any day in the week, side with the first school and be happy. If you insist on picking colors that are troublesome to you personally, why not go over to the second school—temporarily at least—and see just how much makeup can do? It would be fun anyway.

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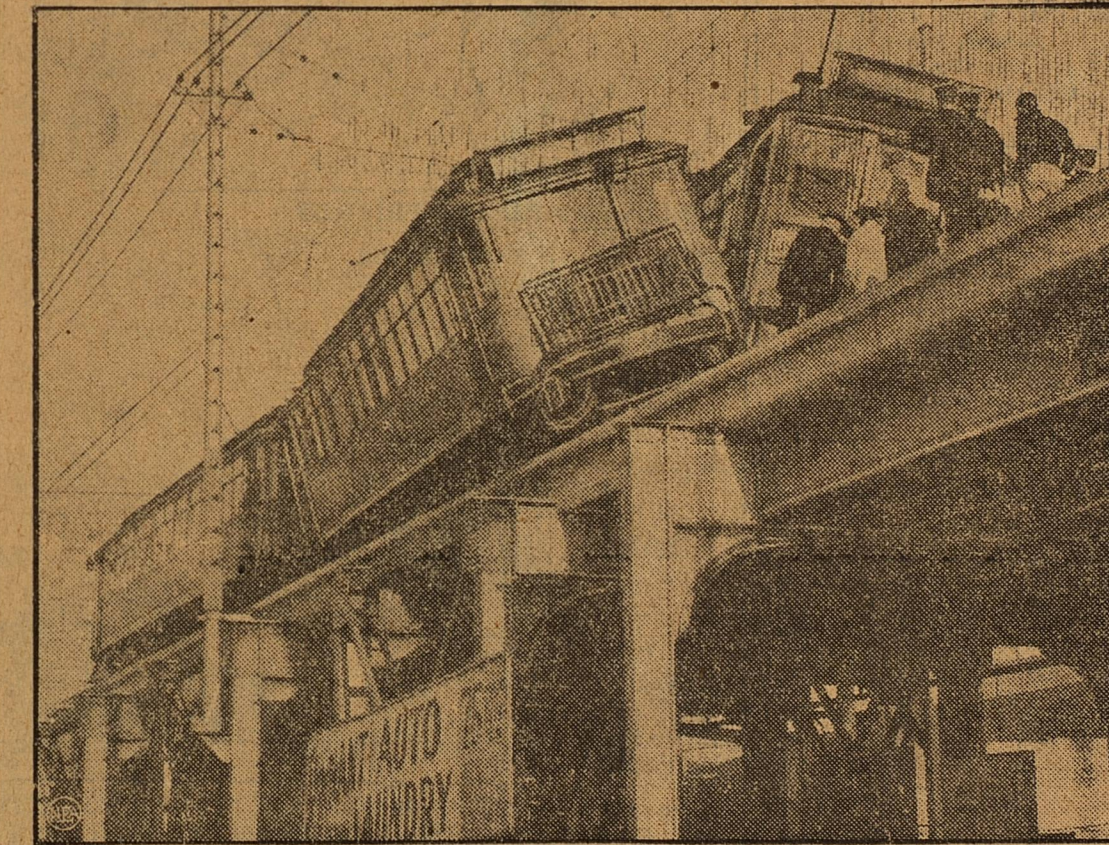
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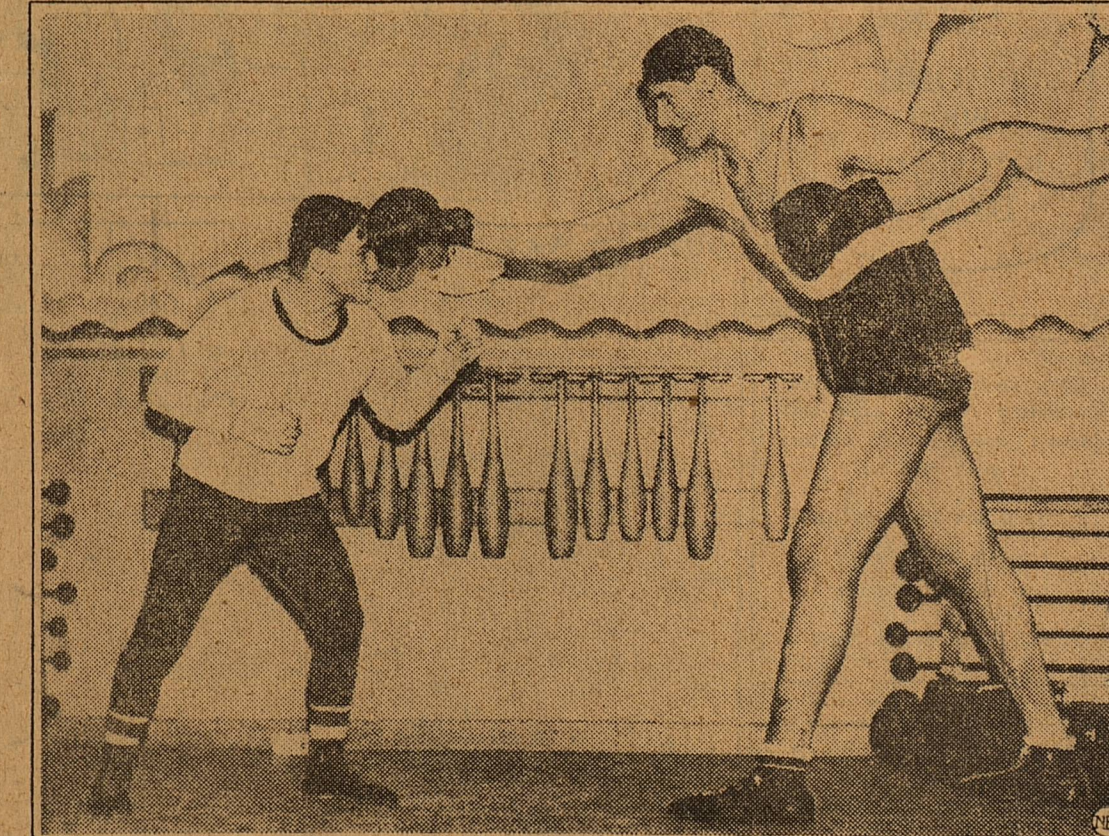
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## 'L' Cars Teeter With Death; Saved by Inches
