Newfoundland Prime Minister Almost Victim of Rioters

BY BIG MOB

15,000 Protest the Blocking of an Investigation

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, April 6. (UP)-Mob rioters ruled St Johns today after storming parliament buildings, wrecking the governor's offices, and assaulting Prime Minister Sir Richard Squires.

The prime minister's life was saved by a Catholic priest who took him to a nearby house where he

escaped through a back door.
Fifteen thousand protested against alleged blocking of a popular demand for an investigation of the government.

The cabinet reported that the governor was ready to resign as soon as he could get in touch with the prime minister.

The rioting was a result of an acute economic situation here and attributed by several prominents to dilatory tactics of the government in dealing with public demands for relief.
