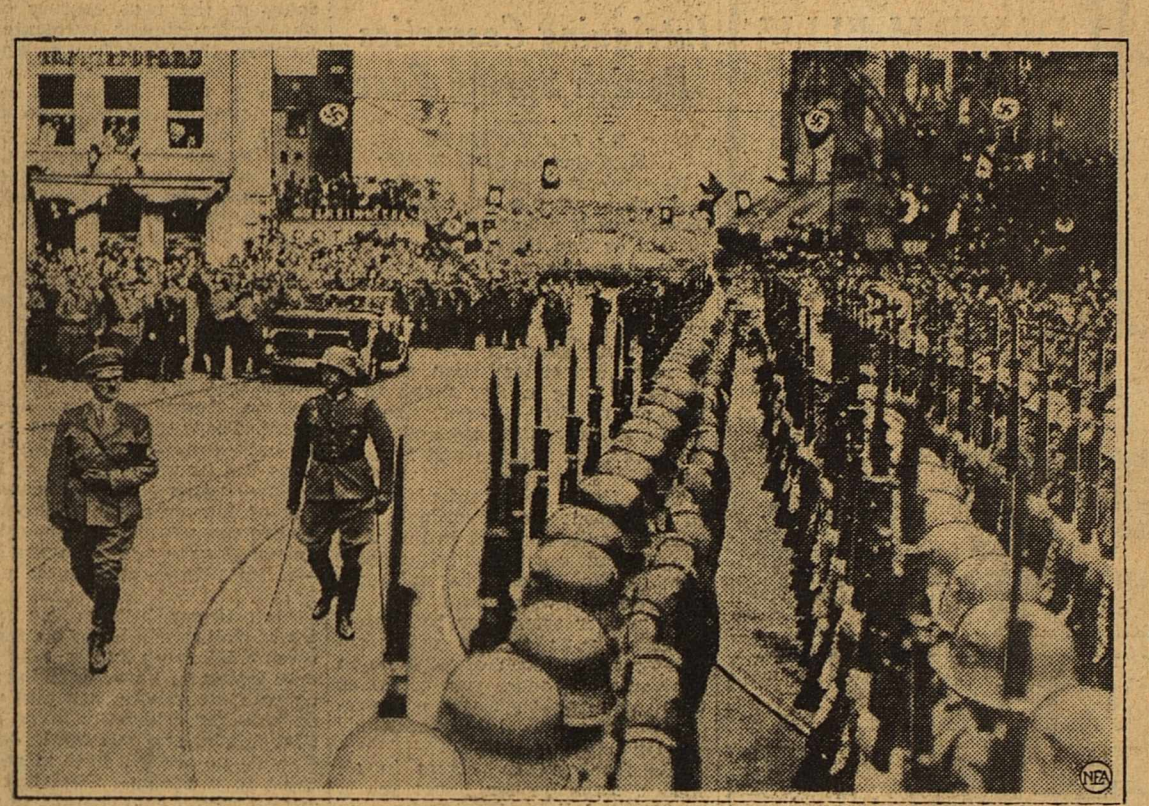

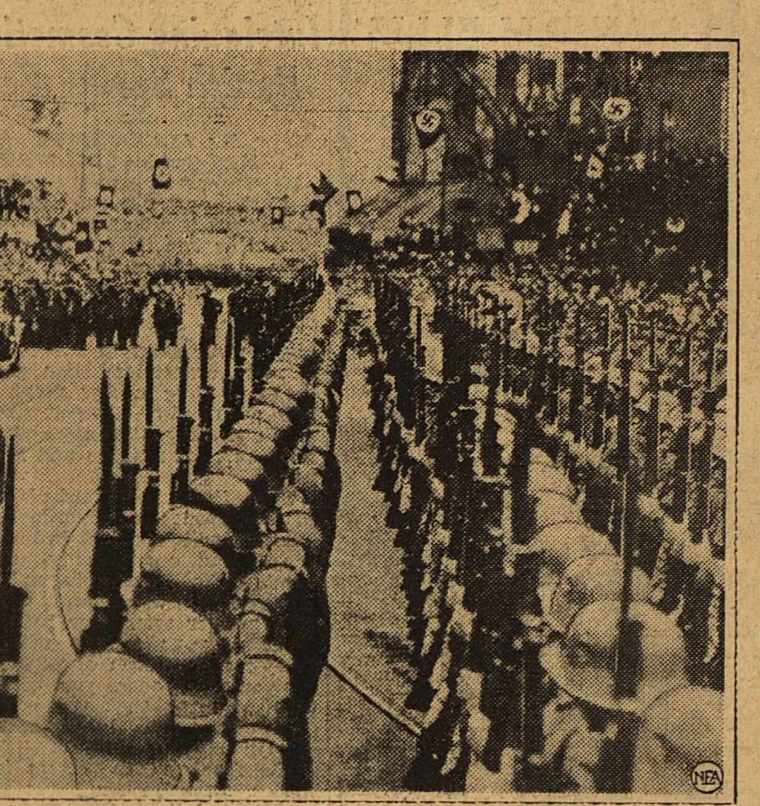

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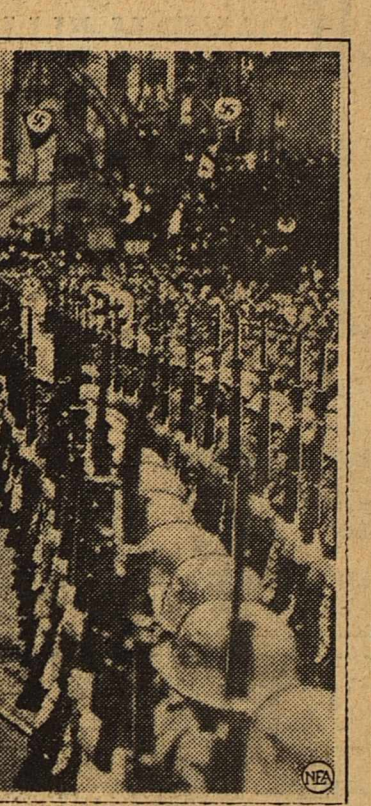

Governors of the five Texas Lions districts, several officials of Lions International and several hundred delegates from over the state will attend.


## Vacuum Sweepers Used In Harvesting

AMARILLO, Texas (AP)—Vacuum sweepers are to double service when Panhandle farmers attempt to harvest their buffalo grass seed this year.  
Seed of the native grass, believed best adapted for sod, is almost impossible to collect because of its tiny dimensions, but the inducement to do so is a growing demand as wheat lands are returned to sod.  
The Kansas State College at Manhattan, Kan., is said to have perfected a seed-gathering device which may contribute to re-grass areas, considered the chief preventive against wind erosion.

"Sec. 2 (e) The term 'sale,' or 'offer for sale' or 'sell' shall include every disposition, or attempt to dispose of a security for value. The term 'sale' means and includes contracts and agreements whereby securities are sold, traded or exchanged for money, property or other thing of value, or any transfer or agreement to transfer, in trust or otherwise."

This subsection contains other provisions that are too lengthy to be quoted in this letter. In order to lawfully engage in the business of selling or offering to sell securities in this state, one must, therefore, qualify as a dealer or salesman. A registered dealer may sell any class of securities that may be lawfully sold in the state of Texas. He is required to fill out certain blanks that have been prepared by the department of state. He must furnish five letters of personal reference and a letter from a bank, testifying as to his character and reputation. The fee is \$35 per calendar year.

ment was pumped in through tubing when the well was plugged back to 3,600 feet after acid injection caused leakage of sulphur water through the first plug at 3,645. The well bottomed at 3,695 in lime showing sulphur water saturation. Illinois Oil Co. No. 1 Central State Bank of Abilene, one mile extension test west of the Keyes and Cherry area in Winkler, is reported drilling below 2,378 feet in lime. It is located in the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 23, block 26, public school land.

SETTING CASING Casing is being set and cemented at 4,250 feet in Humble No. 1 Jessie M. Spinks, prospective mile and a half northwest extension of the Means pool in northern Andrews county. It is bottomed at 4,521 feet in lime and is said to have recovered oil stained cores from 4,498 to total depth.

In Ector county, Barnsdall No. 1 Frank Foster, new producing offset to the discovery well in the Foster pool, had cleaned out to bottom and is running tubing in preparation for pumping test.

TIJUANA UNDER ARMED PATROLS

Rations Distributed To Laborers To Prevent Disturbances

SAN DIEGO, Calif., April 15 (AP)—The entire Tijuana, Mexico garrison of 1200 troops patrolled the border town of 8000 inhabitants late Tuesday to preserve order as government rations were issued to unemployed laborers who were reported as threatening revolt.

The garrison, normally about 500, was reinforced more than a fortnight ago by direct order from Mexico City. Most of the regular Tijuana troops were sent to the interior and were replaced by a larger guard of what Captain Miguel Gavira described as loyal soldiers.

The soldiers permitted no one to enter Tijuana environs without challenge and search. Even visiting Americans crossing the border at San Ysidro, California, port of entry, were questioned.

Proclamations were posted over the name of Captain Gavira calling upon the populace to reveal the whereabouts of all arms and ammunition and demanding surrender of personal firearms. An exception was to family bread winners in want, who were hunting for game.

Hoover Refuses To Remain Silenced; Orates Once More

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15 (AP)—Herbert Hoover's assertion that President Roosevelt's suggestion for hour and wage limitations to restore employment "was tried and failed two years ago" blended Tuesday night with other criticism by the republican high command and the American Liberty League.

Democrats came forward with praise for the president's speech, contending that the choice lay between his suggestions and that of a "permanent dole."

Mr. Hoover in a statement at his Palo Alto, Calif. home, said the president's advocacy of shorter hours for increasing employment had failed when tried. He proposed instead a five-point program to restore "long-time confidence."

Hitting at Mr. Roosevelt's suggestion in Baltimore last night for shortening hours without reducing wages, retiring the aged at about 65 and keeping those under 18 in school, Henry P. Fletcher, chairman of the republican national committee, added to his designation of "impossible" this statement: "He does not explain how it could be brought about except through an autocratic government."

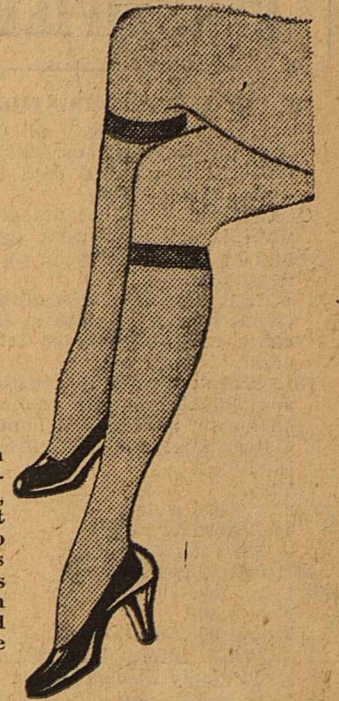

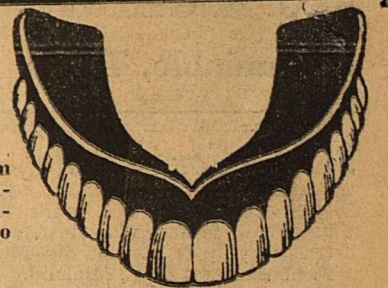
