PATTON DENIES HIS CONFESSION **GIVEN TO SHERIFF**

New Statement Says He Is Not Guilty Of Murdering 4

THIRD TALE TOLD

"Third Degree" Used On Him, Farmer Declares

DALLAS, Mar. 17. (A)-George quadruple slaying of the McGehee family, announced in the county jail here Monday night repudiation of previous statements he had made and claimed innocence of the mass

The 54-year-old accused killer was transferred to Dallas because Sheriff Jess Sweeten of Athens feared mob violence if he were kept at Athens or in the Jacksonville jail from which he was brought here to-

I didn't kill the McGehee family they were friends of mine. I didn't have any trouble with them like they say I did. They were fine people and I had no reason to harm

Deputy Sheriff Bill Decker indicated Patton would be examined by alienists as soon as permission is

Earlier, Patton had switched his story of how members of the Mc-Gehee family were battered to death on his isolated East Texas farm four years ago, and claimed that three of the victims were kill-

The gray-bearded farmer, haggard from an all-night grilling in the Palestine jall, broke down and made a signed statement to the effect he and McGehee, fighting with after a dispute over corn had accidentally struck blows which killed Mrs. McGehee and her two sons Doyle, 4 and Bobbie, 2.

Previously, the accused slayer had asserted McGehee came home drunk and killed his wife and children; and that then Patton had taken club from him and killed him in

Sheriff Jess Sweeten said Patton, after the finish fight, got a shovel dug a hole six feet deep and buried bodies. The rude grave was about 60 feet from his back door.

It was not until yesterday authorities found the bodies. Patton, after days of questioning, fi-nally led the sheriff to the grave and helped dig up the almost, fleshless skeletons still clad in rotted

Although Patton is charged with murder in four cases, the case against him had been admittedly weak until the remains of the Mc-Gehee family were found. Patton from the skeletons and burned the

WOLF OF WAR ADVANCES ON UNMINDFUL WORLD

The bright young man who came hot-footing it into the sheepfold yelling "Wolf!" at a time when the wolf was going about his business over in the next county has an unassailable reputation as one of history's prize numbskulls.

It is edifying to reflect, however, that his reputation would be even worse if he had failed to come running with the alarm when the wolf actually did show up. An over-excitable sentry is a good deal better than a sentry who puts in his time pounding his ear.

These deep reflections are provoked by a cable dispatch from London which points out that the British government has made up its mind that there is going to be a general European war inside of four years, and is getting ready to draw cards in it.

In adopting this realistic attitude, and spending all the money it can spare on its fleet and its air force, Britain is only doing what every other great power is making her do so. doing. They're all preparing, including that lean gentleman with the goatee, Uncle Sam. But the point is that they are preparing for war, not for peace.

Observe how illogically the human mind can work. War, as everybody agrees, is a great curse, the sum of all varieties of human misery. It is flood and pestilence and fire and earthquake all rolled into one; its horror is the worst horror that can be loosed on human civiliza-

This being true, wouldn't you suppose that when the statesmen of the world saw a new war less than four years away they would take off their coats and vests and do everything humanly possible to head it off?

Four years is not a long time, as history is measured; but it does provide a great deal of room for negotiations, compromises, and round-table discussions, and for marshaling an international sentiment for peace. It would be only natural to expect that the leaders of mankind would look at this four-years-distant war and say, "Here-let's get busy and find a way to avert this danger; let's do something-anything-to get out from under.'

If we knew that an epidemic of plague was due in 1940, we should do exactly that. We would move heaven and earth to keep it from happening. Why don't we do the same with war, which is worse than any plague?

Well, we don't. We are all spending millions on fleets and armies and air forces, so that when this terrible curse arrives we can do our part to make it even more terrible. We are doing nothing to keep the curse from coming. The wolf is coming down on the sheepfold . . . but all

Summarizing the European Situation Since Year 1910

By NEA Service

The trouble between France and Germany, which threatens to drag all Europe into another war, boils

The conditions of peace at the end of the World War were written in the Treaty of Versailles, signed

The treaty made Germany agree to pay a vast fine, or "reparations," to make its army and navy very small, and to keep no soldiers in a strip of land within about 20 miles of the German bank of the Rhine.

The treaty also set up the League

of Nations, partly to enforce the treaty, partly to create a means for all countries to prevent war in future. The league first met in 1920. There were setbacks from the start. First, the United States refused to ratify the treaty or join the league.

the league.

Then Germany found it impossible to pay the reparations, and refused. The French moved soldiers into the German Ruhr to collect the payments, but the British and other allies did not back Her up.

Strength of the peace treaty was whittled away because the Germans refused to abide by it, and because the allies were no longer united in making her do so.

In 1925 things looked better. At Locarno, Italy, a new treaty was arranged between the chief allies and Germany. All agreed to respect the boundaries and conditions set by the Versailles treaty, and not to attack without first referring any disputes to the League of Nations. If any country attacked one of the others, all would help the attacked country

country.

But the Versailles Treaty continued to weaken. The French had to leave the Ruhr. A conference at Lausanne could find no way for Germany to pay the war repara-

Then Hitler's party gradually be-came the strongest in Germany. In 1932 Hitler began to run Germany. built up a strong German army spite of the Versailles Treaty, ow he has sent his soldiers into the zone along the banks of the hine, which is in Germany, but in which she had agreed to keep no

Hitter's excuse for this was that France had never reduced her armies after the World War as agreed, and that France signed a treaty with Russia, under which the two powers had agreed to back each other up with soldiers in case of trouble.

Then Hitler suggested that a new treaty be made between Germany, France, Belgium and other countries of western Europe, agreeing not to attack each other for 25 years.

France's Premier Albert Sarraut cried out loudly, "what would be the use of a new treaty if Germany will not keep the present one?"

So Sarraut and Belgium's Premier Van Zeeland protested to the League of Nations that Hitler was violating both, the Versailles and Locarno.



Some shrinkage occurred following the cold weather early in February, but an a-bundance of roughage and other feeds were available and feeding was general. With warmer weather improvements was rapid and catthe are now in good condition in most sections. However, heel flies are becoming bothersome in some counties and cattle in these counties are not making normal gains.

Prospects are very good for a large
calf crop this year and the drop
is expected earlier than usual. Losses of cattle have continued very light, but some losses of calves dropped during the cold weather have occurred.

The condition of CATTLE is reported at 80 percent of normal compared with 81 percent a month ago, 61 percent a year ago, and 79

percent the 10-year average.

Over most of the SHEEP country subsoil moisture is adequate, but surface moisture and warm weather are needed to start spring grass and weeds. Practically the entire sheep area needs moisture badly. High winds and dry, cold weather were instrumental in setting range feeds back and depleting the already short supply of surface moisture. The condition of SHEEP ranges is now reported at 77 percent of normai compared with 80 percent a month ago, 55 percent a year ago, and 78 percent the 10-year average.

While there has been a slight de-cline in the condition of sheep during February, generally they were in better than average flesh on Mar. Prospects are good for a heavy wool clip and a lamb crop fully average. The condition of GOATS. continue good, and kid crop pros-

pects are better than average.

Livestock generally came through
the severe weather of February in the severe weather of February in fairly good condition in the 17 western range states, but with consderable shrinkage in northern sections. Cattle in the northern areas were able to stand the severe weather condition very well. Losses were generally light except in limit-ed areas. There was considerable shrinkage in Montana, the Dakotas Wyoming, and parts of Nebraska. Cattle are generally in good flesh in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, and Texas, with a few thin cattle light shinkage where snow was heavy and weather severe. 

















