Heart Disease Tops All Others in Deaths

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Heart disease headed the claim disbursement list of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for the twelfth successive year in 1935. Claims arising from this cause last year amounted.



crude death rate for heart disease among the company's Industrial colicyholders, following a long series of year-to-year increases, and they admit the possibility that from

year in 1935. Claims arising from this cause last year amounted to almost one-sixth of the \$157,889,173 death benefits paid during the year by the company. During the same period the Metropolitan paid \$377,4362,400 to living policyholders in the shape of maturities of endowment policies, dividends, annuities, etc.

Nevertheless, statisticians of the insurance company report that the year witnessed a small drop in the year witnessed a small drop in the count of heart conditions.

The three principal cardiovascular-renal impairments—heart discase, chronic nephritis, and cerebral hemorrhage—accounted for almost three tenths of the total sum paid out by the Metropolitan in death claims last year. "These so called 'degenerative diseases' constitute one of the most fertile fields for public health work," the statisticians point out. "for thousands of these deaths could have been prevented and thoucould have been prevented and thousands more could have been post-poned. There is still much work to be done in the better control of acute diseases of children, the local ections and the veneral diseases. all of which are instrumental in creating cardiac impairments. Furermore, as more people come to earn the importance of correct diet, f proper exercise, and of personal ygiene in general, there will be wer deaths from these chronic Cancer was the second highest

cause of death among the insurance company's policyholders last year, one ninth of all death claim payments being due to this cause. According to the statisticians, there has been a slackening in the up-ward course of the cancer death ate, and in 1935 there was a small drop among the company's policy-holders, following an increase which had been uninterrupted for many

Third in the list were disbursements for all types of accidents combined. One dollar in every ten disbursed in death payments by the Metropolitan in 1935 was on account increase of 75 per cent in money disbursed on account of accidents as compared with the amount paid ten years ago. Automobile fatalities were responsible for more than 44 per cent of the total last year for pneumonia itself stood fifth. Chronic nephritis actually ranked fourth and cerebral remorrhage sixth.




