WASHINGTON, June 5 (A)—Chief Justice Alfred Wheat of the District of Columbia supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the public works administration's \$200,-000,000 power progam in dismissing an injunction suit against 10 municipal electric projects in four states.

The court held that the plaintiffs, the Alabama Power, the Texas Utilities Company, Oklahoma Utilities Company, Iowa Light and Power Company, had a right to bring to suit the question of the validity of the power project, but ruled that the statutes under which the pro-jects are being carried out, the nation industrial recovery and emergency relief acts of 1935, are constitutional.

The suits ruled on involved PWA allocations in ten cities in Alabama Texas, Oklahoma and Iowa.
