Six Farm Families In Sooner State Are Missing

#### RIVERS FLOODED

Six Inch Downpour Sends Streams Out of Banks

ELK CITY, Okla., May 1 (AP) .-Iwo men were believed to have been six farm families missing as a portion of this city counted \$20,000 damage after a sudden flood and freakish twister hit here today.

Searchers sought the bodies Chicago man after his car had been swept into the flooding Elk river, and for B. B. Wall, Oklahoma City, whose car was found abandoned in

#### Quarter-Billion in Funds Dispersed to Citizens of HOLC

In clearing up back taxes owed to states, counties and local governments by over a million distressed home owners whom it refinanced in the emergency, the Home Owners' Loan Corporation has disbursed approximately \$224,981,000 to state and municipal governments. The amount of such payments is consolidated in the loans made by the corporation to those home owners. The net result is that the taxes in arrears were paid, while the HOLC is being re-imbursed for such expenditures through principal and interest in-stallments paid by its borrowers on their loans under the corporation's 15-year monthly payment.
