The resume said: "It should be evident by this time that I am not a candidate. I have stated many times that I have no interest but to get the critical issues before the country.

"I have rigidly prevented my friends from setting up any or-ganization, and from presenting my name in any primary or to any state convention, and not a single delegate of California or any other state is pledged to me."
