

"Gimme Back My Boots and Saddle" May Be Cry of Cowhands Entering the Bare-Back Bronc Riding at Rodeo; all Stock Wild

Bulldogging and riding steers, on feed at the Midland Fair pens for the past few weeks, are showing signs both of gain in weight and of being fractious, rodeo officials said Saturday.

The Chihuahua steers to be used in the bulldogging contest are owned by the Pecos rodeo but were furnished the local organization for use June 26, 27, 28. Both they and the Brahmas which are owned by Midland Fair, Inc., will be used at the Pecos rodeo July 3, 4 and 5, assuring both meets a substantial string of long horned animals for the wrestling and riding competition.

The steers were moved from the feed lots to the pens on the east side of the fair grounds a few days ago. After being on feed for several days, they had begun to "feel their heari" and were a fractious lot.

Fast, well bred but wild handling mares, the same as were used at the rodeo last fall, will be used in the bareback bronc riding contest here, assuring many spills for those having the nerve to climb aboard without the trusty swell-forked saddle.

Other wild mares, fast and wiry, will be used in the wild horse race events and in the wild horse roping. In the latter contest, the contestant must rope the mare and remove a bell from her flank, being a similar contest to last fall's wild mare milking, only wilder and faster.

A string of tried and proven outlaw broncs has been contracted for the World Championship Centennial Rodeo here, and a few other will be added just to make sure no broncs are overworked to the extent that each rider will not be liable to a spill.

Typical of the Midland show, the calves to be roped will be fast and not too large. Some ropers use calves so large that they do not run well, yet are hard to be thrown and tied, causing slow time and an unsatisfactory show.

CIVIL GUARD ONE OF THOSE KILLED DURING SKIRMISH

More Than 200 Dead As Political Strife Grips Nation

THREE ARRESTED Suspects Captured After Government Defeats Coup

MADRID, June 13 (P)—A civil guard was slain and four others were killed in fresh outbursts of violence in Spain Saturday. The deaths brought to more than 200 the total killed since the leftist victory last month.

The cabinet and premier agreed to punish those rejecting the government compromise.

The assassination of a high official of the province of Malaga and another slaying Thursday brought the total dead to four in fights between Syndicalists and Communists.

At the same time the four-months old leftist national government, harassed by strikes and disorders announced it had crushed a Rightist movement in seven provinces.

Communists and Socialists had given orders to their followers to end a general strike but fear of reprisals by Syndicalists kept most of the activities of the city paralyzed.

More than 100,000 farmers of Malaga voted to end a strike for higher prices and wages.

There were reports Socialists would form a new cabinet armed with plenary powers to bring to an end disorders sweeping through the country.

Officials and team managers of the Permian Basin Baseball league will gather at the recreation hall in the new Gulf camp at Crane this morning at 10 o'clock to discuss plans for the second half pennant chase, which will get underway on July 4. Whether or not one or more clubs will be added for the second half race will also be discussed pro and con. The Odessa Oilers, piloted by Mack Saxon, are seeking admittance into the circuit and it is reported that Big Spring will also seek a berth. Club managers favor an eight club league, but a seven team circuit is frowned upon by most of the league executives.

Eligibility rules are also due to come in for considerable discussion, and several radical changes along this line are expected. Ozona favors several changes in the eligibility rules, and the fiery George Russell, Ozona business manager, will be on hand to see that his club gets a square deal in whatever comes up for a vote. More stringent rules regarding the changing of a player from one club to another within the league are expected to be passed. The second half schedule will also be drafted.

Bill Orchard, veteran manager of the Crane Oilers, can be expected to start the fireworks by advancing whatever idea happens to be in his mind at the moment. Orchard can always be depended upon to start an argument, but the crafty Gulf manager is always the first to change over and vote with the majority. Curt Choate, recently appointed manager of the McCamey Refiners will represent Iraan, and Snipe

Conley will be on hand to invoke Texon's blessing upon the gathering. J. F. Davis, Wink cafe magnate and president of the Wink baseball club, will head the Wink delegation.

Numerous fans from Odessa will doubtless be present at the gathering to boost the Odessa Oilers' application for league membership. Odessa has one of the fastest teams in this section, and the league is unanimous in wanting the Odessians listed in the league alignment, but, as said before, a seven club circuit is opposed by the league. If another application for membership is acceptable to the league members, Odessa is assured of a berth, otherwise it is doubtful if they will be admitted.

For a time it was hoped that Midland would organize a club and go into the league along with Odessa, but the Midland citizenry is much too RODEO-MINDED and as a result there will be no baseball here this summer, but in its place, the World's Championship Centennial Rodeo will be staged here on June 26-28. Midland is fast becoming the rodeo capital of the state.

Crane will not only be the scene of the league meeting tomorrow but will also be the site of the outstanding game of the weekend. The league leading Ozona Giants are to meet the Crane Oilers in what will likely be the deciding game of the first half chase. The game will be well worth the drive to Crane, and many fans from here will likely be in attendance. The Crane-Ozona series will be one of the hardest fought of the entire season. The Sunday tilt is carded for 3 p. m. Soldier Crosswaite will likely be on the mound for Ozona with either Bob Osborn or Bill Duncan doing the chunking for the Crane Oilers. Cotton Ward, former Midland catcher, will do the umpiring.

It is likely that the Midland diamond will be the scene of several

Permian league tilts during the second half. Large crowds would turn out for the games here, and it would be worth while for the various clubs to consider the Midland diamond.

An all-star game is always played at the close of the season with the outstanding stars of the league participating. Teams are picked by various fans and sports writers and the affair always creates wide interest. The Midland diamond is being considered as a site for the all-star tilt.

Eddie McMillan, Texon outfielder, retains his place as the leading hitter of the league, the sweet king having led the other hitters from the start of the season. Bill Estes of Iraan and Baldy Joiner of Texon are fast gaining on McMillan. McMillan is hitting .485, Estes is hitting .482 and Joiner is a close third with an average of .417.

### COACHES SEEKING SUCCESS HINTS OF BERNIE BIERMAN

MINNEAPOLIS (U.P.)—Athletic coaches of the nation who want to learn how it's done—in championship style—will visit Coach Bernie Bierman, mentor of the best football team in the country, at the University of Minnesota coaching school, June 15 to 20.

Approximately 250 "students" will spend five days assimilating the methods of training and technique offered by able instructors in nine courses, but the branch that has attracted athletic directors, physical department heads and coaches from 27 states and Canada, will be the one conducted by the gray-haired majordomo of the Gopher grid juggernaut which has spread-eagled the field for three years. Bierman's class in football will top the curriculum of athletics, which includes basketball, track, baseball, swimming, recreational games, athletic training, wrestling and tennis.

Live Models Promised  
Dr. George Hauser, Gopher line coach, will be Bierman's chief aide in the football course. "Live models" from the Gopher team will be used to illustrate the lectures and discussions presented by Bierman, who is one of the strongest advocates of fundamentals and rudimentary play in the game today.

Baseball, another sport in which

Minnesota has been remarkably proficient, having won the Big Ten conference title twice in the past three years, will have as its head master Frank G. McCormick, Minnesota athletic director. McCormick will stress offensive team strategy and position play.

Two of the Northwest's leading basketball coaches will combine to offer the instruction in that sport. They are Dave McMillan, whose Minnesota team was a stumbling block to conference teams last year, and J. D. Kelly, director of athletics and head coach of De Paul university, Chicago. De Paul was one of the leading free-lance quartets in the Middle West last winter.

Course on Conditioning  
Athletic training, including a study of the conditioning of athletes and the treatment of injuries, will be under the instruction of Dr. L. J. Cooke, assistant director of athletics, and Dr. Hauser. Dr. Cooke, Minnesota's "grand old man of athletics," coached the Minnesota cage team for 29 years.

The course in track will be taught by George Oterness, Minnesota track coach and former Gopher cinder great. He will be aided by Kelly of De Paul. Swimming will be under Ralph Piper, coach of

Minnesota's championship gymnastic team and former swimming coach at Kansas State agricultural college.

Phil Brain, whose Minnesota net teams always have been top flight performers in the Western conference, will handle the course in tennis, while Dave Bartelma, Minnesota wrestling coach, will teach that sport. Recreational games will be outlined by Piper.

University credit towards a B.S. degree in physical education will be granted those attending the sessions who pass an examination.

### FOUR USC MEN ARE OLYMPIC CINCHES

LOS ANGELES (U.P.)—Four young men, ranked high as candidates for Uncle Sam's Olympic team this summer, are making track and field history at the University of Southern California.

So nearly alike they might be considered twins, Phil Cope and Roy Staley in the high hurdles and Earle Meadows and Bill Sefton in the pole vault are standouts on the defending national champion Trojan

varsity, considered the most powerful squad in the nation. Cope and Staley already are world champions while Meadows and Sefton rarely vault below 14 feet and they menace the world mark every Saturday afternoon.

Beard's Record Tied  
The two star timber-toppers are the pride of Coach Dean Cromwell, veteran Trojan coach at U.S.C. for the past 30 years and assistant Olympic coach. Both juniors and only 21, Cope and Staley climaxed brilliant prep and collegiate careers as sophomores last year by running a dead heat against Ohio State to tie the Percy Beard's world record of 14.2 seconds.

In his first big meet this year, Cope hit 14.3 against California, with Staley a bare foot behind. A week later against Stanford, Cope again tied the world's record, with Staley a close second. Cope was national high school champion in 1933 at Oklahoma City. His teammate is from Santa Monica, Calif., where he was timed at 14.8 as a high school boy.

As for the pole vault, Cromwell has four men consistent over 13 feet 6 inches and usually can count on at least first and second in any meet. He confidently expects to

see Meadows and Sefton win Olympic laurels at Berlin in August. Following in the footsteps of World Champion Bill Garber from U.S.C., these two Trojans are probably the best collegiate vaulters in the country.

Missed World Mark  
Meadows cleared 14 feet, 3 inches earlier this season and missed Keith Brown's world mark of 14-

Invisible Rays Guard Children In Traffic

LONDON (U.P.)—Parents living near one of London's most crowded thoroughfares are happier about their children's safety today. On St. Helier's Avenue, which for nearly a mile cuts through the heart of a district where there are 4,000 houses, nearly 20,000 adults and 8,000 children, a new set of traffic signals, operated by invisible light rays, have been installed. 1,650 feet from the east line of section 12, block 26, public school land, is nearing the pay zone as it drills at 2,844. The oil string of casing was cemented at 2,770.

KEYES AREA WELLS NEAR COMPLETION DEPTHS

In the Keyes area northwest of Kermit in Winkler Mid-Continent No. 2 Walton is drilling lime below 2,766 feet. It encountered an estimated 5,000,000 cubic feet of gas from 2,720 to 2,728 and had increases from there down to 2,760. Location is 2,310 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west line of section 24, block 26, public school land.

Also in the Keyes area, Sinclair-Francis No. 3-B Walton, 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of section 24, is drilling lime below 2,842 while the No. 2-B Walton, located in the southeast corner of the same section, is waiting for cement to set around 5-inch casing run to 2,775. Total depth is 2,993, and the last test made showed 7,010,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Now drilling lime below 2,825, Tidewater No. 4 Walton, 2,310 feet from the south and west lines of section 24, will halt operations at 2,935 and shoot with 300 quarts of nitro from 2,900 to 2,920.

DEEP TEST PLUGGING BACK TO TREAT UPPER PAYS

After reaching a total depth of 6,527 feet, steel line measurement, Magnus Oil Co. Spencer, interesting Schleicher county Ordovician test, is plugging back to acidize some of the upper zones in which oil showed. Located 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of section 4, Hooper and Wade survey, the Magnus well is generally credited with topping the Ellenberger, lower Ordovician, limestone at 5,902.

In Fisher county, Tide Water No. 3 Mary Howard was scheduled to squib with 15 quarts of nitro to run an acid treatment. Drilled to a total depth of 3,701 feet, the well was plugged back to 3,694 for a shut-off of water coming from 3,697. It has about 700 feet of oil in the hole from pays from 3,647 to 3,649 and from 3,662 to 3,664.

CRANE TUBB WELLS SHOW PROGRESS

In the Tubb area of western Crane county, Gulf No. 2 Tubb, 440 feet out from the northeast corner of section 12, block B-27, public school land, is drilling hard lime below 3,235 feet. It is about a quarter of a mile west of the Humble No. 2 Tubb, a large deep Permian producer rated at 1,025 barrels daily.
