BORAH ADMITS HE COPIED DEMO IDEA IN GOP PLATFORM

Anti-Monopoly Plank "Borrowed" From 1912 Race

REMAINS SILENT

Refuses to Admit or Deny He'll Vote For Landon

WASHINGTON, June 13. (AP) Senator Borah disclosed Saturday that he drew on the 1912 Democratic anti-trust platfrom in arguing at the Ceveland Republican convention for a strong anti-monopoly declaration, wording of two identical sections. He said "I think the 1912 Democratic plank covered the ground more specifically than the present Republican plank does.

Borah, defeated candidate for the presidential nomination, has not yet announced whether or not he would vote for Alf Landon ,party stand-ard bearer. The return of the nation to the gold standard, placed in the party platform by Landon, was contrary to the views of Borah who has announced that it would be the worst possible thing that could be

More Than 200 Dead As Political Strife Grips Nation

THREE ARRESTED

Suspects Captured After Government Defeats Coup

MADRID, June 13 (A)- A civil guard was slain and four others were killed in fresh outbursts of violence in Spain Saturday. The deaths brought to more than 200 the total killed since the Leftist victory last month. Guards caught three suspects in the Saturday slayings.

KEYES AREA WELLS NEAR COMPLETION DEPTHS

In the Keyes area northwest of Kermit in Winkler Mid-Continent No. 2 Walton is drilling lime below 2,766 feet. It encountered an estimated 5,000,000 cubic feet of gas from 2,720 to 2,728 and had increases from there down to 2,760. Location is 2,310 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west line of section 24, block 26, public school

Also in the Keyes area, Sinclair-Prairie No. 3-B Walton, 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of ection 24, is drilling lime below 2,-842 while the No. 2-B Walton, located in the southeast corner of the same section, is waiting for cement to set around 5-inch casing run to 2,-Total depth is 2,993, and the test made showed 7,010,000

cubic feet of gas per day.
