### **TO BACK LANDON**

Possible Entry From Ranks of Own Men Is Hinted

HOUSTON, June 23 (AP)— John Henry Kirby, chairman of the 'Southern Committee to Defend the Constitution" said today that the organization was claiming 350,000 members in 17 states and that it would oppose the reelection of President Roosevelt.

He said that he was not sure whether the party would support Alf Landon, republican presidential nominee, or whether it would place ts own candidate in the field. He said that members of the organization were being polled to determine their attitude. He said "if they decide to throw their support to the republican nominee it will be as democrats as we have no in-tentions of becoming republicans.

The accused native found a lion in a trap, and then made a ladder, went down and helped the beast escape. He explained to the court that the lion in question was his friend.




