WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. - The percentage of Federal Housing insured mortgages which cover new ed to this type of mortgage. Ad- Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois banks. and September, new - construction states separated by rivers. mortgages accepted for insurance jumped to 53,46 per cent of the total business.

During those three months new onstruction mortgages totaled \$65,-392,324, while the entire volume of business accepted amounted to \$122,326,916. Theh District of Columbia leads the nation with 91.74 per cent of mortgages accepted covering new construction.

Other states which show a major amount of new-construction mortgage insurance are: Florida, with 90.26 per cent; Texas, 82.17 per cent; Connecticut, 80.57 per cent; Arkansas, 79.06 per cent; Mississippi, 78.-87 per cent; New York, 75.75 per cent; North Carolina, 73.45 per cent; Wisconsin, 73.05 per cent.



The Van Sweringens were in fi-nancial difficulties. When the depression struck, it undermined the ender base of the inverted pryanid on which they had built.

Business Goes On Block

The controlling stock of the Vaness Company, "top company" of the Van Sweringen interests, was sold at auction in New York. The Morgans, naturally expected to bid it in to protect their loss of \$43,-000,000, did not do so. Apparently they had little confidence in the project and future.

Instead, a buyer appeared in the person of Midamerica Corporation, which bid in the Van Sweringen controlling interest for \$3,121,000. And Midamerica Corporation turned out to be Ball and Tomlinson. The Van Sweringens, Fortune re-

veals, hadn't a cent in Midamerica. But though Ball and Tomlinson owned control of Midamerica, they gave the Van Sweringen brother the right to vote their stock, and a 10-year option to buy 55 per cent of the common stock at cost plus ? per cent a vea

Had Faith in Vans It was a strange arrangement, even to top off the strange finan-
