

5 West Texas Counties Will Receive Work On Highways

Sealed bids on several highway projects in Midland, Martin, Ector, Andrews and Winkler counties will be opened July 30 at the offices of the State Highway Department. Austin, it is announced in an official advertisement in this paper today. The work, covering 48.30 miles, will be laying of asphalt surface and applying seal coat to portions of highways already constructed. Midland county's portion will be from Warfield west to the Ector

county line. Martin county will receive a seal coat on the Broadway of America from the Howard to the Midland county line. Ector will receive asphalt surface from the east line of the county, connecting with the Warfield portion and extending to the east city limit. Andrews county will be given a seal coat on the road from Ector county line to Andrews. In Winkler county. road will be sealed from Kermit to the New Mexico line.



THE TEXAS LAND OFFICE (An Editorial from Houston Chronicle) The Chronicle believes it is of great importance to the people of Texas to select an able and experienced man to head its state land office.

Of the two candidates now seeking the position, John W. Hawkins has been in the land commissioner's office for nearly 30 years, going there as a youth. He is now chief clerk of the office and is thoroughly experienced in every line of its work.

The land office in Texas has an importance unknown in other states of the Union. Land grants in Texas have come from the state government. The field notes of all surveys made in Texas are in the files of the state land office. In other states the notes

are in Washington, and the patents issued from there.

The documents in the Texas office date back to the earliest Spanish and Mexican days. The Spanish and Mexican systems of registering land titles have been carried down through the republic and state of Texas. All the documents involved are in constant use. Daily, titles have to be traced back to republic and pre-republic times.

To care for all these files and make them available at all times to interested citizens of Texas requires experience and constant devotion to duty.

The state land office has the oversight of all public lands, save only the university lands. It has the sale and leasing of these lands, including the mineral resources under

them, as regulated by laws of the state.

Millions of dollars in rental and lease income is handled annually, going mostly to the public school fund of the state.


