Adherence to London Tri-Power Pact Assured

SOVIET WINNER

Eastern Fleet of The Russians Not to Be Restricted

LONDON, July 30.(AP)-An Anglo-Russian naval agreement which, Russian sources said, does not bind the soviet eastern fleet to treaty limitations, was announced here to-

Because of the unrestricted Japa nese naval program the soviet's eastern fleet will not be restricted Russian quarters said. Although the treaty has been completely drafted no date has been set for its sign-

The objective of the treaty, it was stated officially, is to obtain soviet adherence to principles of the London pact between Britain, the United States and France.

In a recent statement the Japanese let it be known that as that country was no longer a member of either the League of Nations or concerned with the tri-power treaty that they would disregard restric

Japanese officials walked out of the last naval conference between Japan, Britain, France and the Unia fleet equal to that of the United States and Britain had been denied by the assembled delegates.

TOPEKA, July 30. (A)- Governor Alf Landon wrote Norman Thomas, socialist candidate for president, today that labor unions have the right "to promote by lawful and proper means an organization of unorganized industry which includes the right to send in an organizer."

The letter was an answer to a letter from Thomas who asked for elspeech in a statement that "employe freedom" means entire freedom from coercion and intimidation by the employer and the fellow em-

'In my statement that you quote. there is nothing to suggest I favor infringing in any way on the right of free speech and assembly," wrote

60 Feet of Drilling CORN IN U. S. SINCE Water Rises In 1931 IS FORECAST

Drouth Pushes Price To Highest Level In Six Years

WASHINGTON, July 30 (A)-The ossibility that the nation may have to smallest corn crop since 1881 was raised Wednesday by Secretary Wallace as the drouth pushed the agriculture department's price index on farm products to the highest Dallas. level since September, 1930.

Wallace, commenting on crop conareas, said the corn outlook was by no means definite yet. But he and officers of the agriculture department mentioned the possibility of sizeable corn imports from Argentina and elsewhere.

Drouth reports gave rise to much discussion of price during the day.
The bureau of agricultural economics reported the sharpest rise for a single month since August, 1934, in the prices received by farmers, placing the level 15 per cent above the

pre-war average.
Secretary Wallace, at his press conference, insisted, however, that the immediate effect of the dry spell on food prices was "not as great as the newspapers are leading the people to think."



Louisianans Jeer Gerald Smith's Claim He Can Swing Million Votes

NEW ORLEANS, July 30.— Resentment is beginning to displace picture of the Rev. Gerald Lyman Kenneth Smith gradually edging his way toward the driver's seat of the Townsend bandwagon.

At first people here were mildly astonished at the idea of the former Long organizer attaching himself to Dr. Townsend and selling the old age pension leader on the idea, that he, Smith, could swing 6,000,000 votes to a Townsend-Coughlin coalition.

Now Smith's claims are being analyzed. Earle J. Christenberry, for many years secretary to the late Huey Long, has bitterly tacked Smith's pretensions in a ra-dio talk. Mrs. Long, U. S. senator and widow of the late Huey, has repeatedly given assurance her husband never indicated that Smith was to be his successor.

The "American Progress," official newspaper organ of the "Share-Our - Wealth" movement has urged its readers to pay no attention to such claimants as Smith, pointing out that Huey himself repeatedly as-sailed the Townsend movement

LACKS OFFICIAL STANDING Most observers here admit that Smith, whose status in the Share-Our-Wealth movement under Long was that of a paid organizer, retains some personal following in the state. But this has no connection with the Share-Our-Wealth organization which was Huey Long's legacy to American politics.

Shortly after the death of Huey

Long, Christenberry copyrighted the name, trademark, and all other da-ta connected with the Share - Our-Wealth organization and turned them over to Rose McConnelll Long the widow, who took Huey's seat in the Senate.

Mrs. Long, commenting on Smith's connection with the Share - Our -Wealth movement, said, "The Rev. Mr. Smith was not designed by Senator Long as his successor and he is not now a Share-Our-Wealth or-ganizer. He may still take interest in the organization, but his acti-vities are not authorized by the or-

AUTHORITY IS DENIED Christenberry was even more em-phatic in his radio denial that Smith has any standing with the present Share-Our-Wealth movement in Louisiana.



World carryover in American cotton at the end of the season will be aout 7,000,000 bales.

Supplies of cotton in the United States on July 1 in all hands were 6,147,000 bales, compared with 7,-844,000 bales on this date last year, and 8,403,000 bales two years ago The reduction in supply in the United States from this time last year has been 1,797,000 bales. American otton in European ports and afloat to Europe increased from 760,000 bales last year to 827,000 bales July this year, or 67,000 bales.

Thus there has been a decline in he above items of stock of 1,730,000 bales. Based on average relations between changes in supply and re-sulting index prices over the past seven years, the index price of cotton based on New Orleans spots should be about 448 points above last year. When this is converted to present p ice levels and adjusted to the spinners margin, the New Or eans spots should be about 15.70 cents. When the price is calculated in terms of average percentage changes, New Orleans spot price pased on the above items of supply should be 15.12 cents. Do not these figures indicate the tremendous pressure of increased foreign production of cotton on the price for American cotton?

The spinners ratio margin decreased during June from 164 in May to 158 during June. The pence margin for June averaged 4.02 d compared with 4.16 d for May. It will be noted that these figures indicate a fair balance between sup-
