10 Per Cent Banking Now we come to the plans for

by Clark dealing with the great we can bank-created money, and we can look at various plans for demobilizing the bankers' control over credit The first is offered by Prof. Irving Fisher. He calls it "100 per cent banking." Banks have usually cash to the extent of 10 per cent of their deposits. Fisher's plan is to require 100 per cent cash_a dollar in cash in the vaults for every dollar of deposits. Here is how it would work: First, the government would set up a Currency Commission. This commission would buy from all the banks almost all of their assets, enough to give the banks cash equal to their deposits. The commission would pay for these assets with paper money issued by it.

This done, the commission would have practicelly all of the bills, notes, bonds, stocks now owned by the banks. The banks would have instead government currency. The deposits of the banks would be the same, but they would be in cash instead of interest-bearing investments.

Thereafter all deposit banks would be chartered as mere warenouses of cash. They would not make loans. They would always have to keep a dollar in cesh in their vaults for every dollar on deposit. Their profits would come from charging depositors for the service.

Those who wish to borrow would go to other types of banks specially chartered for the purpose. Such banks would accept funds from investors not depositors. You could put money in such banks for savings purposes, understanding that it could not be checked out at will. You would get interest on your savings. Such banks would make loans. But they would hand over cash to


'Twas a Fine Crop-for 'Hoppers!
