Murder of Welfare Worker Remains Unsolved

LA JOLLA, Calif. Sept. 4. (P)— Los Angeles and Oceanside police detained two men Thursday for uestioning in the lust slaying of Ruth Muir, Y. W. C. A. worker, while admittedly baffled San Diego officers looked for possible new clues

While scientists were completing laboratory examinations of hair found clutched in the victim's hand, the Los Angeles officers took into custody a man attired in women's clothing.

Oceanside officers detained a mar who gave his name as Archie Best. Police Chief Paxton of Oceanside reported Best was "very scared" and that his arms appeared scratched He was held for San Diego offi-

Los Angeles Police Captain L. L Curtis said the man detained there gave his name as Jack Birge, 31, former marine newly arrived there from San Diego but later said he was Joe B. Smith of Los Angeles. He was picked up police answering a telephone complaint that someone was annoying women in the street.

Officers said Smith told conflicting stories of his whereabouts Monday night, when Miss Muir was killed. They said he wore a pink skirt and blouse, lipstick and rouge and a brown wig. Hairs from the wig were sent to Pomona college for comparison with those taken from Miss Muir's hand.
