New Rules In South Ward Pool Are Argued

FAULTS CITED

Abrogation of Old Rules Urged By Company

BY FRANK GARDNER Forty oil men were present this morning at a hearing called by the Texas Railroad Commission to determine whether or not special rules regulations or orders should be adopted for the prevention of waste of crude oil and natural gas in the South Ward pool of Ward county.

The hearing, called at the request of the California Co. and Prince Bros., was presided over by V. E. Cottingham, Commission engineer in charge of the oil and gas division.

D. S. Goggin of the California Co., presented a list of new rules to abrogate existing regulations pertaining to the South Ward field. Briefly, these entailed changing of the present spacing rules from 2.07 acres per well to 10 acres per well, with provisions for special hearings in case of exceptions; a casing program providing for setting of a maximum of 450 feet of surface pipe with not less than 250 sacks of cement, and testing of the oil string either by pressure or lowering of the fluid level; working pressure of not less than 800 pounds or test pressure of 1,600 pounds per square inch on Christmas-tree connections; consecutive 24-hour potential test with tubing set in well remedial measures to prevent gas wastage through an excessive gas-oil ratio; and provisions for the disposition of casing-head gas.

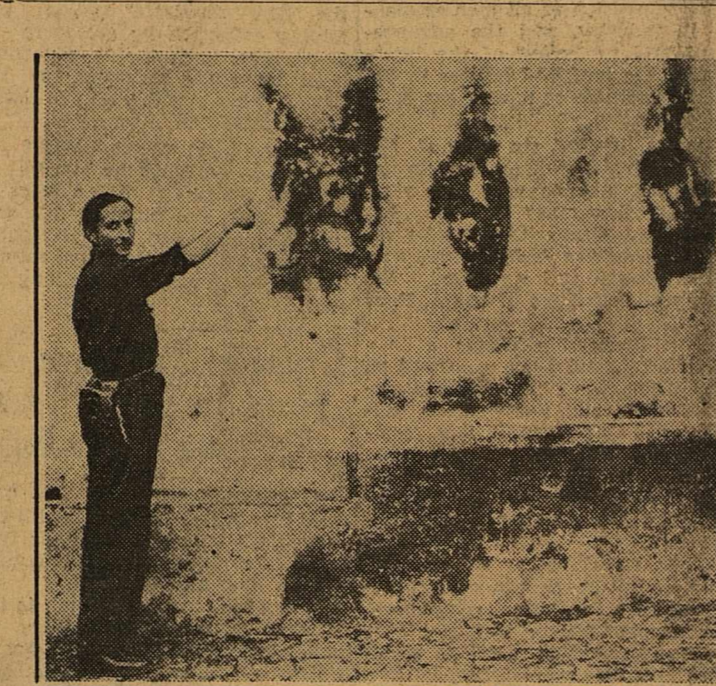

"Sensational developments" concerning foreign aid to the Spanish rebels were promised at an early date by the Madrid government.

The government said documents found on the body of an aviator killed in a battle revealed that foreign aviators in the employ of the rebels were bombarding defenseless towns.

Assailing foreign support of the rebels, the government declared it was probing fully the extent to which outside nations are involved in Spain's fratricidal war.

Landon Leading Roosevelt by 2 to 1 In First Returns From Literary Digest Poll

Landon leads Roosevelt by over 2 to 1 in the first scattering returns from four eastern states in The Literary Digest's nation-wide Presidential poll.

The combined vote in Maine, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, from which ballots are reported in a copyrighted article in the current issue of the magazine shows 16,056 votes for Landon and 7,645 for Roosevelt.

Lemke polls 754 of the total of 24,399 votes tallied which is fractionally over 3 per cent.

The Socialist candidate, Thomas, receives a total of 109 ballots and the other four minor candidates divide 125 votes.

Landon's lead is greatest in Maine where he gets 1,831 to Roosevelt's 522 votes.

New Jersey voters sent in 2,660 ballots marked for the Republican candidate and 1,621 for the Democratic nominee.

The early returns from New York show the President trailing with only 2,724 votes to his opponent's 5,931.

Pennsylvania, which was one of the six states to give Hoover a plurality four years ago, now ballots 5,634 for its native son, Landon, and 2,778 for Roosevelt.

The Literary Digest cautions in its editorial columns that these returns are meager and should not serve as a base for any extensive predictions of the final outcome. The magazine also points out that none of the ballots in its first poll report came from the large metropolitan areas of New York City, Philadelphia or Pittsburgh.

An analysis of how the same voters voted in the 1932 election reveals that each candidate is drawing nearly three-quarters of his strength so far from his own party supporters in the 1932 election.

Passover Feast To Be Presented At Baptist Church

Rev. Joseph Cohen of Charleston, S. C., nationally known Hebrew Christian minister, will present the ancient Feast of the Passover at the First Baptist church Sunday evening, explaining its relation to Jesus Christ.

Rev. Cohen and his assistants will picture a Jewish household observing the ancient rite. They will be dressed in the costumes of the days of Jesus. Every detail of the ritual will be carried out and its meaning given. Gold and silver dishes, candlesticks, the paschal lamb, bitter herbs, unleavened bread, salt water, the egg, the empty chair; all will be used and explained.

Rev. Cohen was converted to Christianity 17 years ago and immediately entered the Christian ministry, being educated at Southwestern Baptist Seminary, Fort Worth.

He has held meetings in many of the largest and most influential churches in the Southland. His message on the passover is said to be one of his most outstanding presentations.

The First Baptist church invites the citizenship of [Midland], both Jews and Gentiles, to this service, it is said. They are assured of a warm welcome, courteous treatment, and respectful consideration for their religious convictions.

POISON VICTIM'S FUNERAL FRIDAY

Prominent Haskell County Man Believed To Have Taken Own Life

HASKELL, Sept. 4 (P)—Funeral service for John H. Cotton, Zahn, member of a prominent Haskell county family who died of poisoning Wednesday, will be held Friday at 3 p. m. at the home ten miles north of here. Burial will follow in Willow cemetery, Haskell.

A verdict had not been returned last night in the coroner's inquest, but officers indicated it probably would be death by poisoning, self-administered.

According to statements of his wife and other relatives, Zahn drank the contents of a small bottle while standing near a cistern in the yard walked inside and lay down on a bed, and died. He made no explanation and no motive could be ascribed, the statements said.

Survivors are his wife, a daughter, Francis; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Zahn, Sr., seven brothers and two sisters.

Every exhibitor will receive a medal of recognition from the exposition, while cash awards will be paid to owners of winning exhibits. Two cups will be presented by the exposition for the two best displays in each group.
