CONGRESSMAN R. E. **THOMASON TO GIVE** PRINCIPAL TALK Construction of The Structure Going

Forward PLAN PROGRAM Mayor Ulmer Is To Accept Edifice

For City Laying of the cornerstone of the Midland federal building has been scheduled for Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock, with Congressman R. E. Thomason delivering the principal address, it was announced this morning by Postmaster John P.

A program has been worked out for the event, with music by the Midland high school band. Clarence Scharbauer, president of the chamber of commerce and close friend of the congressman, will introduce the speaker. Mayor M. C. Ulmer will accept the building on behalf of the people of Midland. R. W. Hamilton, county democratic chairman, will head the escort party accompanying the congressman to the building Fostmaster John P. Howe will preside at the ceremony.

Foundation and sub-floor work of the building have been completed, with construction of the walls ready to be carried forward. The cornerstone laying will mark the "coming which, including lot and fixtures, will cost the government \$100,000.

Residents Flee From Lowlands; River Down at Waco

HEARNE. Sept. 29. (AP)-The flooding Brazos and Little rivers continued to destroy millions of dollars worth of crops and property today but there was no loss of life reported as the lowland residents heeded warnings to evacuate.

The Brazos is falling steadily at Waco. The crest is expected to reach here today, and spread over farmng lands. The Little river is rising at Cameron but there is no danger to the city.

The Little river sprawled out over housands of acres of farm land and ts crest was moving slowly through lower Milam county on its worst flood in recent years.

The Leon, which pours into the Little, was receding but three separate rises were reported coming down the river from its upper wat-ershed. The Lampasas, second principal tributary to the Little was falling at Belton. The crest of the Little river is

expected at Cameron at midnight or soon thereafter. The Little joins the Brazos east of there. A dozen streams in West Texas

were on their second flood in ten days, and lowland residents were evacuating their homes. Four were dead, refugees numbered thousands and damage soar-

'Impeachment' Talk

AUSTN, Sept. 29. (AP)-The Texas house voted today, 80-48, to resolve itself into a committee of a whole to investigate the old age pension administration and to ascertain revenue needs for maintenance of the pension program.

The resolution was offered by Representative A. T. McKinney, Huntsville, who said that its primary purpose was to obtain facts to guide the legislature in levying pension

Representative Clarence Farmer, Fort Worth, supporting the resolution, charged the pension administration's "disregard" for the sec-tion of the law providing local pen-sion authorities to determine the amounts of the grants was "worthy of impeachment.

A house committee investigation over "rumored" communistic teaching in state colleges was proposed by Representative Joe Caldwell of Asherton.

Governor Allred said that many legislators had told him they favored his proposal that the pension fund borrow \$3,000,000 from the highway funds.

"I don't know where else we could get the prusion fund which we must have before the money starts coming in from the new tax program, he said. Eating is more important than
