ROME, Nov. 13 (P)-Premier Mussolini has decided to abolish all existing Italian courts of law, substituting state committees, and socializing the legal profession, of-

ficial sources disclosed today.

Attorneys described the project "one of the most important changes in the twentieth century jurisprudence.' Abolition is also planned for the



#### Latin America to Become A New Quinine Source

CHICAGO. (U.P.) - Discovery of a new source of quinine "near home" is expected to forestall scientific anxiety over a threatened shortage of the drug, according to Paul Standley, assistant curator of the Field Museum herbarium.

Specimens of Cinchona puboscens, the plant from which quinine is obtained, were found by Standley in a shipment of plants from the "wet forests" of San Ramon, Costa Rica

Heretofore it was believed that cinchona trees were to be found only in South America, and in the East Indies, where the trees were introduced at great difficutly and expense some years ago. The domestic supply for this country was obtained chiefly from the Indies. "It is of considerable scientific interest to find wild cinchona trees growing in South Central America," Standley says, "because of the ruthless manner in which wild cin-

chena trees were long exploited." Standley estimates that the propagation of this new source will supply the commercial quinine needs for several years.
