Midland Fans to Follow Bulldogs to Monahans Friday

GAME WILL START AT 3 O'CLOCK ON LOBO HOME FIELD

Local Team Favored To Beat Heavier Foemen

TEAM 'ON SPOT'

Must Win To Keep Unshared Place Atop League

Hundreds of Midland fans are expected to follow the Midland Bulldogs tomorrow afternoon as they invade Monahans for one of their toughest games of the season. The game is to start at 3 p. m.

The Bulldogs will be favored to win the game as they have escaped defeat so far while the Monahans club has suffered defeats in four games this season, three of them with conference foes. The Bulldogs hold victories over Wink and Pecos, two conference teams that have bested Monahans.

Comparisons between the two schools show that Midland tied Pecos (the club was awarded the game on first downs) while Monahans was defeated by the same club by one touchdown. Midland also defeated Wink by one touchdown and that club managed to best Monahans by two touchdowns.

The Monahans club is the heaviest and most experienced in the district and was a pre-season favorite to win championship honors this year. Internal dissension among team members is blamed more than anything else in their lowly standing. They have two of the outstanding backfield men in the conference in Hary and Ellithorpe and a line that will carry at least a seven-pound advantage per man over the Bulldogs.

Hundreds of visitors are expected to be on the sidelines as the Lobos and Bulldogs take the field giving their support to the Monahans club. Wink and Pecos both have a chance to end in a tie with Midland for top spot in the league if the Monahans club is able to defeat the Bulldogs and large delegations from both towns are expected to be on the sidelines cheering for a Monahans victory.

The Monahans starting line will average 171 and the starting backfield will average 162. The Midland line will average approximately 163 and the backfield 160.

FASCIST AERIAL ATTACK SPREADS DEATH IN MADRID

90 Estimated Dead In Bombings Of City Today

MADRID, Nov. 19. (U.P.)—Relentless Fascist aerial "punishment" spread new death and damage through Madrid today.

Early morning bombing claimed a toll of an estimated 90 dead and 200 injured. The bombings caused alarm at various embassies. Many Americans sought refuge in cellars.

However, despite the repeated raids, much of Madrid's frightened population followed their usual occupations, and the capital's junta refused to despair of the city's fate.

Government forces poured shells and bullets into the northwestern district of Madrid in an attempt to regain ground they had lost, as some official sources estimated 300 were killed in Tuesday's air and artillery attacks by besieging Fascists.

MEMBERSHIPS IN RED CROSS HERE NEAR 1,000 MARK

Approximately 775 Persons Already Signed Up

Possibility that the Midland district of the Red Cross, which includes Ector county, will yield 1,000 memberships during the present roll call was voiced today by W. I. Pratt, roll call chairman. The campaign already has exceeded any previous year.

In the two days in which the campaign was conducted here by a group of approximately fifty women, more than \$800 was paid in, representing approximately 775 memberships. Of each membership, only fifty cents is sent to Red Cross headquarters, the remainder being retained for distress or relief emergencies.

The workers reported that approximately fifty additional memberships are pending here and should be in within a few days.

The roll call to be conducted at Odessa, under direction of Mrs. Paul Moss, was expected by Pratt to bring the total for the district to at least 1,000 memberships. The highest total at Midland in former years was 602 memberships.

CATTLE MARKET IN MIDLAND ACTIVE; MANY SALES MADE

Several Thousands Sold to Buyers Recently

YEAR'S RECORD

Shipments Largest Of Any Season To Date

Buyers from the west still have maintained the most active cattle market at Midland, with numerous purchases and shipments made during the past few days.

Billy Connell of El Paso, buying for Pasadena, Calif., cattlemen, received from Frank Cowden's Midland and Odessa ranches approximately 600 head of steer and heifer calves yesterday. He also bought from A. E. Estes 73 head of choice steer calves, averaging in weight 465 pounds at the local pens yesterday.

E. B. Dickenson sold to Connell, for a west coast ranchman, fifteen head of pure bred Hereford bull calves. A week earlier Dickenson had sold two truck loads to a Larado rancher and will send another load there next week. He is sending a truck load to the Foster ranch near Sterling City today. Dickenson said they were selling at "satisfactory old time prices."

Giles Connell bought from W. A. Hutchinson 400 head of steer yearlings, to go to pastures in the Gail section.

Hugh Christian, California buyer, bought from F. F. Elkin a load and over of steer and heifer calves yesterday. He also bought from Beall of Colorado two loads of heifer calves from the Bob Preston pasture near here.

Art Shaffer of Tucson bought two loads of steer yearlings from Foy and Leonard Proctor.

Sam Rayburn of Los Angeles, who comes here periodically to buy cattle, is reported to have made numerous purchases during the past few days, with shipments scheduled late this week.

Foy Proctor has received from ranchers of this section approximately 5,000 head of calves, many of them being shipped north and others being pastured at his Hall place south of Midland.

Earl Ray, official weigher at the stock pens, said more cattle had been shipped during the past twenty days than in any season of the past year.

A continuous stream of visitors knocks at the White House door when President Roosevelt is in residence. The lucky few admitted leave hats and coats at the door and go to the executive offices.

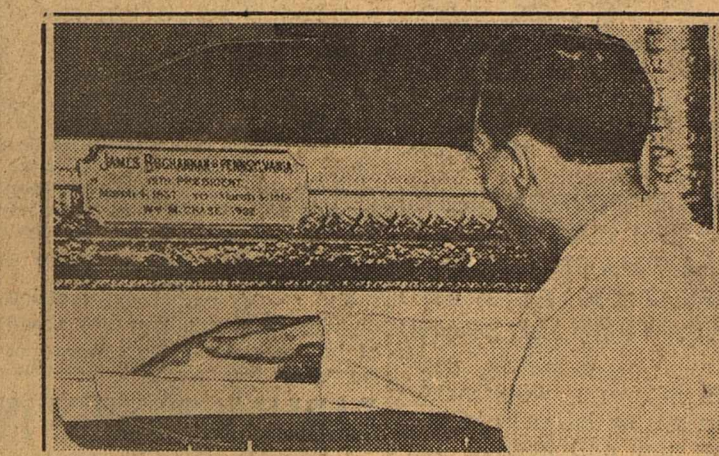


Behind the scenes, Head Usher Raymond T. Muir, to keep the President up with news developments, latest editions are rushed to his desk.

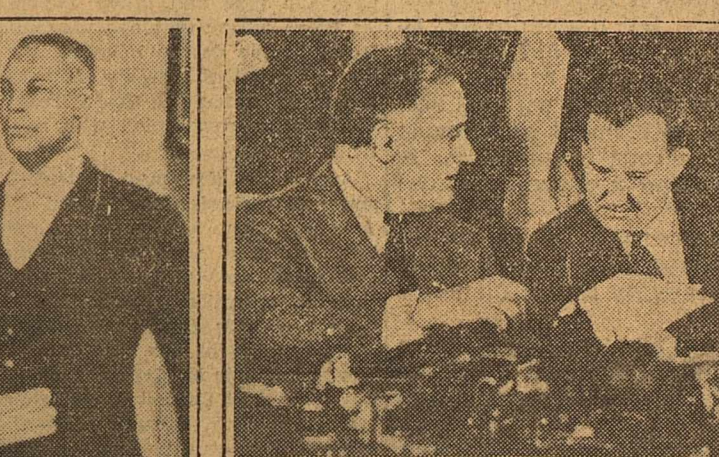

COUNTRY ORDERED TO SPEED ALL WORK ON PLANES, SHIPS

Complications Rise From Movements Of Premier

SOVIET CHARGE

Says Impossible To Engage In Arms Race Now

By Associated Press Premier Mussolini today ordered Italy to speed up its building of warships and airplanes "in a special moment," meaning the Spanish civil war.

European complications are possible from the action taken by the Italian dictator and Adolf Hitler, German dictator, in their recognizing the existence of the insurgent Fascist "government" in Spain.

Russia said that it was "hardly possible" to engage in an arms race to Spain with Germany and Italy, repeating charges that the Fascist powers had started the revolution and had extended aid to the insurgents.

Great Britain and France said they intended to push the neutrality efforts as France had trouble of its own with reverberations from the suicide of Minister of Interior Roger Salengro, who wrote he was "driven" to his death by Rightist foes.

England told insurgent leaders they would stand for no interference in their Mediterranean shipping.

GAUGE FLOW OF 14 BARRELS AN HOUR IN COCHRAN

Duggan Pool Opener On Test Through Tubing

The first three hours on test after running tubing Honolulu, Cascade and Devonian No. 1 E. B. Duggan, discovery well in Cochran county and the most northerly producer in West Texas, flowed 42 barrels of oil. Gas volume was not reported. The Cochran well was shot several weeks ago with 160 quarts from 5,019 to 5,060, eight feet up from the plugged-back total depth, and gauged 115 barrels on a preliminary test, before cleaning out and tubing. Operators succeeded in cleaning out to the bottom of the shot-hole before running the string of tubing.

Undoubtedly one of the most important discoveries in this region in some time the No. 1 Dugan brought back to the northern part of the Basin much of the interest it had lost when the Bahan & Rhodes and Fitzpatrick No. 1 Henard and the Roosevelt and Stronger No. 1 Coggins, both in Yoakum county, were abandoned as failures. It is located in the southeastern part of the county, in the center of about 13 league 55, Oidham county school land.

Uscan and Illinois No. 1 Brownfield, Terry county wildcat, is under-reaming 7-inch casing, with total depth at 4,670 feet in salt. Operators could not confirm a rumor that the test had struck gas at around 4,758 feet. Location of the No. 1 Brownfield is in section 54, block K, public school land.

Water Decreasing

The Seminole discovery in Gaines county, Amerada No. 1-A Averitt, continued to flow today through 1-inch bottom choke on tubing, and a steady decrease in the amount of drilling-water it was cutting indicated that the flow was gradually clearing up. On the last nine hours of gauging, the well flowed 23 barrels of oil and 7 barrels of basic sediment and water, with average gas volume of 6,140,000 cubic feet. Reports from Seminole were that it would probably be acidized tonight or tomorrow. Total depth of the new pool opener is 5,022 feet in lime. It is located 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 228, block G, W. T. R. survey. Farther south in Gaines, Stanton No. 1 J. A. Morrow, wildcat. See (OIL NEWS) Page 6

Both ankles were fractured, there was a deep cut in the back of the head, a broken shoulder and internal injuries disclosed on the woman by an examination.

L. D. Williams, Goliad, said that the body was lying in the road and that his car passed over it without touching it. No blood on the car caused officers to believe that the woman was killed elsewhere and tossed out of the automobile.

## EARLY VENTURES IN PROCESSING RAW MATERIALS IN STATE ARE REVIEWED

Earliest of the larger ventures in processing Texas raw materials were the hide and tallow factories which sprung up along the Gulf coast in the decade following the close of the Civil War, for this was the period when the South Texas Plains were overrun with cattle.

Apparently the most extensive group of packeries was located on Arkansas Bay at Rockport and Fulton; others were scattered up and down the coast. There were three in operation at one time at Corpus Christi; there were others at the mouth of the Rio Grande, serving markets in Mexico. Another was located at Galveston, while on Matagorda Bay, Shanghai packery operated his own packery as did King and Kennedy on their vast holdings south of the Nueces. King and Kennedy during this period are said to have produced their own salt from salt lakes on their ranch lands.

In this period prior to the introduction of commercial refrigeration hides and tallow were the chief products of these enterprises; in some cases the hindquarters were salted down and in others pickled beef was packed in barrels. Certainly thousands and thousands of cattle were slaughtered for hides and tallow alone; at one time a flourishing "bone" mill on Aransas Bay was making a high grade fertilizer from the refuse and which was marketed along the Atlantic Seaboard.

In the later 1870's the hide and tallow period was brought to an abrupt close; the great herds of buffalo were being cleared from the Western Plains, and for a decade and more millions of Texas cattle in great trail herds were driven northward to rail-heads in Kansas and beyond to the northern ranges of the Western Plains.

Trail driving out of Texas was in turn brought to a close with the coming of railroads into the State. With the growth of commercial centers and the extension of railroads westward into the cattle country during the 1880's, local packing concerns were established in the larger places. According to Frank Hastings in his "A Ranchman's Recollections," there was a packinghouse at Denison as early as 1874 or 1875. Also according to Hastings "the first application (of ice) to the packing industry (in the United States) seems to have been at Denison, Texas." In 1884 a small packing plant was built in Fort Worth; in 1890 the Fort Worth Union Stockyards were opened. During the 1890's the packing business at Fort Worth expanded beyond plant capacity; additions were made and by the turn of the century plans were being laid for the development of branch packing plants in Fort Worth. In the early years of the present century both Swift and Armour built plants in Fort Worth and by 1903 both of those plants were operating other packing concerns grew up in the larger Texas cities, some of which have since been acquired by Swift and company. In recent years there has developed a movement looking towards the development of a meat packing industry on the Gulf Coast to take advantage particularly of the low-cost water transportation to markets on the Eastern Seaboard. An Associated Press dispatch, of November 5, 1936, carries the statement that contracts are to be let soon on a new Swift & company meat packing plant at Lake Charles, Louisiana.

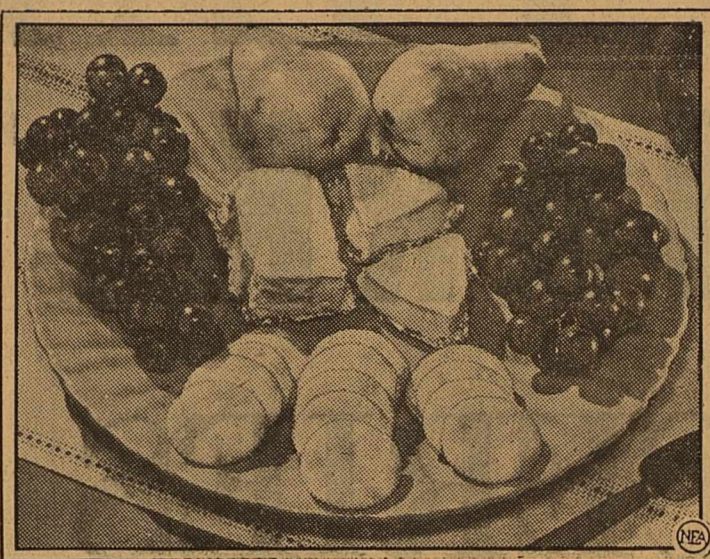
This play was first presented by Norman Bell Geddes at the Belasco Theater in New York in October, 1935, and is now in its thirteenth month.

## Mince Meat Bread Takes the Cake



Mince meat bread, grapes, Liederkranz and Camembert cheese, fresh pearls—that's a seasonal dessert for any family gathering.

### By NEA Service

Mince meat bread, in thin slices and a platter of Camembert and Liederkranz cheese, garnished with the last of this season's grapes and a few autumn pears, makes a Sunday dinner dessert of surprising novelty.

### Mince Meat Bread

For 2 loaves of bread, use 2 cups pastry flour; 1 cup whole wheat flour; 3-4 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons tartrate baking powder; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 egg, slightly beaten; 1 cup mince meat moistened with 1-2 cup water; or equal amount of moist mince meat.

First break mince meat into pieces, add cold water and stir over heat until all lumps disappear. Bring to boil, boil 3 minutes until practically dry. Cool. Sift pastry flour once, measure. Add baking powder and salt and sift again. Then sift in the whole wheat flour. To this mixture, add slightly beaten egg and milk, mixed; then beat vigorously. Fold in mince meat. Grease two 4 by 8 by 3 inch loaf pans, line with greased waxed paper. Pour in the bread dough. Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven. Cool several hours before slicing.

### Veal and Green Peppers

Veal and green peppers, spiced and jellied, is perfect for Sunday night supper. Use 2 pounds of the cheaper cuts of veal. Place in large pot, cover with cold water, add salt and pepper, and 1-2 tablespoon mixed spices. Boil gently until tender, drain, shred the meat. Save the broth.

Dissolve 1 package granulated gelatin in 1 cup cold water. Then add 3 cups hot veal broth. Season with more salt and pepper if necessary. Cool. Line a salad mold with thin slices of green pepper, then add a little broth. When it begins to set, add a layer of shredded veal and a little gelatin mixture; then a layer of peppers, then of broth, veal, broth, peppers, finishing off with broth. Chill until firm. Serve with mayonnaise, lightened with equal quantity of whipped

cream. Season with salt, paprika and a judicious amount of freshly grated horseradish, soaked for 1 hour in a little vinegar.

### Pipe Recovered At 2000-Foot Depth

POUCA CITY, Okla., Nov. 18.—Recovery of several thousand feet of pipe from a test oil well at a depth of more than two miles, thus establishing a world's record for such operations, was announced here today by Continental Oil company officials, who explained that this extraordinary feat was performed at Conoco's Herbert No. 1 well at Abbeville Prospect, Louisiana.

Drill pipe three inches in diameter was employed in the Herbert well. With one exception this well is the deepest ever drilled, descending to a depth of 11,732 feet below the earth's surface. Recovery of the pipe, however, only proved feasible to a depth of 10,907 feet. The deepest well in the world, a dry hole located in Upton county, West Texas, was drilled to 12,786 feet.

Recovery of pipe at such depths was not the only world's record shattered during the operation, Conoco officials state. Recapture of 3,658 feet of pipe at a depth of 7,610 feet in a single trip outdistances all previous performances in this type of work. Nearest comparable effort in oil history was recovery of 4,018 feet of two inch tubing in a single trip.

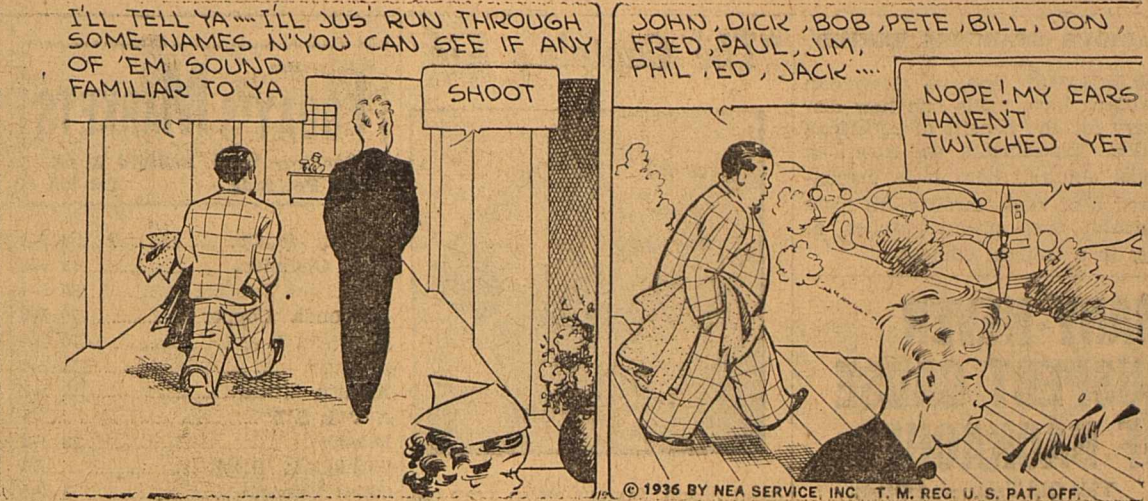
The entire recovery job was performed within a period of nine days, officials said, and represented a considerable saving to the company since none of the recaptured pipe was in any way injured.
