France, Britain, Belgium In Pact Insurgent Planes Bomb Madrid Outskirts Today

LOYALISTS CLAIM BACK OF OFFENSE OF REBELS BROKEN

No Attempts Made To Bomb Center Of City

PLAN ATTACK

Socialists to Make Drive, Halt The Rebel Siege

MADRID, Nov. 30 (P)—Insurgent planes raided the capital twice today, bombing government lines in the university section, along the Manzanares river. The Fascist fliers then wheeled back of their base without attempting to bomb the city's center.

Failure to take advantage of "perfect bombing weather" and attack the heart of Madrid was pointed out as an indication that the lack of the insurgent offense has been broken.

Optimism is being felt throughout the capital. Informed circles said that the government is considering turning the defense into an attack, thereby ending the city's siege.

Blue-jacketed militiamen of Madrid's loyalists defenders swept across muddy fields north of Madrid in great waves Sunday in two suicidal attacks on the extreme flank positions of the rebels.

Battered Moroccan regulars and Foreign Legionnaires crouching behind machine guns in shallow trenches held their ground and mowed down the counterattacking Reds by the scores.

At the same time Gen. Francisco Franco's flying columns, taking advantage of the loyalists' disorganized retreat, drove through suburban streets and toward the Cuatro Caminos, strategically important and heavily fortified point near University City.

The loyalists' first counteroffensive was launched against the village of Valdemoro, on the insurgents' right flank, and the second against the rebel trenches that bulwark the left flank of the Case de Compo sector.

SOUTH AMERICAN REVOLT HALTED

29 Killed, 69 Hurt As The Ecuador Government Withstands Mobs

QUITO, Ecuador, Nov. 30 (P)—It was officially announced Sunday that 29 persons were killed and 69 wounded in the unsuccessful revolt of a regiment in the Ecuadorian army Saturday.

Many persons were arrested in the uprising including Pedro Velasco Ibarra, brother of former President Velasco Ibarra, and several unidentified foreigners. The daily newspaper "El Dia" was closed and its director, Ricardo Jaramillo, was imprisoned.

It was officially announced the revolt of a section of the regiment "Calderon" was suppressed after four hours' fighting which broke out when the military high command weakened the unity of the regiment in order to frustrate what the government believed was a plot for a rebellion this week.

The insurgent soldiers sent emissaries seeking support of other battalions in the garrison city, but they were answered with shots from fifty civilians as well as other military units.

The insurgents were surrounded and the uprising finally put down. Director Frederico Paz issued a statement Sunday declaring the revolt entirely suppressed and promising "energetic punishment" for the bad Ecuadorians who participated.

ALLEN TOLBERT TO TAKE POSTMASTER JOB HERE TUESDAY

John P. Howe Will 'Check Out' As Term Ends

SERVED 4 YEARS

Postal Receipts Of Office Showing Large Gains

Postmaster John P. Howe will "check out" and Postmaster Allen Tolbert will be sworn in Tuesday morning, official appointment as acting postmaster having come to the latter from the postmaster general's office. Final appointment, or confirmation, as postmaster should come forward at the next session of congress after action of the senate.

Tolbert was advised recently by Congressman R. E. Thomson that he had been recommended for the post from the three on the eligible list, making the highest civil service grade with consideration of military service.

Tolbert, for some time connected with the Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., lumber, and prior to that in the hardware business and with the First National bank, has lived in Midland practically all of his life.

John P. Howe was appointed postmaster under the Hoover administration, taking the office August 8, 1932. During his tenure of office, the postal receipts here have grown steadily until the first eleven months of this year has seen a total far over any previous twelve months period in the history of the office.

Howe said today that the Midland postoffice is sure to be made a first class office at the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1, as receipts have exceeded the required total. He expressed congratulations to Tolbert upon his appointment. The postoffice will move to the new federal building early in the year, the edifice having been practically completed on the exterior, with interior finishing well under way.

The retiring postmaster, part owner of a plumbing business here, said he had not decided definitely to what he will devote his time after leaving the office.

"I have several irons in the fire which I will consider before making an announcement," he said.

AMERADA STRIKE IS RE-ACIDIZING

No. 1-A Averitt Flows 192 Barrels In Last 24 Hours

BY FRANK GARDNER Amerada No. 1-A Averitt is being re-acidized today with 1,000 gallons after flowing 192 barrels of oil, one percent basic sediment and no water, in 24 hours ending at 7 o'clock this morning. Gas volume averaged 195,000 cubic feet, and flow was through 1-inch choke on 2 1/2-inch tubing, with packer at 5,066.

The previous 24-hour period, the well had flowed 190 barrels, one percent basic sediment and water. It was treated late last week with 1,000 gallons, averaging 10 barrels of oil hourly for five hours after cleaning itself, and later settling to 8 barrels an hour. Total depth of the Seminole discovery is 5,029 feet. It opens the second producing area in Gaines county and is located 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 223, block G. W. T. R. R. survey.

Farther south, Stanolind No. 1 J. A. Morrow, wildcat in section 20, block A-24, public school land, attracted attention today when it was reported that it had threatened to blow out when an undetermined amount of gas was struck at 3,030 in the lower Yates section. It is drilling ahead below 3,060 feet in anhydrite.

Amerada No. 1 Robbins, over a mile south of the Landreth No. 1 Kirk in Gaines, is waiting on 6 5/8 inch drill-pipe at 340. Operators will set approximately 400 feet of 10 3/4-inch surface casing. The test is located 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 9, block A-22, public school land.

TO CONTINUE HUNT FOR MISSING PAIR NEAR SAN PERLITA

Searchers Pledged To Discover Two Bodies

RAYMONDVILLE, Nov. 30 (P)—Sheriff Howard Cragg, Willacy county, led posses of rangers and officers and citizens into the King ranch today in renewed search for Luther and John Blanton, missing hunters. Possibilities of a connection between the Blanton mystery and the murder Saturday of Fernando Ramirez, hunting guide, were erased when a man held in jail here confessed the killing.

SAN PERLITA, Texas, Nov. 30. (P)—Determined South Texans laid plans Sunday to search again over the tractless ranchlands of the lower Rio Grande Valley for Luther and John Blanton, who vanished Nov. 13.

Fifty mounted men who returned Saturday from a fruitless hunt for the Yturria ranch planned to try again Monday. They are pledged to continue searching until the bodies are found.

Once before San Perlita residents grew impatient at the failure of officers to solve the mystery and threatened an armed invasion of the million-acre King ranch, where the Blantons last were seen. Rangers gave them permission to enter the vast cattle domain but they found the brush covered ranges unproductive.

Meanwhile at Brownsville, San Diego Suarez, Mexican Consul, tried to solve the disappearance of two Mexicans in the same vicinity last Feb. 18. He asked officials at Villa Juarez, Mexico, to help him find Guadalupe Salinas Garza, reported seen with Jesus Rivera and Reyes Ramirez about the time they vanished. Suarez said he believed Garza could aid in the investigation. He previously had asked Texas rangers investigating the Blanton case to extend their search to include the other missing men.

The search for the Blantons shifted to the Yturria property after repeated attempts to find clues on the King ranch failed. Deputy Sheriff Bob Miller, spokesman for the latest posses, said the villagers will not quit until "we get results."

THOMPSON BACKS STATE'S RIGHT TO HIKE ALLOWABLE

Market Demand For Output, He Tells Other States

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 30 (P)—Col. E. O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, said after the preliminary interstate oil compact commission meeting today there would be no break between six oil producing states because Texas has increased its allowable 56,000 barrels daily over the federal bureau of mines recommendation.

Thompson said that Texas had a legitimate demand and it would not be fair to her own operators to deprive them of the market, and that Texas had no objection to other states increasing their allowables under the same circumstances.

Eden Opposes Idea Of Dividing World Into Camps

LEAGUE FEARFUL

Russia Disclaims Need of Foreign Allies

France, Great Britain and Belgium have formed what virtually amounts to military accord, informed Paris sources said today, interpreting the pact as signalling a new western European alliance.

While it was reported that French Foreign Minister Delbos will announce the accord Friday, returning Britain's assurance that the powers will come to each other's aid to repel unprovoked aggression, a statement by Foreign Minister Eden of England saying his country was opposed to dividing the world into conflicting camps dampened French hopes.

League of Nations circles expressed fear Spain's appeal to the council against the Fascist central European powers, Germany and Italy, will further embroil the international situation.

Russia disclaimed the need of foreign aid. President Molotov of the Soviet council made the statement after an announcement that Russia's air strength would soon reach at least 100,000 pilots in answer to Germany's claim of 70,000 fliers.

Communist attacks against the government have brought a crisis in France.
