# CHINESE LEADERS TO HEAR TERMS OF

KAI-SHEK CAPTOR Officials Called In To Arbitrate Release

### **GENERAL ALIVE**

Envoy of Chang Now Enroute to Talk With Group

NANKING, Dec. 18. (A) -Chinese government officials were called into ssion today to hear terms of Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, kidnaper of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, dictated to end civil war.

General Chiang Ting-Wen, who had been held captive since the start of the rebellion was freed by Chang to confer with the government in negotiations for the release of Kai-Shek.

Loyal divisions were reported steadily driving the rebel troops back on Sianfu, over which government planes were flying in awesome demonstrations. It is in Sianfu that the government asserts the generalissimo is held captive, with several of his generals, by the rebel 'Young Marshal."

Deep interest centered, however, in the closely guarded conferences at Nanking, where James Elder, British adviser to Marshal Chang, was closeted with Madame Chiang, Kai-Shek, her brother-in-law, Dr H. H. Kung, minister of finance and temporary head of the government, and her brother, T. V. Soong, exminister of finance and high in government councils.
