## Hope Stirred for Plane Crash Victims

### Military Operations Ordered Against Marshal

#### RELEASE OF CHANG IMMEDIATELY IS ORDER OF LEADERS

Headquarters of The Rebel General To Be Attacked

#### GRACE TERM UP

Three-Day Period In Which to Release Shek Canceled

NANKING, Dec. 19 (P)—The Nanking government tonight ordered punitive military operations against rebellious Marshal Chang Hsueh Liang's headquarters to open tomorrow unless Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is released.

Officials earlier had awarded Chang three days more of grace in which to end the rebellion and release Chiang. Chinese officials said the action was taken after receipt of a letter signed by the generalissimo himself saying he might "be back in Nanking Saturday."

The official (Chinese) Central news agency published what it asserted was the text of the generalissimo's letter, in which he asked cessation of infantry and air attacks on the Shensi rebels who hold him prisoner with several of his ranking generals.

The letter, the agency said, was brought to Nanking by General Chiang Ting-wen, one of the generalissimo's trusted lieutenants, addressed to Gen. Ho Ying-chin, minister of war. Chiang Ting-wen, captured at Sianfu with his chief, was freed by Marshal Chang to permit him to communicate with the government leaders.

#### Many Needy To Go Unremembered If Action Not Taken

Several religious and service organizations as well as numerous individuals have adopted families to whom they will present Christmas baskets, but many more will have to take immediate action if all of the families are to be cared for.

Organization or individuals who desire to be of service to their unfortunate fellowmen at Christmas time by presenting Christmas baskets are requested to call at the chamber of commerce office in the Scharbauer Hotel to select the families to whom they will be an alias Santa Claus. Quick action on the part of local citizens is urged by the members of the welfare committee of the chamber of commerce. Do your part now.

#### New Restrictions On Necessities Are Announced

BERLIN, Dec. 19. (P)—Germany today faced the gravest shortage of food in years. Money and food were so near depletion that officials expressed fear they would be unable to find an adequate solution to the crisis expected by the April stringencies imposed on German householders in preserving dwindling food supplies disclosed yesterday by the issuance of ration cards for butter and lard.

The new orders prorated fats in accordance to the size of the families. All purchases will be limited to 80 percent of the October consumption, monthly, starting January 1.

#### TOWNSEND, AIDES MUST FACE TRIAL DURING JANUARY

Imprisonment Seen As Possibility By Attorney

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (P)—United States Attorney Leslie C. Garnett today arranged to bring Dr. Francis E. Townsend, co-founder of the Townsend old age pension plan, and two aides to trial in January on charges of contempt preferred by the House of Representatives.

Townsend posted \$1,000 bond in Los Angeles.

Garnett said the trio was liable to fines of \$1,000 each and one year imprisonment.

Townsend appeared before U. S. Commissioner David B. Healy posted cash bond and said he had not surrendered sooner because he wanted to know officially that the warrant had arrived from Washington.

The founder of the old age pension movement bearing his name declared: "I'll never pay a fine. If they convict me in Washington I'll go to jail. They can't give me much more than 30 days and I need a good rest. I can get it then and at the same time do a lot of work."

#### RAILROADS HEAR RATE PETITION GIVEN REFUSAL

Emergency Rates On Roads to Expire January 1

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (P)—The Interstate Commerce Commission today refused a petition to class one railroads to extend beyond December 31 emergency freight surcharges expiring then.

The roads asked the continuance, claiming the loss of \$10,000,000 monthly in revenue would harm their financial structure.

The commission said that an "unmistakable conclusion from these figures is that the emergency we undertook to meet in our original decision does not longer exist."

#### SIGNIFICANCE OF HUMBLE 1 COWDEN AS CUMMINS-GOLDSMITH LINK IS SEEN

Possible Pool-Connector Flows 35 Barrels Hourly After Second Acidization

The significance of Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Cowden as a possible link between the Goldsmith and Cummins pools in Ector county was further demonstrated at the end of the week when the well flowed 35 barrels of oil hourly on a short test after the second acidization. It was re-treated with 2,000 gallons under a 60-barrel flush load, and, when swabbed in, flowed 200 barrels the first three hours, then averaged 35 barrels an hour for the next six hours. Operators have shut the well in because of insufficient storage.

No. 1 Cowden, which had failed to flow when tubing was run following 300 quart shot from 4,185 to 4,275, the total depth, flowed 145 barrels in two hours after an initial acid treatment with 1,000 gallons. It found its best pay in lime from 4,237-75 after showing only a slight amount of gas when drilled. It is located 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west line of section 30, block 44, township 1 north, T. & P. survey, two miles and a half northwest of production in the north end of the Goldsmith pool and a mile and a half southeast of the Cummins producers.

Three-quarters of a mile farther north, American-Maraicao No. 1 Scharbauer, 440 feet from the south and west lines of section 19, block 44, township 1 north, is drilling lime at 3,965 feet, no shows reported.

In section 31, a mile southeast of the Humble producer, T. F. International Petroleum Corporation is standing with 7-inch casing cemented at 4,120. Total depth is 4,165, with a showing of gas reported at 4,095.

Shasta Oil Company No. 1 Scharbauer, a test in section 29 in that area, is rigging up standard tools. Present total depth is 4,147, and 7-inch casing was set at 4,116. The well showed oil and gas on a drillstem test from 4,116-47, with top of the pay logged in cores at 4,137. International Petroleum Corporation of Fort Worth has staked location for the No. 2 Elliott F. Cowden in the Harper pool of Ector. Operations will start shortly after the first of the year on the well, which is located 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 38, block 44, township 2 south, T. & P. survey, offsetting Shell No. 1 Cowden to the southeast. Surface elevation at the new location is 3,042.

Dawson Discovery Well Pumping tests this week definitely placed Ray Albaugh et al No. 1 Robinson, northwest Dawson county well, in the list of pool openers of 1936. At the end of 2 hours of continuous pumping it was showing production of from 4 1/2 to 5 barrels of pipe-line oil per hour. With 494.90 barrels of storage in the tank, it was shut down until after Jan. 1, at which time more storage will probably be erected. The well is bottomed at 5,038 in lime. It was acidized without results when at a shallower depth but found the main pay when deepened. The discovery well is located in the center of the northwest quarter of section 46, block M, E. L. R. R. survey.

W. L. Pickens et al No. 1 Lewright, southeast Terry county wildcat 14 miles northwest of the Albaugh strike, is reported drilling with rotary after setting surface pipe. It was spudded several weeks ago with water well machine, then shut down until C. J. Davidson Drig. Co. moved rotary equipment from the Shasta No. 1 Scharbauer in Ector county. The Pickens test is 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 1, block C-37, public school land, on a "trend" play from the Albaugh well.

In southeast Hockley county, the Texas Company No. 1 Boh Slaughter, labour 83, league 38, Zavalla county school land, is drilling with spiral tools at 3,755 feet in anhydrite.

North Ward Strike Finley & Cherry No. 1 Sealey Estate, much-discussed well in northern Ward county, is standing after cementing 400 feet of 5-inch liner at 3,070. Liner was set to shut off sulphur water indicated by Schlumberger electrical survey as coming from above 3,050. The well had been following 190 barrels of sulphur water daily, with an occasional slug of oil showing up in the flow. It carried several sections showing porosity, logging its best showing near bottom at 3,203. The well is four miles west of the O'Brien pool, in the northeast corner of section 54, block F, G. & M. M. B. & A. survey.

As a result of the Finley & Cherry well's performance, D. C. De Vito, Midland operator, and associates, have announced that they will drill a test across the county line in Winkler, a mile and a half to the northeast. De Vito acquired all of sections 49, 51 and 52 and the south 370 acres of section 50. The new well has been tentatively located in the southwest quarter of section 50 and will be started shortly after Jan. 1.

In the O'Brien pool, Gulf No. 62 Hutchins, which flowed 65 barrels in six hours, natural, was increased by nitro shot to 130 barrels in 24 hours. Total depth is 2,752 feet in hard sandy lime, and it was "bumped" with 480 quarts from 2,510 to bottom.

Merry Bros. & Perini No. 1 Hathaway in the Estes pool of South Ward flowed 3,374 barrels on 24-hour gauge through 1 1/2-inch choke on 2-inch tubing, bottomed at 2,615 feet. It was shot with 220 quarts. First oil came in at 2,510.

#### FAINT MESSAGES ARE PICKED UP BY RADIO OPERATOR

Weak Voice Heard As Search Pressed For Seven

#### 2500 IN SEARCH Radio Man Known To Be Aboard The Ship

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 19. (P)—Faint radio messages—an indistinct sound of a man's weak voice—were picked up repeatedly today by searchers for a Western Air Express plane lost with seven persons.

The calls were received clearest by the Transcontinental and Western Air station at Kingman, Arizona. A. E. Chalan of Western Air said Kingman was the only station able to distinguish where the unknown caller was trying to make contacts and said "it was just possible to hear the man's voice."

Western Air officials said checks showed reports the plane had been found were untrue.

Faint hope for recovery of the seven victims down in the plane was stirred by the message received at Kingman. "Are you there Salt Lake? Are you there St. George?" was heard by the operator at the Arizona town. The operator at Las Vegas, Nev., also heard dimly the messages.

It was believed that the radio aboard the plane might have been damaged when the ship went down but it was known there was a radio man, Henry Edwards of Minneapolis, aboard the plane. Chalan pointed out that there was no radio station at St. George but said that Edwards would probably not have known of this.

An estimated 2,500 men were searching for the occupants of the liner and two men that went down in another plane somewhere in the desolate mountainous area.

#### NEW POSTOFFICE HERE WILL OPEN FEBRUARY FIRST

Only Interior Work Remaining To Be Completed

With all outside work almost completed, officials Saturday expressed an opinion the new postoffice for Midland would be opened to the public by February 1.

Work on the foundation for the flag pole was completed Saturday afternoon, leaving only landscaping as the major work outside the building. Completion of the floors, walls, etc., remains to be done inside the building.

Most of the work in the basement of the building has been concluded with the exception of the laying of floors in some of the ante-rooms. These will not be laid until the space is needed by the department.

Laying of the tile floors in the lobby is to be started shortly after the first of the year, along with putting hardwood floors in the part used by employees of the office.

When completed the building will be one of the outstanding of its kind in West Texas. It is being built at a cost of \$58,000. Furnishings for the building are expected to cost several thousand more.

#### Postoffice to Open From 3 to 5 Today

Postmaster Allen Tolbert announced Saturday that the local postoffice will be open this afternoon from three until five o'clock to all persons desiring to claim packages. No packages will be received but all persons having packages in the office may receive them during those two hours.

#### Solidarity Action Before 21 Americas

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 19. (P)—A central American resolution for a declaration of solidarity among 21 American republics was laid before the Inter-American peace conference plenary session today.

The resolution was modified to meet Argentina's objections to the original draft under which "injury or aggression" from abroad would be considered "offense" to all American republics.

**Mrs. Lena Williams Goodman, A Club Woman, Authoress**

Few local women have a scrap book filled with as many interesting clippings about themselves and their work as does Mrs. Lena Williams Goodman, who is one of the most distinctive additions to the citizenry of Midland in the past year, moving to Midland from Lubbock a year ago in July with her husband, James H. Goodman, who has law offices in the Petroleum building.

Besides being a D. A. R. she is inherently a Texas woman, being a member of old and prominent Texas pioneer families. On her maternal side she is a descendent of General James Smith for whom Deaf Smith Co. is named and her paternal side a descendent of the Rieves, colonizers of Virginia and Texas.

She holds honorary degrees from Columbia College in Chicago, and the American Academy in New York.

This brief sketch of her background enables one to appreciate

to an extent the meaning of the clippings in her voluminous scrap book.

The following is a short resume of the most important items.

Mrs. Goodman began a career as the head of the dramatic department of Seth Ward College, Trinity University. After giving up this profession she still retained a deep interest in dramatic work, and in 1927 organized the Lubbock Little Theatre and was president of the organization for a number of years.

Some of the most interesting clippings deal with her work during the World War when she was enlisted as District Chairman of the National League for Woman's Service and served in the Canteen and Motor Corps service in Fort Worth.

There is no definite division between her Federated club work and journalism work, both of them being inter-related and partially responsible for the other.

The book is filled with miscellaneous clippings reporting Mrs. Goodman's appointment to various positions and duties with the Texas Federation of Woman's clubs, but some of the most prominent of these would be her appointment as chairman of the press and publicity for the seventh district, and a prize for being the best chairman, and also her recent invitation by the society of "Who's Who Among American Women." Several weeks ago she was named as historian for the sixth dist.

Her reputation as a club woman was indirectly responsible for her appointment to the Texas Democratic Executive Committee and with the added honor of being the only woman member. She was also sent as a delegate from Texas to the National Security League in Chicago and served as the woman director of the South Plain's Fair for several years. Other clippings vouch for the valuable and constructive work Mrs. Goodman has done as a member of the Texas Press Association and the Composers and Authors Association.

About four years ago, Mrs. Goodman became interested in journalism, deciding that if other members of her family were talented in the art of work-expression, it was probable that she had inherited a share of it herself.

She entered a journalism class at Texas Technological College in Lubbock and after a surprisingly short time, her articles were being accepted throughout the state by the leading papers and magazines. Having been exposed to the colorful stories of various lore-laden

kinfolks during the impressionistic period of her life, it was natural that Mrs. Goodman would pour out her accumulated knowledge of Texas folk lore and customs, and this has resulted in some of her finest compositions. A Texas magazine published an article on adobe by Mrs. Goodman this month which has caused favorable comment by press authorities.

This versatile lady also writes prose, and poetry, and amuses herself by writing excellent biographical sketches.

In fact, everything she turns her hand to can only be classed as excellent, and yet she says that she would never have stepped out of her domicile if she had not have been "pushed" into doing these things.

This woman, who a prominent Lubbock scribe aptly characterized as "sympathetic and charming" says that she prefers her domestic duties to her "extra-curricular" activities, and that although she enjoys them, they are incidental to the real interests in her life.
