## MID-TERM EXAMS SHOW GOOD GRADES

86.23 PER CENT PASS, EXEMPT AND DISTINCTION LIST OF 166

Reports of the mid-term examinations in our city schools show that 86.23 per cent of the entire number examined passed in all their work, a number of the high school passing in two or more studies in addition to this number, 40 of the high school were exempt, 18 in all their work and 22 in less than all and 166 of the number examined received honorable mention. In the high school, 149 were examined including those who were exempt in all or in part, 128 passing in all work, leaving only 21 to fail on the general average. This is an average of 85.83 per cent. In central ward, 96 were examined, and 79 passd, an average of 82.29 per cent. In south ward, 249 were examined and 219 passed, an average of 87.95 per cent. Of the number who took the examination, 166 won honorable mention. Of these, 36 were in the high school, 41 in central ward, and 89 in south ward. This number does not include the 40 in the high school who were exempt.

Below are given the names of those in the high school who were exempt in all subjects, the names of those in the high school who were exempt in less than all their work, and the distinction lists of the high school, central ward, and south ward, of those who took the examinations. The numbers after the names of the high school pupils indicate the number of courses in which they were exempt or examined, as the case may be. The






