





SIXTEEN REASONS Why The **TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE** Should be located at Midland

1. Q. Where is the City of Midland? Midland is the county seat of Midland County, situated on the main line of the Texas & Pacific Railroad midway between Fort Worth and El Paso, and midway between San Antonio and Amarillo.

2. Q. Is Midland a contestant for the location of the Texas Technological College? A. It most certainly is.

Q. What is the altitude of Mid-

A. About 2800 feet.

4. Q. What is the climate of Mid-

A. The winters are mild and pleasantly agreeable; the cool prevailing breezes in the summer make it a delightful place to reside-healthful and wholesome; the mean annual rainfall is about 21 inches.

5. Q. What is the chief industry or

A. Midland is nationally famous as a stock raising country and some of the finest registered herds in the world are located here. Thousands of cattle are annually shipped from this point, especially to northern and eastern feeders. Of late years agriculture has made amazing strides here and Midland is fast becoming one of the most prosperous farming communities in the

6. Q. What farm products are grown in and around Midland?

A. There are probably more crops adapted to the Midland Country with or without irrigation than to any other farming section in the United States, many of these are cotton, milo maize, kaffir corn, Indian corn, June corn, feterita, all the sorghums, alfalfa, Bermuda grass, wheat, oats, barley, cowpeas, pie melons, peanuts, sugar beets, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, sudan grass, clover, and forty other varieties of grass. Some of the truck crops are: watermelons, honey dew melons, cantaloupes, onions, tomatoes, and many kinds of fruit, including apples, pears, peaches, apricots, plums and strawberries. 7. Q. What additional stock raising

facilities has Midland?

A. High-grade draft horses and mules are raised here on a large and profitable scale. For years Midland has been famous for her polo ponies and some of the finest animals used on English and American professional teams have been raised here.

8. Q. What about the water supply?. A. Midland has an inexhaustible supply of pure water obtained at a depth averaging 70 feet.

9. Q. Is there sufficient water for irrigation purposes?

11. Q. Is Midland large enough to meet all the demands which the location here of the college would place upon it?

A. It most certainly is; the civic improvements and hotels, banks, and business institutions are still many years in advance of the needs of the city.

12. Q. Has Midland any locations which meet all the requirements of the enacting bill?

A. Midland has at least four excellent locations which meet all the terms required by the Locating Committee; all four of them adjoin or are adjacent to the city limits. They all have fine soil, adapted for experimental work in farming or stock husbandry, excellent terrain and are abundantly supplied with pure water.

13. Q. What feature has Midland to which none of the other contestants may make claim?


A. Midland is not only the hub of West Texas but it is the center of all the University lands owned by the State, about one million acres. By locating the college here all these lands would be greatly enhanced in value from which great financial gain would eventually pour for the benefit of the State and her educational institutions. If in serving West Texas the entire State and her educational institutions may also be served, what is more logical than doing this very thing?

14. Q. In what way would every citizen of the State benefit if the college were located at Midland?

A. We believe that the location of the college here will increase the value of every acre of University land in this section. If this land is sold at the increased value, as some of it most certainly will be, it will create an endowment fund for the benefit of all the State educational institutions that will lighten the school tax which every citizen in the State is now paying.

15. Q. Is the Midland territory immediately served by any State institution?

A. It is not. Midland is the center of that great portion of West Texas which is not considered directly connected with the State Normal at Alpine, West Texas Normal at Canyon City, Junior A. & M. at Stephenville, government experimental stations at Spur, Lubbock and Chilicothe, School of Mines at El Paso, and the Carlsbad Tubercular Sanitorium at San Angelo.





There are approximately one million acres of University lands surrounding Midland and Midland County. No other city or town endeavoring to secure the college can make this claim. The location of the college here would unquestionably enhance the value of these lands. would increase their present market value many times and it is the belief of the Midland people, especially the executive committee, that a great portion of these lands would find ready sale; the money secured in this way would create an endowment fund which would be directed to the advantage of all the State educational institutions. In this manner the school tax of which every citizen of the State bears his or her part, would be appreciably lightened.
