It interferes with the fishing, which is done from a narrow wharf aligning a small part of the harbor of the shipyard. It is true that we have caught many fine trout, plenty of fan fish, some halibut and several eels. Oysters are to be had for the finding and opening, but the easy way is to buy them at 50 cents per hundred. There are no promenades on all this shore line, which are covered with oyster shells. EXPLOSION CAUSES CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE

An explosion wrecked the dry room of the Middleton Tailor Shop here on last Monday morning at about 10:30 and caused damage estimated at \$300.

While opinions differ as to the cause of the detonation, it is thought that a short in a fan which had been placed in the dry room was responsible for the explosion.

The dry room was demolished and the plate glass front of the building that houses the Inman jewelry store and the Middleton Tailor shop was shattered into a thousand fragments. No one was injured but it is safe to say that many were rendered extremely nervous by the proximity of the exploding steam and gasoline vapors. The fire department was called out and almost before the fire whistle had ceased sounding they were on the job and giving efficient aid in suppressing the flames which sprang up.


