Midland has had no train from the east since Tuesday, while the prospects are that we will not have one for four or five days yet. No mail has come in from the east either, but it is hoped that we may get some by detour over the Southern Pacific sometime within the next 24 hours.

While the rains have been heaviest east, still all the west has been thoroughly soaked, and persons coming in or telephoning from all directions report almost torrential rains. The wash-outs east are the worst perhaps ever known before.

FROM N. Y. MARKET

The financial market experienced another week of extraordinary activty at mounting prices, regardless of national and international happenings which in normal times might have acted as deterrents to speculative enthusiasm, writes a New York correspondent to the Dallas News. The cor respondent continues:

Despite the extention of the cost strike and its effect upon industria production and the Genoa conference which is developing unexpected com plications, the stock market advanced to higher ground on the largest transactions of any similar period in al most three years. That the enormous turnover represented to a large degree the operations of professional nterests was generally conceded. It was also believed, however, that public participation figured to

greater extent than at any time since the boom markets of the world wan period. The bond market kept time with the

lively pace set by the stock list. New issues for the week exclusive of va rious minor underwritings approximated \$150,000,000, and total offerings for the current month already exceed those of March.

Money conditions were a greater factor in the advance than at any pre vious period of the movement. In the open market call loans were practi cally "pegged" at 3 1-2 per cent bu even this low rate was shaded in many private negotiations. Time funds for one to three months were obtainable at 4 per cent, although groted at 4 1-2 and bank acceptance and comercial paper rates relaxed. Aside from the coal strike gains were reported in many branches o business and manufacturing and forign trade prospects brightened Price schedules for iron and stee again were subjected to upward re rision. Decision of the United States Steel Corporation to build at a cost of \$15,000,000 a tube mill in the Gary district was regarded in trade circles as a significant development. The slight disturbance to international currency which followed announcement of the Russo-German pact was cited as strong proof that the foreign exchange market had reached the stage of stabilization. It is understood that barring unforeseen events the request of the European powers that American financial interests be represented on the interallied repara tions commission will be accepted.
