The President's Letter.

The text of President Harding's letter embodying his proposals for the settlement of the railroad strike 1922. follows:

"I am writing to convey to you the terms of agreement, as I understand them, upon which the railway managers and United Shop Craft Workers are to agree, preliminary to calling

"First. Railway managers and the validity of all decisions of the Railway Labor Board, and to faithfully carry out such decisions as contemplated by the law.

"Second. The carriers will withdraw all lawsuits growing out of the strike, and Railway Labor Board decisions which have been involved in the strike may be taken, in the exercise of recognized rights by either party, to the Railway Labor Board for rehearing.

"Third. All employes now on strike to be returned to work and to their former positions, with seniority and other rights unimpaired. The representatives of the organizations especially agree that there will be no discrimination by either party against the employes who did or did not strike.

Tell President Harding Old and New Men Must Be Protected in Strike Settlement.

NOT A MATTER OF CHOICE seriously discredit the Labor Board.

Faithful Employees Have Both Legal and Moral Rights to Seniority and Other Benefits.

New York .- The keynote of the reoly made by railway executives representing more than 180 Class I Railreads of the United States to the prop-, throw its rules and discredit its auesition of President Harding, that "all thority. strikers be returned to their work and their former positions with seniority and other rights unimpaired," lies in the last paragraph from their reply to the President as follows:

"It is submitted that the strik-ing former employees cannot be given preference to employees at present in the service without doing violence to overy principle of right and justice involved in this matter, and without the grossest breach of faith on the ment of the relinced to the men at part of the railroads to the men at present in their service.

"Under these circumstances, it becomes apparent that the railroads cannot consider any settlement of the present strike which does not provide protection in their present em-ployment both to the loyal employees who remained in the service and to the new employees entering it."

The executives had accepted the first two conditions proposed by the President, namely, that both employsuits growing out of the strike be quoted above, but also as follows:

Agree With the President

"The railroad executives and managers agree entirely with the President's statement in his letter that 'it is wholly unthinkable that the Railroad Labor Board can be made a useful agency of the Government in maintaining industrial peace in the railway service unless employers and workers are both prompt and unquestioning in their acceptance of its decisions.'





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
