REPAIRING RAVAGES OF WAR

How Co-Operative Societies Are Alding the Good Work in Devastated French Regions.

During the last year the co-operative movement in the devastated regions of France has made considerable progress; in fact, at the present time the greater part of reconstruction work is executed by such societies. Both the government and the population of the devastated localities have This was followed by the singing of found these methods of the greatest practical value. Furthermore, the government encourages their organization and development.

Since the beginning of 1919, 203 cooperative societies have been organized in the department of the Meurthetained important results. On December 81, 1920, urgent repairs had been made on approximately 12,000 buildings. The sums disbursed for these repairs amounted to 124,430,000 francs (\$24,-014,990 par), or 81 per cent of the total sum paid out for this purpose in the department. In 1920 the co-operative societies commenced the erection amounted to 20,250,000 francs (\$3,908,-250 par), or 95 per cent of the total.

CALLS FOR WAR ON RATS

Why the Pests Should Be Exterminated Is Shown by New York Business Association.

While the cost of living may have come down somewhat, the upkeep of rats hasn't. On the contrary, it has soared from a rate of \$1.80 per person per year to a trifle over \$7 per person, according to the last figures for the United States.

The amount covers only the feeding of the country's rats and does not make any allowance for losses by fire for which they are responsible. The fire prevention committee of the Building Managers and Owners' association is calling the attention of its members to the depredations of the rats, in a bulletin just issued, which

says "The upkeep of rats has gone up. A year or so ago some one figured that it costs us \$1.80 per person to feed the rats in the United States. Recent figures compiled by a British expert place this cost in the United States at \$750,000,000 a year, which is a trifle over \$7 per person. This is simply for food consumed and destroyed and has nothing whatever to do with the very

considerable fire loss they cause. "Needless to say, we are urged as an economic measure to exterminate the rats; also you will recall what Doctor Copeland had to say to us along this line last winter as pertaining to public health. Viewed from all angles, they are a menace."






