OUR WEEKLY FINANCIAL REVIEW

Week ending November 30, 1923 prepared for The Reporter by the First National Bank of St. Louis, Mo. The report on the consumption and distribution of cotton, as issued by the census bureau for the month of October, showing an increase in consumption, came as a surprise to the cotton trade, which, had expected the widely reported curtailment of mill operations to be reflected in consumption figures for the past month. The total consumption of cotton proper for the month is given as 541,825 bales as compared with a consumption of 533,744 bales in October, 1922. The October consumption of linters, however, dropped off 5,507 bales as compared with 1922, making the total consumption of American cotton during the month 4,298 bales less than October, 1922, when the consumption amounted to 575,462 bales. For the first three months of the present cotton year, which began in August, the consumption of cotton proper by mills was 1,517,281 (of which 1,443,382 bales were American cotton and 73,899 bales were Egyptian and other foreign cotton,) as compared with 1,554,137 bales consumed in the same period of 1922. Stocks of cotton in consuming establishments and in public storage and at compresses were considerably smaller this year on October 31st, in comparison with last year. Stocks in consuming establishments, public storage and at compresses this year amounted to 4,588,422 bales as against 5,669,064 bales on October 21, 1922.

SWEET BILL AIDS THOUSANDS Measure Passed at Close of Sixty-

Seventh Congress Benefits Many Afflicted Soldiers. The lives of nearly ten thousand

World war veterans will be saved, or at least prolouged, by the passage of the Sweet bill just at the close of the Sixty-seventh congress, according to American Legion officials. The United States veterans' bureau has highly commended the activity of the American Legion in bringing this bill to a vote at the eleventh hour, though National Commander Alvin Owsley was forced to get into the fight himself and, through his organization, insist on the passage of the act.

Countless veterans afflicted with some form of tuberculosis have left their homes and are now wanderers in Western states in hope of seeking out a cure for the disease. Many of these are destitute and the passage of the bill, which permits a greater leniency by the extension of the time in which disability resulting from service origin may be termed as entitling the veteran to compensation, is one of the beneficial results.

The provisions of the bill, affording more practical, beneficial protection for the veterans, are sweeping. Perhaps that feature which struck out of the former law the word "pulmonary" so that every veteran may come under the extent of the act, is the most farreaching. The previous law limited the veterans' bureau to a consideration of pulmonary cases alone, and no examination was required, but officers of ter showin' in football that they hev the bureau were permitted to use their medical knowledge in determining the approximate date when the affliction became active.

In another section of the law the ime for securing a certificate of disability has been extended to March 1, The former ruling terminated this period on August 9, 1922. These certificates are incontestable evidence of the service origin of the injury, except in cases of fraud, and holders may receive compensation and hospital care; or, if the veteran dies, death compensation.

More elastic rulings affecting disbarred veterans were included in the act. 





furnished by the county. Wisconsin has both team patrol and motor truck or tractor patrol. For the team patrol the patrolmen furnish a team and wagon, and the county furnishes a light blade grader, a road plane, a plow, a slip scraper, and other necessary small tools. On the motor patrols all equipment is furnished by the county. Sections cared for by team patrols average funds was the post at Paducah, which six and three-quarters mile, and the patrolment work from April 1st to December 1st for \$140-\$165 per

month. Between December 1st and April 1st patrolmen agree to work when requested, at a fixed price per hour. Motor truck and tractor patrols cost the counties on the average about \$110 per month each. The Wisconsin system is the result of investigations which the commission carried on in other States regarding satisfactory systems of road maintenance, and for practical methods of improving ordinary town roads which had heretofore been under the care of a township director with wide territory, limited time, and more limited money. Wisconsin's total mileage on all classes of highways is fields. 78,000. When the county maintenance work was commenced, 255 miles were concrete, 1,775 miles stone macadam, 15,670 gravel, and 60,300 miles earth. Under the county maintenance system, each county owns much of its own road maintaining equipment, and enjoys better roads with less expenditure of time and

USES OF THE NEW

FERTILIZER FORMULAS

Eleven standard high grade formulas for mixed fertilizers were adopted by a representative committee of experts last June, in the hope of simplifying fertilizer problems arising from the use of more than 150 different mixtures, none of which fills an important need which the committee thought cannot be filled by some one of the eleven formulas adopted. Following this action, Circular No. 31 has been issued by the division of chemistry, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, outlining suggested uses of the newly adopted formulas for crops. Growers of cotton, corn, rice, alfalfa, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, melons, onions, lettuce, cabbage, spinach, carrots, beets, peach trees and sugar cane are advised as to which formula is likely to succeed best on each of the various soils where these crops are likely to be grown. Suggestions as to the amount to be used are also given. This circular will be mailed without charge if request is made to B. Youngblood, director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas.





CONSPIRE TO BEAT WORLD IN TON LITTERS

The Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the Farm Bureau, supported by merchants, bankers and farmers, down in Denton County, Texas, set out last spring to beat the 1922 Indiana record of 3,040 lbs. of pork from one litter of pigs in six months. 
