H. G. Bedford Senior, known throughout West Texas as Uncle

at the Arlington Heights sanitarium in Fort Worth, having reach-
ed the age of 86 years. ed the age of 86 years.
He was one of the three original members of the Texas and
Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Convention still living, one of the Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Convention still living, one of the
others being Uncle Joe Graham of Lovington. Uncle Hilory at-
tended the first meeting of the organization at Graham, Texas. tended the first meeting of the organization at Graham, Texas.
Coming from Kentucky at the age
of ten years, he has spent most of
his life in West Texas. He founded
the town of Benjamin, County Seat
of Knox County, and was at one time
one of the wealthiest cattlemen of the CLEAN-UP CAMPANANJ one of the wealthiest cattlemen of the
country. He donated a section of land to twelve families whe the town of Benjamin.
In his day, he saw many Indian batstories.

cess and fame as a Christian preach-
er, and it was a common statement by

Uncle every day in his Christian life.

He is survived by a son and daugh-
ter who live in Midland, H. G. Bedter who live in Midland, H. G. Bed-
ford Junior and Mrs. George Ratliff,
both of whom were with him at the time of his death; and is also surviv-
ed by other sons and daughters, as
