



Address At Canyon

Haley Delivers

Haley, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Haley of Midland, is achieving fame both as a writer and as a speaker Recently when the Guenther Memorial Fountain was presented to the West Texas State Teachers College at Canyon, the following address was delivered by Haley:

Most of us and most of those with whom we come in contact are but ordinary folk. Yet it is the happy privilege of each of us to have, at some time, the association of unusual personalities, the association of men of unusual acumen, of extraordinary strength of character and purpose. We come to honor the memory of one such, to honor the memory of a real man.

I feel a peculiar fitness in recalling the fact that he was of different religious profession and of different birth to the most of us. Taken in connection with his life, these facts but serve to emphasize the universality of his character, but serve to set forth the strength of his personality. Within the generous soul of such a man beats those qualities and virtues that obliterate the distintcions of rare and creed and make the whole world akin.

Among the many lessons to be drawn from his life is that of broad tolerance. Apropos to our search after the elements of an education, after the fundamentals of a more harmonious social structure, is a cinsideration of this lesson. Sustained progress rests in no inconsiderable measure upon a tolerance, an appreciation of the opinions, feelings, feelings, convictions, and aspirations of our fellow man. But for its own tolerance, such an emulative life as his can never be. But for tolerance this nation would never heve been.

He was the soul of loyalty, honor, and devotion. Loyal to his ideals, devoted to his home, his work, and ihs faith.

What an approach he made to the ideal life-a life of vigorous, wholehearted action, closely attuned to, nature, giving deeper meaning, nobility, and perspective by a rich back-







President Harry Olmsted, of the State Fair of Texas, which opens at Dallas October 8, has requested Mr. Marland to send the statutes to the State Fair, where a million of the de-scendants of the same type of pioneer mothers may have a chance to see them and vote upon them.

Mr. Marland, who wishes the choice to be a popular rather than a purely artistic one, at once saw the point of Mr. Olmsted's request and promised to try and rearrange the route of the models so that Texas may have them for at least two weeks. It is hoped that definite announcement may be made soon.

The friendship of David and Jonathan has become immortalized in the world's thought. It was unique in that it occurred between two men of rival worldly interests. Jonathan was the crown prince, the heir to the throne. David was heir according to the divine choice and arrangement. Jonathan knew this and magnanimously waived his natural personal rights to the one he knew God had chosen. I. Friendship Established Between David and Jonathan (I Sam. 18:1-4). 1. Love at Sight (vv. 2).

Following the interview of Saul and David after the victory over Goliath, Jonathan's soul was knit with that of David. He loved him as his own soul. While there was mutual love, this pleasing trait stands out more prominently in Jonathan than in David because it meant great loss to himthe loss of the throne; while it meant immense gain to David, the acquisition of the throne to which he had no nat-

ural right. Covenant established (vv. 3, 4). Following the love covenant beween them, Jonathan stripped himself of his court robe and his equipment and gave them to David. This act was a virtual abdication of the throne to David.

II. Jonathan Defended David Against Saul's Frenzy (I Sam. 19:1-7). David went into the battle with Goliath out of zeal for God and true religion-not for personal glory, but it turned out as always that because

Bad Temper Handicap in All Walks of Life "The temper of a man determines

he nature of his relations to society," writes Dr. Henry Knight Miller in an editorial in the Psychology Magazine You are popular or inpopular, loved or despised, prompted to successful achievement or held in limitation and failure, in large part according to your prevailing tempers, be they good or

"A man of persistent good temper is loved, respected and cultivated," continues Doctor Miller, "while the ill. tempered man is indeed his own worst enemy. He makes friends only to ose them. Opportunities pregnant with golden possibilities are lost because of his uncontrolled and unlovely emper. He soothes his jaded sensi bilities with copious drafts of self-appreciation, hates society, snarls at all who antagonize him and sinks lower and lower into the slough of despond, into morbid quicksand of his own distorted imagination."

Doctor Miller emphasizes the fact that good temper is a product of soul culture. He says, "it is a result of self-mastery, control of negative emotions, proper perspective, sound phiosophy of life and a sense of humor.' On the other hand he points out, in the Psychology Magazine article, that a man who is at war with himself whose inner consciousness knows no harmony is ill-tempered because of his tack of inner poise. He writes, "One basic cause of bad temper is selfishness. Start to form habits of unselfishness. Of course, no sane man will neglect his own interest and welfare but he can at the same time mani fest an intense interest in the welfare of others and in building a habit of unselfishness he will advance far in the achievement of good temper. The cultivation of a sense of humor is an other great aid. Cultivate, likewise ove as a governing mood and a habit of life. The constant use of autosuggestion is an invaluable aid in this as in every other program for the reor ganization of being. Little by little, the constant reiteration of these prin ciples will build in the subconscious mind predominant impressions corresponding to these suggestions and life will become attuned to these sub lime ideals."

Volcano's Last Effort

Steam in occasional hissing jets the last breath of the once raging volcanic vent, still melts the snow among the glaciers at the top of Mount Rai nier, according to Dr. F. E. Matthes of the United States geological survey. This great cone-shaped mountain which now supports one of the most magnificent single-peak glacier sys tems in the world, was in long past ages a volcano. As the season advances the great rivers of ice are beginning to flow more rapidly, until during the warmest weather they will move at a rate of from twelve to eighteen inches a day. This does not mean, however, that they extend their range farther down the slopes, for they melt off as fast as they flow forward, and sometimes faster. Some of the glaciers have undergone notable losses the last thirty or forty years.



Desert Lake Vanishing One of the most remarkable series

of evaporation measurements ever made was the result of a disastrous flood that occurred in the desert region of southern California in the year 1905, says Nature Magazine. The breaking of dams constructed in connection with an irrigation project allowed the water of the Colorado river to flow into a large depression below sea level, known as the Salton sink. By the time the break was closed, at the end of 1906, the flood had formed a lake 475 square miles in extent-the Salton sea. After its principal supply of water was cut off, the lake diminished rapidly in depth and area on account of the great excess of evaporation over the very scanty rainfall.

#### Romance and Flowers

in Long Association In the development of gift-making in courtship a certain amount of romance centers around the flower. The flower is the gift of lovers, and in early Greek times a flower was worn as a sign of the engagement, the fullblossoming flower suggesting love awakened. The Polynesian men, as well as the women, wear flowers behind their ears when they are in love. The survival of another picturesque medieval custom centering around the flower is found in the bride's flower girls of today. In olden times these little girls, usually sisters, dressed exactly alike, carried garlands of wheat before the bride in the marriage procession as a symbol of fruitfulness and plenty. The very old and universally observed custom of throwing rice after the departing bride and bridegroom as a symbol of a fruitful union had its origin with the ancient Persians. Rice has always played an important part in the marriage ceremony of these people, while the wheat shower, expressing the same sentiment, was common among the early Anglo-Saxons, and certain other people employed corn. Another interesting tradition regarding the rice shower is that rice was thrown after the bride and bridegroom for the purpose of giving food to the evil spirits that were believed to accompany newly married people, and that it was to appease these spirits that rice throwing originated.

#### Hawaiian Island Has

Many Claims to Fame Maui, one of the islands of the Hawaiian group, has for its motto the phrase "Maui no ka oi," meaning "Maui the First." The island authorities have just cited a number of historical facts in support of their brast. Maui has Haleakala, largest extinct volcano crater in the world, the scene in 1823 of the first Christian funeral of a Hawaiian chieftain. The earliest island newspaper, as well as the first on the Pacific ocean, was published there in 1834. The paper was called Ka Lima Hawaii, meaning The Arm of Hawaii.

David Malo, earliest Hawaiian historian, was a Maui man. The island also had the first telegraph line strung between Haiku and Wailuku in 1878. The first Hawaiian wheat was planted at Makawao, Maui, in 1845, and not long afterward the first potato plantation was started at Kula, where tubers were raised for the California gold miners.



#### Porpoise's Fish Appetite
