

MILK DELIVERY COST CUT BY HARD ROADS

The Bureau of Public Roads, Department of Agriculture, has made a study of the effect of highways on milk distribution, the results of which emphasize that good roads lower the milk hauling costs, that with the spread of good roads, milk hauling by truck becomes larger each year, and that the motor trucks add yearly a greater proportion of dairy products to the total hauling done by it in behalf of farmers. Studies in the "Baltimore milk shed" show that farmers on improved highways in this area pay 3 cents a gallon for haulivg milk, on the average haul, while

the farmer on the unimproved road pays half a cent more.

ABILITY TO BUY

The interstate commerce commission took testimony at Kansas City last month to find out whether the freight rates on agricultural products are too hgh. At this hearing

M. J. Healey, vice president of the John Deere Plow Company, gave some rather startling figures to indicate the tremendous reduction which has come in the last few years in the farmer's ability to buy manufactured goods.

He said that from 1910 to 1915 the average annual purchase of farm machinery was \$62 per farm family. From 1915 to 1920 it was \$91 per farm family. During the last three years, however, it has been only \$28 per farm family, or about 27 per cent of the average of the previous five years.

Receipts of hogs at the twenty markets for the eleven months ending with November have been approximately 30 per cent heavier than for the same period a year ago.

The extensive explorations of the Trans-Pecos Oil Company in the Ft. Stockton field which are the largest in the history of the field are being pushed as fast as men, money and machinery can do the immense amount of work necessary to the extensive drilling campaign the company is at this time actively pushing. Quinby No. 1 well, on section 19, olock 140, T. & St. L. railway survey is drilling in a hard lime and sandy formation at 2070 feet. 
BENJAMIN FRANKLIN





COTTON MARKET

Cotton advanced 2 to 3 cents a pound at the leading spot markets in the last two weeks, making a total of 5 to 6 cents since the government's November estimate was made public. Most of the private estimates are now below 10,000,000 bales with some as low as 3000,000 bales. Ginning returns to date have confirmed low yield ideas, as they are running behind the same date a year ago, and the amount ginned after this date last season is not encouraging from the cotton consumers' standpoint.

Other things besides the shrinking crop prospect were behind the rise. Mills were steady buyers as indicated by the sales on spot markets, which have been unusually large for this season of the year, by prompt snapping up of delivery notices on option markets, and by the steady increase in takings of American cotton by world spinners during the last several weeks. Judging by the amount of buyings by mills at the crest of the advance, they are sensible of the difficulties ahead of obtain ing enough cotton to fill their needs. Actual consumption by American mills thus far has been nearly as high as last year, and exports have been larger, so that cotton has been disappearing from the domestic market at Awaken to the Danger and Aid the a rapid rate when the small supply is considered.


