Why the Indians chose the difficult and dangerous work underground, vhen salt is easily obtained outside, is difficult to imagine. It is conjectured that several tribes had "claims" on the mountain, and that the later comers, finding the surface workings all pre-empted, had no choice but to enter the dark caverns to seek their salt supplies.
