We missed the hand rail only to fall in the dust and dirt at the depo, lost our hat and it was a good one and much better than we ever bought our own selves, and from that position, that is, on our classic features, we discoursed volubly, profanely and audibly, anent which means concerning, the lack of enterprise in omitting grass and trees from around the spot we landed from the train. 





After long study of the problem of engine vibration, during which additional bearings, friction vibration dampers, and other possible aids were suggested, Buick engineers developed a remedy which went straight to the source of the trouble. 





Calves will be given a dead line start in accordance with arena conditions, and when calf crosses dead line, he belongs to the roper, regardless of what happens. Ten seconds fine for roper's mount being over foul line when starter's flag drops.

Ropers must not "bust" calf. Any roper "busting" calf will be fined not less than 10 seconds, and not more than 1 minute, according to the willfullness of the act and time gained thereby. Wilful violation or disregard of this rule disqualifies roper. However, if roper catches calf and stops his horse, and calf runs and "busts" himself, the roper shall not be fined, but must allow calf to regain his feet. This is a catch as catch can contest, but roper must adjust rope and reins in proper manner to prevent his horse from dragging calf. Calf must not be dragged while down, and dragging calf more than ten feet disqualifies contestant.
