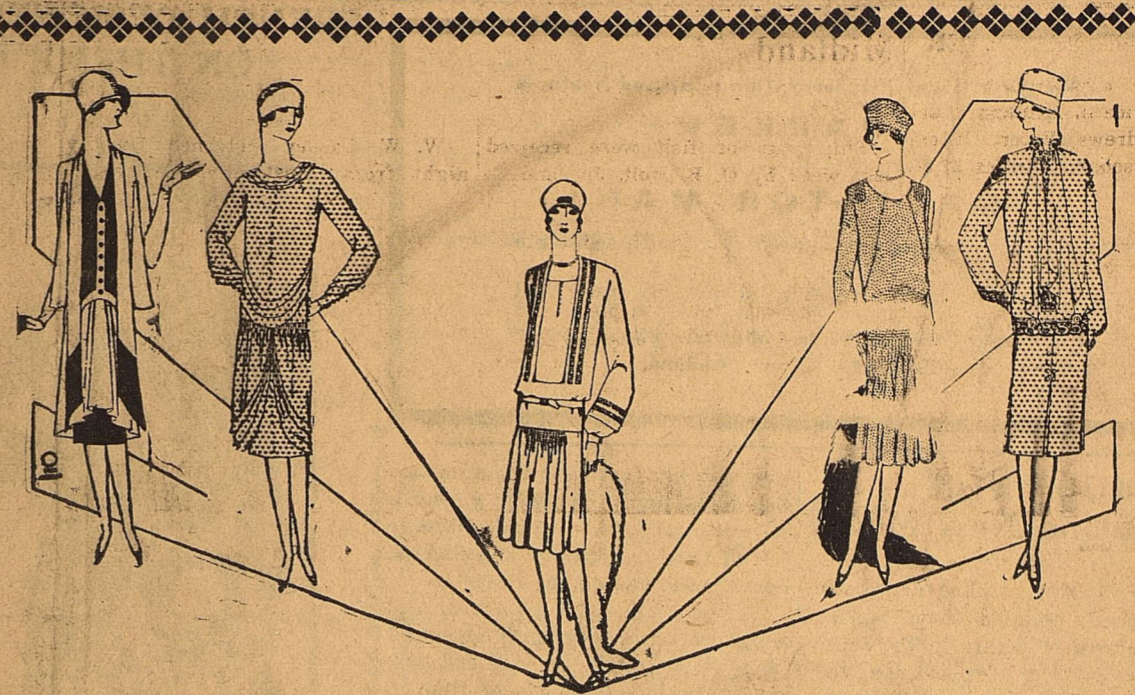

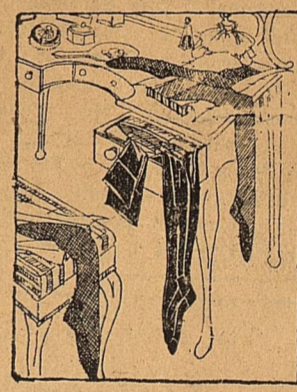

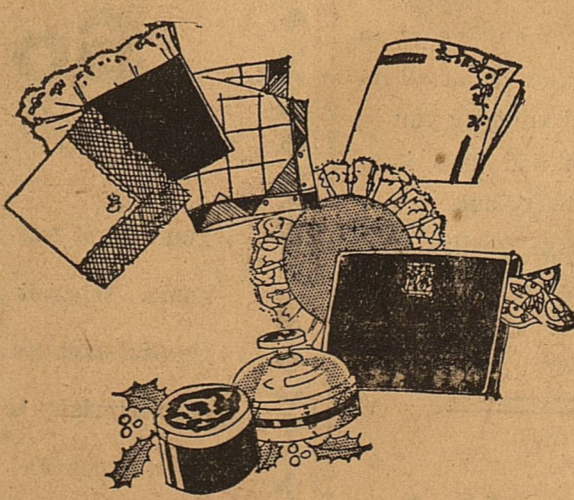

### New Ford to Have Public Reception in Midland Friday

The full story of the new Ford automobile, described by Henry Ford as being "superior in design and performance to any now available in the low price, light car field," will be told first in Midland next Friday, December 2, according to announcement by the Cowden Motor Co., local dealers.

A public reception is to be held here simultaneously with similar gatherings at every Ford dealer in the United States, thus constituting a part of the greatest automobile show in the history of the industry.

While no detailed descriptions have yet been given out by local dealers, the Ford Motor Company, from its headquarters in Detroit, has announced that the new Ford car will be as far in advance of present public demand for speed, flexibility, control in traffic and economy of operation as the famous Model T was in advance of public demand when it was introduced in 1908.

Dealers have not yet been advised as to the prices at which the new Ford line will sell, but definite assurance has come from Detroit that prices will be entirely in accord with the policy of the Ford Motor Company to provide the best possible automobile at the lowest possible price.

Elaborate arrangements are being made for the public reception here. City officials and prominent business men of Midland and vicinity have been invited and preparations have been made to give every caller at the show a thorough understanding of this car which is expected to make a new chapter in automobile history.

Four-wheel brakes, standard selective gear transmission, extraordinary acceleration, a speed of sixty miles an hour and more, a practically vibrationless engine, and unusual beauty in line and color are among the outstanding features of the new Ford cars, the first of which will be shown in many parts of the country next Friday. The generator, oiling system, steering gear and rear axle are of new Ford design, it is announced. And its 40 horsepower engine has been so designed that it runs 20 to 30 miles on a gallon of gasoline.

This car, which is to succeed the famous Model T line, will be shown on Friday by Ford dealers in many of the larger cities of the country. In Midland photographs and descriptive charts of the new cars will be on display at the Cowden Motor Co. showrooms, where the public will be given the complete story of the new Ford car. Later various models of the new Ford line will be on display here.

So far the new cars have been examined only by those who will have charge of the first showings and demonstrations. Salesmen and demonstrators are studying charts and diagrams which will be used in explaining the various details of design, appearance and performance.

For months factory models of the new car have been undergoing severe performance tests in and around Detroit. One of these factory models recently made a road run of 120 miles in 124 minutes. This run, it is said, was made on an ordinary paved highway near Detroit.

J. Homer Epley, manager of the Cowden Motor Co., in commenting on the forthcoming show, said their first view of the new Ford car had substantiated Henry Ford's statement that "there is nothing quite like it in quality and price."

"Mr. Ford's statement prepared us for a surprise," said Mr. Epley, "but the new Ford car is better even than we had hoped for. It is certain to make history in the automotive industry, just as its predecessor, the famous Model T, has made history for twenty years. We are proud of the new car and feel certain that its appearance and performance will attract unprecedented attention among automobile owners."

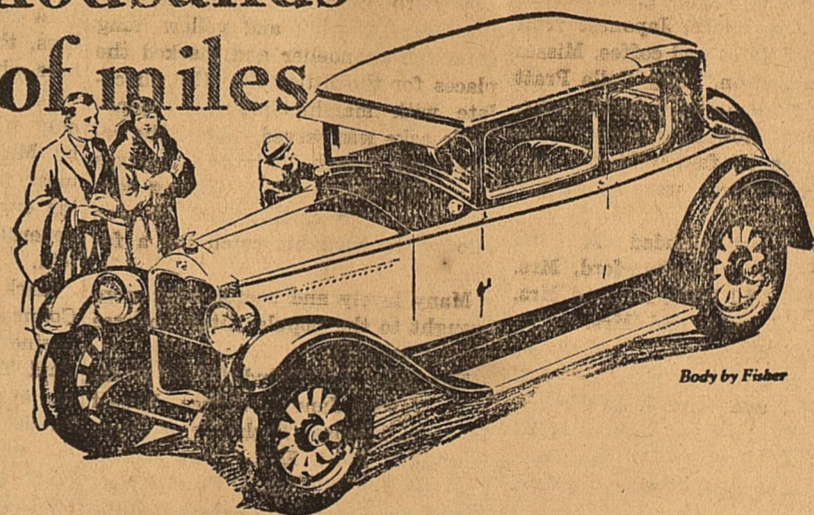

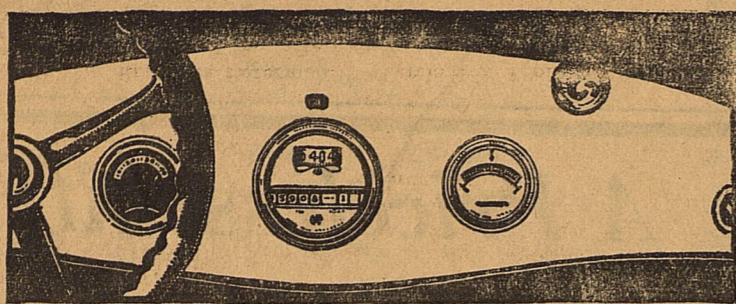

House Shortage in Midland Keen

Houses, apartments and even bedrooms are scarcer in Midland than at any time since the rapid expansion of the city as an oil city started. Despite the fact that 250 houses have been constructed here since January, the shortage seems to increase.

The Chamber of Commerce has conducted a survey which is calculated to attract outside capital for apartment house building, as the survey shows what is claimed to be not only an immediate heavy return on the investment, but also with a degree of permanency not usual in an oil town. The survey shows that with the cattle industry and farming industry backing up Midland's oil industry, apartment and rent house investments seem to be more than ordinary sound.

The continued shortage has been found to be due to the increasing desire of oil men's families, as well as new business people, to move to Midland to take advantage of the high ranking schools and modern city conveniences.

Snyder Newspaper Prases Vickers

Midland and its chamber of commerce secretary were highly complimented in the last issue of the Scurry County Times-Signal, published at Snyder, and the article is reprinted.

Worries of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, so far as membership campaigns are concerned, are ended. The chamber has completed a campaign in which 331 persons joined for life. The campaign was conducted under the direction of Secretary Paul T. Vickers.

In addition to these 331 life members, the organization has 25 members who are signed for only a year, giving the chamber a total membership of 356. Support of the chamber by Midland business firms was almost unanimous, final check showing only one business house enjoying general patronage having declined to join.

Back of the Midland Chamber of Commerce stands one of the finest business men in the state of Texas, Paul T. Vickers. Snyder once had an opportunity to have him as a resident and business man but someone else beat us to him. Snyder needs a secretary of its chamber of commerce like the man who boosts Midland.
