HUNDREDS EXPECTED HERE ON TRADES DAY

More Women Invited to Attend Big Celebration April 11th.

Everything is all set for the monthly trades day at Midland. Time: April 11—one week from now.

Place: Midland, Texas. The auction sale to be conducted free by Col. "Cap" Wallace will start at 2 p. m. on the vacant lot across the street from Neblett's. The drawing of free cash prizes will start at 4 o'clock.

A slow mule race is being planned by Pat P. Barber, chairman of all Farm Trades Day committees. This will probably be held immediately after the auction sale.

Farmers and ranchers and business men who have anything to offer for auction are asked to list their articles with the Chamber of Commerce before 2 o'clock Saturday, April 11. Mr. Wallace donates his services free as part of his share in helping build up Midland and the Midland country. People who have goods auctioned off, get their full sale value.

Every man, woman and child whether white, black or tan, who lives outside city of Midland and Mexican town is urged to be present for drawing. Remember, Midland merchants give you value received when you spend a dollar with them, and besides that you may win a free prize at the drawing.

Business men who are participating in the free cash awards are reminded to have their stubs at the place of drawing at 5 minutes to 4 o'clock, as the drawing is scheduled promptly for 4 p. m.

Last trades day hundreds of people came to Midland. Three of them won substantial prizes and they were not out a red cent to get them. The biggest prize was won by a man living about 20 miles from Midland in the southeast part of the county.

The people who came here mingled in the big crowds and had a good time visiting and swapped. They swapped horses and swears were yawns. Forty or fifty articles were auctioned off. Many farmers got fine bargains. A Dodge auto was auctioned off for \$60 and the man who sold it, offered an extra \$25 to get it back. One farmer bought \$23 worth of shotgun shells for about \$10 less than they were worth. Other fine bargains were made. One man bought a bed for 25 cents.

More women are wanted to attend the auction sale and free drawing. This monthly trades day is for women as well as men. Farm and ranch women are urged to attend the events and bid on articles offered for sale. Women who come to Midland next trades day, April 11, will meet scores of their friends and can have a fine visit with them. Rest rooms are maintained at various stores for women, and women are invited to come to the office of the Chamber of Commerce to rest and let their children play, if they wish. There are 17 chairs in the Chamber of Commerce office to which the women and children are welcome.

Come on over to Midland April 11—everybody else will be there.


AUXILIARY TO MEET

DEL RIO PLAINS HIGHWAY ASS'N. ORGANIZED

LARGE DELEGATION OF MEN HERE LAST NIGHT FROM COUNTIES NORTH.

In a meeting of delegates from Yoakum County, Andrews County, Midland and points south, plans were well started for the routing of a highway from Del Rio to Plains, by way of Midland.

The meeting was opened by County Judge Chas. L. Klapproth, who stated the purpose. B. F. Haag made a short talk, in which he suggested an association with the particular purpose of routing this highway and securing its designation by the State. Jas. F. Heasley, of Andrews County, agreed with his suggestion, as did N. R. Morgan of Seminole and County Judge R. P. Moreland of Plains.

Letters from officials in Del Rio and Ozona signified their co-operation although they could not be represented.

A motion was carried authorizing the president to be elected from Midland, on account of Midland's central location. Judge J. M. DeArmond was unanimously selected.

Each delegation then withdrew and nominated their vice-presidents and directors. Those elected were, from Andrews, Jas. F. Heasley, vice-president, and F. S. Wilson directors; from Seminole, A. L. Duff, vice-president and C. E. Rollins, directors; from Yoakum, Judge R. P. Moreland, vice-president, and Patrick Hugh, director; from Midland, E. H. Barron, vice-president, and J. A. Haley, director. No officers were elected from the counties south, on account of the small representation, but these will be appointed by the president.

Officers Held Meeting

"Del Rio-Plains Highway Association" is the name of the new north and south highway organization formed last night at a meeting of vice-presidents and directors of the new organization, held in the courtroom following the general meeting. President J. M. DeArmond called the association to meet in Andrews at 1 p. m. Thursday. James Heasley, vice-president and F. S. Wilson, director of the association will have a big mass meeting in Andrews next Thursday for home people and for other officers and directors.

The association last night authorized the president to appoint a secretary, following a prior motion made by Judge N. R. Morgan of Seminole that a Midland man be named secretary in order to expedite work for the association through having the head office in Midland. President DeArmond appointed Paul T. Vickers, secretary of the Midland County Chamber of Commerce, as secretary of the new association.

The Del Rio-Plains Highway Association authorized the chairman to fill the directorate by appointment of one vice president and one director each from Upton, Crockett and Val Verde counties.

The delegates from Andrews County were F. S. Wilson, Jas. F. Heasley, S. R. Turnbow, J. E. Parker, Roy Wilson, Ab Cooksey ("Mayor" of Fasken), John Castleberry (Florey), H. M. Hill (Florey), and W. L. Lay.

Those who came from Seminole were A. L. Duff, Sheriff F. L. Britton, N. R. Morgan, Harry Stone, C. C. Cothes, F. D. Stark, R. M. Halley, F. L. Lindley, and J. A. Morrow. From Yoakum, Judge R. P. Moreland and Patrick Hugh were here.

THE "FIGHTING JEW OF TEXAS" DIES

SAM DREBEN FORMERLY OF DALLAS SUCCEUMBS AT HOLLYWOOD.

Hollywood, Cal.—Sam Dreben, 47 years old, soldier of fortune and American World War hero, picturesque figure of Mexican and Central American revolutions and friend of Gen. Pershing, died here March 15th.

Though Dreben had been ill for several months, his death came unexpectedly. He collapsed in a doctor's office while undergoing treatment, and, though taken at once to a hospital, died without gaining consciousness.

A heart overstrained by adventures such as few men meet, gave way at last, and Dreben died suddenly, as he would have chosen, leaving a name for quiet courage unexcelled in the annals of the Southwest.

Although the "Fighting Jew" was but 47 years old, he had packed into those years enough of danger and romance to color a score of lifetimes. Intimate of Pancho Villa, companion of Lee Christmas and Tracy Richardson and chief of scouts for Pershing in Texas, Dreben's name, on both sides of the line, was one with which to conjure. He carried Uncle Sam's musket in the Boxer rebellion, the Spanish-American War and the Philippine insurrection, earning the reputation of a remarkable soldier.

And in the World War he ran true to form. As top sergeant in the Thirty-Sixth (Texas Division) he received the accolad from General Pershing of being "one of the bravest men in the American Army."

GARDEN CITY MEN TO BE HERE NEXT WEEK

Road boosters of Glascock County have been invited to meet with directors of the Midland County Chamber of Commerce in Midland next Friday night, April 10, to discuss the organization of a new highway from Garden City to Midland and thence Lamesa.

County Judge Charles L. Klapproth and other directors of the Chamber of Commerce who are pushing this road will ask that it be designated a state highway.

The Chamber of Commerce and Midland County Commissioners are contemplating sending delegates to Austin April 20 to ask for the designation of the Glascock-Midland-Lamesa road and perhaps to assist in getting the new Del-Plains road via Midland designated.

ABILENE LOAN CONCERN DOING BUSINESS HERE

C. H. Cope, salesman of stock for the Abilene Building and Loan Association, has been here this week and will return the first of next week, outlining the plan of savings accounts for his organization.

Several Midland people have already taken stock in his association, and he expects to establish a large branch of the business here. They have experienced a tremendous growth since the organization of his company, and have recently increased the capital stock from \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

FRANK NORFLEET TO BE HERE SATURDAY

WILL SPEAK AT RIALTO THEATER IN AFTERNOON, CHRISTIAN CHURCH AT NIGHT.

J. Frank Norfleet, the world's greatest detective, will be here in person tomorrow, Saturday. He will lecture at the Rialto Theater at 3 o'clock and at the Christian Church at 8 o'clock, under the auspices of the local Parent-Teachers Association.

Norfleet is one of the greatest men of his time. Reared as a cow boy in the neighborhood of Hale Center, Texas, he was fleeced of his fortune by a band of gamblers.

He vowed to land all of them in the penitentiary, and carried out his threat. He went through many narrow escapes, but did not fire a gun. He traversed all of the United States and parts of Europe in his man hunt, being the sole detective on the job. People here are greatly interested in hearing him tell of his experiences.

MANY JACK RABBITS KILLED THIS WEEK

FAIR GROUNDS IS STARTING POINT FOR NEXT WEEK'S DRIVE.

Three rabbit drives this week sent many a long eared pest to the happy grazing grounds.

The week's campaign was opened Tuesday with a drive on the McClintic ranch with dinner at Harry McClintic's house. The crowd of hunters was small, but many rabbits were slain.

More hunters attended the drive north of town Wednesday than on any drive yet held this year. Farmers of that section who have faithfully attended other drives from them were rewarded by people coming from clear on the other side of the county to help them shoot.

Hundreds of rabbits and two coyotes were killed. Frank C. Dale and R. O. Brooks with their neighbors gave the dinner.

The drive Thursday was on the land to the northeast of Midland. Dinner was given on one of the Glass farms. Virgil C. Ray officiated at the barbecue pits of all the drives.

General "Timberline" Floyd, commander-in-chief of the rabbit killers, or "twisters" announced that the drive next Wednesday would start at the Fair Grounds, and on the following Wednesday, April 15, the drive will be on the Scharbauer lands, starting at the edge of the Cap Wallace place.

Health Board Makes Helpful Suggestions

A state-wide clean-up week will be sponsored by the State Board of Health beginning April 5th. Printed programs outlining suggested activities for this week have been mailed to Mayors, county school superintendents, county officials, and civic organizations. The co-operation of every person is asked in a general clean-up of premises as an aid to the promotion of public health.

"Any town or community," stated the State Health Officer, "should organize its forces, and arrange programs, electing a 'live wire' as commander-in-chief. Mayors have been asked to issue clean-up proclamations. Get the assistance of your local health officer, and arrange with the ministers of your town for health lectures on the first day, Sunday, April 5th.

If your city water supply is not in Class A, devise ways and means for improving it. Midland's supply is. Make a survey of dairies, slaughter houses, and bakeries to ascertain their sanitary condition. If practicable, urge the adoption by your city council of the milk grading program recommended by this Department. Demand that all food exposed for sale be protected from flies and insects.

000 cases of preventable diseases occurred in Texas last year, and that the results obtained from a general clean-up campaign throughout the state should materially reduce this enormous inroad on the health and happiness of the people.

Introduce any innovation that may be adaptable to your community that will add interest to your program. Help create public sentiment to the extent that insanitary conditions will not be tolerated. The State Board of Health will be glad to furnish literature on sanitation and health posters to any town or community that may desire same.

Attention School Land Holders

The following letter has been received by County Clerk C. B. Dunagan from the Land Commissioner, and is self explanatory:

"The Governor has approved a bill for the relief of purchasers of School land. It provides that those who allow their land to be forfeited for non-payment of interest shall have a preference right to repurchase all the land so forfeited at a price to be fixed by the Commissioner of the General Land Office and at the same rate of interest that the present purchase bears and without having to live on it, and also without in any way affecting the owner's mineral rights or any mortgage or other lien that any one else may now hold against the land. One cannot buy a portion of a forfeited tract but must take all of the tract that he lets forfeit nor can one let a portion of a section be forfeited and then rebuy the whole of the section under the preference right. One will not have to rebuy every tract that he lets forfeit.

One who allows his land to be forfeited will have to take the risk of having the price raised or lowered or let the present price remain unchanged, but in either case he will be relieved from paying the back interest.

The Land Office would like to forfeit about June 20th such land as owners would like to have revalued and for that season will request you to suggest to them to write me just as soon as they can, designating the sections they wish to have forfeited.

After forfeiture a list of the land in each county will be sent to the proper County Clerk giving complete information and within sixty days after the date shown on the list each owner who wants his land revalued must have his request for revaluation filed in the Land Office, together with One Cent for each acre that such one desires revalued. Every one must get that information from the list sent to the County Clerk.

As soon as the revaluation is made notice will be sent to each owner with proper blanks and such owner will then have ninety days in which to file his application to repurchase, with one-fortieth of the price as the first cash payment just as is now required by law.

Such of the land that is not so repurchased will later be placed on the market for sale to the highest bidder.

After one requests a revaluation of his land he cannot thereafter redeem it by paying back interest.

There is no limit to the amount of land one may repurchase.

None but those who owned the land at date of forfeiture can get the benefit of this law.

If one's deeds to his land are not in the Land Office such one must file them before he will be awarded the land under this law.

If one inherited the land such one may repurchase but his ownership must be shown by proper evidence filed in the Land Office before an award will be issued.

Those who do not want their land forfeited must pay by September 1st all interest due to November 1st, 1922.

As soon as the data can be prepared a notice of the amount of interest due to November 1st, 1924, will be sent to the one who paid the interest the last time, therefore, no notice will be sent to owners except in cases where the owner himself, personally, rent the last interest payment.

Getting Ready For The Convention

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has opened its convention headquarters in Mineral Wells, having been assigned a suite of rooms in the Chamber of Commerce building. The offices will lend full cooperation to the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce in exploiting and arranging for the 7th annual convention, and the two organizations working jointly expect to have everything in readiness for the convention before the time of the opening. The new auditorium in which the sessions of the conventions are to be held is fast taking shape and will be one of the most attractive buildings of its kind in the State. Every convenience will be provided and the convention hall will have a seating capacity of 5000. The Housing Committee is also very busy and announce that there will be no difficulty in giving proper entertainment to the thousands who will attend the convention.

Registration Fee.
The usual registration fee of \$2.50 established by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be regarded at the annual meeting to be held in Mineral Wells, May 4, 5 and 6. The headquarters committee of the convention announces to delegations that if they so desire towns can register their delegates before leaving home. In this event badges will be forwarded upon receipt of proper remittances and the congestion at headquarters will thus be avoided. Registration fees are made by all large conventions and the one fixed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is in line with this custom, only it is smaller. These registration fees entitle the holders to see the magnificent pageant to be given upon the second evening of the convention, the great banquet to be held the last evening, and to many other courtesies.

Work Then Play.
The slogan "Work in the morning—play in the afternoon" will be adhered to during the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held in Mineral Wells, May 4, 5 and 6. All parades, attractions and other things will be banned in the forenoon, at which time the convention session will be held in the large auditorium. Every effort will be made to center chief interest in the business program of the convention in the forenoon and in the afternoon, joy will be unconfined, and the West Texas spirit known throughout the union will be rampant.

Delegation Parades.
The following announcement is made by the Arrangement Committee of the West Texas Chamber of

Commerce convention to be held in Mineral Wells, May 4, 5 and 6. The great delegation parade during the convention will be held in the afternoon of May 5th. All town and city delegations are earnestly requested to participate in this parade. We are asking advices from the various towns, as to the probable number that they will have in these parades. Floats may be used and the suggestion is made that these floats typify any special resources or idea that may obtain in the various towns or communities. There will be no official decorator and each town will be requested to use its own ingenuity and originality. Proper recognition will be given the float that is most typical and original. In case any town in West Texas should desire the arrangement and decoration of a float by Mineral Wells, special care and attention will be given to this provided the requirements are made two weeks in advance of the convention. CLEAN-UP WEEK PLANS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED

CITIZENS ASKED TO OBSERVE EACH DAY'S PROGRAM TO THE LETTER.

Next week will be Clean-Up Week in Midland. April 5 to April 11 has been designated by the Texas State Board of Health as Clean-Up Week for the entire state.

The Midland Clean-Up Week will be under general direction of the Midland Chamber of Commerce. Ministers of the city have gladly agreed to co-operate in plans for promoting public health and sanitation by preaching sermonettes April 4 by public hygiene. These ministers on public hygiene to the Law of refer Bible readers to the Law of Moses in Deuteronomy in reference to health and sanitation.

Midland people are urged to set aside Monday to inquire into their own personal health. This will be a special day to have the doctors and dentists look you over to give you an appraisal of your own physical well being or ill being, as the case may be.

Tuesday is general clean-up day. On that day Midland people are urged to cast a critical eye over their premises. Collect unsightly tin cans and other refuse and garbage and telephone for the city garbage collector to get the trash. Mayor T. Paul Barron says an extra wagon will be put on if necessary. It is also a paint-up and white wash day. Outdoor closets should be made sanitary. Yards should be beautified with flower beds. The Chamber of Commerce has made an offer of small prizes for the most beautiful yards in Midland.

Wednesday is the official day for fighting mosquitoes, flies, rats, etc., but since this pure West Texas air is comparatively free from these pests, it has been decided that this day can be well spent in ridding the country of another form of pests—jack rabbits.

Thursday is child welfare and birth registration day. Dr. W. K. Curtis, city health officer, is anxious that arrangements be made on this day for proper examination of children, the reporting of all contagious diseases, and the general spread of information on care and feeding of children and malnutrition. Mothers interested in child hygiene may get such literature including a penatal letter free of charge by writing the State Board of Health, Child Hygiene Bureau, Austin, Texas.

Friday is disease prevention day. No special program applicable to conditions in Midland has been outlined for this day. The attention of Midland people, however, is called to the fact that health experts say much illness is caused by germs, improper food and lack of exercise—all of which evils are easily remedied in Midland.

Saturday is pure food day. The State Department of Health has the following to say:

"Filthy Food means food not securely protected from flies, dust, dirt, and all foreign and injurious contaminants.

"Fruits, vegetables, candies, and bakery goods should not be displayed on the sidewalks nor in unprotected containers inside any establishment. Such exposure makes Filthy Food.

"All dairies should be inspected at regular intervals to prevent the sale, or offering for sale, of milk products under unsanitary conditions. All cows should be tuberculin tested at least once a year. Milk produced at an unsanitary dairy is a Filthy Food.

Midland is known far and wide as a healthy city. Midland has Class A water. Midland has a class A camp ground so far as sanitation is concerned. Midland people are proud of the cleanliness of their city and wish to keep it that way. Literature on the clean-up campaign is available at the office of the Chamber of Commerce.

Dental Health Week Will Be Observed

We are indebted to Dr. L. E. Pemberton for the following splendid article on the work to be accomplished during Dental Health Week, in Texas, and this program will follow the public health and clean-up week which begins Sunday.

"A most creditable movement, projected by the Council of Mouth Hygiene and Public Instruction of the Texas State Dental Society, is that of 'Dental Health Week,' beginning April 13th, to 18th.

Its purpose is to present clearly and forcefully to all the people of Texas, the actual truths, and how to grow strong, healthy teeth in clean, healthy mouths, how to do this, its important reasons why this should be done, and the far reaching results of the failure to do so. This effort, is being put forth purely as an educational measure for the State, and the Ethical Dental Profession in each community is urged to take active steps and render every assistance possible in putting on and carrying out these plans.

The channels through which the public will be reached are: Publicity through the newspapers; professional and educational journals; the Department of Education of the State; the State Board of Health; and by school and community programs.

The movement, as all dentists know, is purely altruistic, having for its purpose the awakening of the men, women, and children of the great State of Texas, to the danger to health, and even life, of unhygienic conditions of the mouth and teeth, and to instructing them in methods which they may apply to overcome this condition, and maintain this cavity in cleanliness and health.

Manufacturers, merchants and other business men have long since discovered that the attention and interest of the people they wish to attract can be secured by artifice and adroit, yet truthful advertising; consequently advertising has become as fine an art that a host of the brightest and most artistic minds are now engaged in this work of attracting customers for business concerns. Preachers even, many of them, have abandoned the old fashioned straight-from-the-gospel appeal and have substituted other forms, mostly good, but sometimes approaching the sensational which they have found more effective in securing the attention and interest of their people.

Likewise, "Dental Health Week" represents a much larger and a decidedly different plan of appeal for the attention of the people of Texas than has been used heretofore by the State Society. Similar plans have been very successfully employed in a number of other states, and this will succeed here and be a blessing to our people if the members of the profession in each community will respond to the urgent appeal for co-

operation of the Council, as made in its plan published in the last issue of the Texas State Dental Journal.

MANY LIFE MEMBERS

One hundred and thirty eight teachers in Texas schools have enrolled since January 1 as life members of the Texas State Teachers Association. This brings the total number of life members to 556. A life member pays a fee of \$25 which entitles him to all privileges of the Association so long as he may live.





All this get-rich-quick-talk about "bargains" simply indicates that some one is trying to peddle something for more than it is worth.



THE PASSING DAY

Victor Schoffel, mayor of the Dallas News, says that cotton can be grown at less than 10 cents a pound, if it is grown intensively but that it may cost 25 to 30 cents to grow it if the farmer plants too large an acreage and then has to spend his cotton money buying feed for his stock and estates for his family. Thrifty bankers and merchants, whose success depends upon the success of the farmers, are learning that a large part of the cost of cotton growing goes for the purchase of supplies that could as well be grown along with the cotton. They are also learning that when the farmer spends more for food for himself and family than he gets in cash for his crops, he is soon without money to spend for other things. The one crop system of farming will in time impoverish any community in which it is practiced.

Civic Responsibility for Health.
That cities and communities are in a way responsible for the health of their people is coming to be generally recognized, although until within recent years no such community responsibility was recognized. The wealth of any community is very largely measured by the health of that community. If men, women and children are kept free from sickness there is little danger that any one willing to work will ever become a public charge. Instead, all who will work will be producing something that will add to their own comfort and to that of others. Children will be in school preparing themselves for carrying on efficiently the work now done by their fathers and mothers. Considered purely as a business problem public health should be a matter of public concern. Cities and communities can not afford to be indifferent.

Communities Should Guard Morals.
It is as important for a people to be morally sound as to be physically strong. The same concern should be felt in safeguarding community health and morals. No community should permit questionable practices to be flaunted in the face of the public. While every man is largely the arbiter of his own moral conduct, no community or organization is justified in sponsoring a thing that tends to lower standards of morals. That is the justification for censorship of shows and for the prohibition of gambling. All the bad shows are not in the movie houses, nor all the gambling done in gambling dens. The average carnival, often sponsored by civic or fraternal organizations, is about degrading in influence as the worst movie shows, and the gambling devices under the auspices of such organizations are often training schools for young gamblers. An organization that can't exist without encouraging questionable practices can not justify its existence.

Home Ownership Basis of Prosperity.
It is not possible to find any really prosperous or happy people where there is not a desire for home ownership. The negroes may be an exception to this general statement, for the love of home does not seem to be as yet a negro characteristic, although it must be admitted that the negro is slowly developing a home owning tendency, and where this is true he is all the better for it. Every person is a better citizen for being a home owner. The ideal community is that in which every one owns a home or is working to acquire one. The towns that will prosper most in future will be those towns that make an organized effort to assist both town and surrounding country people to own their homes.

Mail Order Houses Always Active.
A woman who is a community worker among country people in a certain Texas county said recently that on one of her visitations to the country she saw fifteen young women wearing dresses from a certain large concern that sends out its catalogues to the people, and two wearing dresses made by themselves from goods bought in the nearby town. She thought that fairly represents the business that the local merchant is getting as compared with the mail order houses. When asked why this condition exists, she said it is due to the constant and persistent activity of the mail order houses in sending out their printed matter and in quoting attractive prices. The mails are flooded with such matter inviting trade and trying to convince buyers that their business is wanted, while the local merchant too often sits supinely still and waits for buyers to look him up.

Merchants Must Go After Business.
The local merchant has all the advantage if only he will use it. The local newspaper is his best ally in getting trade if only he will use it. The catalogue can't be mailed oftener than two or three times a year. The newspaper goes into the homes every week. The merchant should use it to talk to the people about his business and their interests. It will cost money, but not so much as he is now losing to the mail order houses. The fact that cities are building up and growing rich at the expense of the country and country towns is due merely to the difference in the activity of the business concerns.

WEST TEXAS NEWS

Memphis—The Memphis band will go to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce 7th annual convention at Mineral Wells, May 4, 5 and 6 together with the official West Texas Band of Memphis according to Director Paul James.

Haskell—Plans are under way for a new \$60,000 hotel for Haskell. An expert hotel man is expected to take charge as soon as the building is completed.

Leuders—The local chamber of commerce here held their annual banquet recently and the splendid luncheon and program was equal to any entertainment held in a larger city with more than 100 present. Albany, Stamford, Haskell, Abilene, Anson and Oklahoma were represented. Toastmaster T. M. Smart, introduced Col. R. L. Penick of Leuders who delivered the welcome address.

Lamesa—The James Key Gin, one of the largest gins on the South Plains that burned a few nights ago will be rebuilt and ready to take care of the coming crop.

Colorado—This city will soon have installed a new modern telephone exchange. The Chamber of Commerce through the Secretary, W. S. Cooper, has been after this exchange for more than two years.

Slaton—This city claims 250 new homes were built in 1924 and forty one homes built during January 1925. The \$135,000 high school building has just been completed.

Midland—A new six or eight stand gin will be built for the fall cotton crop, which will be by far the largest acreage in the history of this section of the South Plains.

Paducah—Much interest is being developed here owing to the discovery of Potash. It is now hoped that the mineral will be found in paying quantities as further development shows the area to be large and the quantity increasing from recent developments.

Mineral Wells—A Pageant will be staged at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce 7th annual Convention to be held here May 4-5-6. All parties expecting to participate should send in their names as early as possible to Ray Leeman, Secretary, Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce.

Amhurst—A new town on the Santa Fe Railroad in Lamb County wants a water system, modern fire fighting apparatus and a city marshal. This town not yet two years old is rapidly putting in city conveniences.

Fredericksburg—This city reports a Trunk Factory being located here and will soon be in operation.

Portales, N. M.—Land planted to cotton irrigated 6 times produced an average of 41 lbs. per acre for cost of irrigation, leaving 778 lbs. lint per acre. Many thousands of acres can be irrigated in this section from shallow wells and centrifugal pumps at small cost.

Nocena—Much building both in resident district as well as many new brick business houses are under construction here since the first of the year.



Crosbyton—The City Commission here will soon call an election to vote a \$40,000 bond issue for the construction of a City Hall.

Stamford—Thousands of people from various sections of Jones, Haskell, Stonewall, Fisher and adjoining counties thronged the streets recently when the Longhorn University Band paraded the streets here.

Spur—A contract has been let for the installation of a new sewer system. When completed the cost of the improvement will amount to \$50,000.

GRAIN PRODUCED IN SOUTH PLAINS IS 'BIRD-PROOF'

Midland, March 17.—Bird proof maize is the newest grain to find favor in the South Plains country. Carl Roberts raised a large quantity of maize last year, which has a seed so bitter that birds do not bother it before it can be harvested. Alongside this bird proof maize, rows of feterita and ordinary milo maize were 66 per cent destroyed by birds. The bird proof grains remain as bitter as persimmons and have somewhat the same drawing effect on the mouth as does that classic fruit, as long as the grain is the dough stage. When ripened the maize is as sweet and nutritious as the better known variety. Roberts claims he didn't hear a bird song on his farm any time last year after his bitter maize headed out. He declares the birds probably tried his persimmon-like grain and were never able to open their bills wide enough to sing.
