China Is Offered 3 Conditions Midland Vital Statistics Report Year 1928-9 Not Exact

NEWNIE ELLIS SAYS THAT NECESSITY NOW ARISES FOR FULL REPORTS

Birth Rate Here 163 for Year Closing In June: Death Rate Over the Same Period Was 106

"Midland is having all deaths reported but is lacking in complete data on births," Newnie Ellis, who handles all vital statistics of the county for the state department of health, says.

"Midland people register their bulls and dogs, but seem to be lukewarm in interest as regards registration of children," Ellis continued.

"Midland county turned in a list of 163 births against 106 deaths from June 1928 to June 1929. All Midland people believe that the birth rate here has been greater than the figures indicate.

Midland Fails "It is legally necessary that birth registrations be reported at once, just the same as deaths. Adverse publicity to a city may come from omissions of this sort. People at a distance who desire to move to Midland first want to know the health conditions. To do this they look into the vital statistics tables. If they find that the

On Graf Again **GERMAN DIRIGIBLE PLOWING ACROSS**

ATLANTIC TODAY (By the Associated Press)

The huge air liner Graf Zeppelin s hitting a rapid clip as it speeds across the Atlantic today on its second voyage to the United States. At 7:30 o'clock this morning it was reported to the radio station at Casablanca, Mcrocco, that the big blimp was 600 miles west of Gibraltar and was making from 65 to 75 miles an hour.

The zeppelin was headed for the Azores, but it was not certain whether it would pass over the islands or merely skirt them in a northwesterly direction.

MOSCOW, August 2.—(P)—The Soviet Union govern-ment today announced three drastic conditions as a solution of the problem raised by the Chinese in the seizure of the Chinese Eastern railroad.

The three conditions as given out by the Russian government are, first, liberation of Soviet workers and civil service men held in Manchuria; appointment by the Soviet government of an assistant manager of the road; and for a conference to be called immediately for negotioations arising from the conflict.

BOLL WORM DAMAGES

"Press reports indicate that Governor Moody has expressed himself as being ready to veto the \$150,000 appropriation to reimburse farmers of Midland County and other counties in which pink boll worm restrictions were enforced, on the grounds that the appropriation is unconstitutional because the claim originated before the law authorizing its payment was passed.

1984 If Governor Moody will listen to reason, instead of technicalities, he will find that the damages originated even before the claim, and the claim would naturally precede the appropriation. It isn't often that an appropriation is made to pay damages before there have been damages or claims.

The farmers submitted to the boll worm restrictions in good faith, and every assurance was given them that they would receive just compensation for their losses and for their additional expense.

As the Abilene News editor says, "you can't control the bollworm by reading the constitution to him. And you can't convince a lot of farmers that they shouldn't get the pay they were promised just because the constitution has a queer wrinkle or two in its musty pages.

Chinese troops, having seized the Chinese Eastern railway, were guarding its entire length, and have fired on Russian planes near the eastern border. The Japanese army, in turn, (shown in black uniforms), holds the Southern Manchuria railway, running from the town of Changchun to the Japanese-controlled port of Port Arthur, and Japanese warships were station at the latter harbor. Since Vladivostok is blocked by ice five months out of every year, Russia is anxious to be able to export goods across Manchuria, via Harbin, to Port Arthur. Manchuria is rich in gold, iron and coal mines, has extensive forests and raises huge crops of wheat, rice and tobacco, and has been getting immigrants from China at the rate of 1,000,000 a year.
