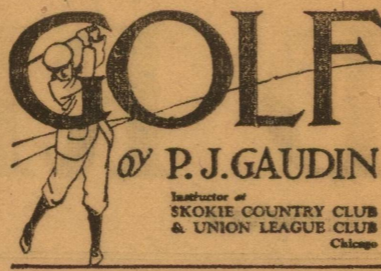

#### 3—Instruction and Practice.

It is a continuing source of wonder that so many golfers begin and keep on playing the game without instruction. Many of them take seeming pride in the statement that they never have had a lesson. That statement needs no verification. The player's swing is sufficient proof. It is within bounds to say the majority of average golfers have a very hazy idea of how to make a correct swing and why any swing is incorrect that does not let the club hit the ball at right angles to the line of flight.

Almost any average golfer or person who proposes to take up the game has a friend who is classed as an expert. The beginning of all wisdom, in a golf sense, is to learn by the experience of others. By all means talk matters over with this friend. Almost certainly the advice will be good if the friend is a real one besides being a real expert.

There are a thousand variations of stance, grip and swing, any of which may be right for the persons using them. It is not too broad a statement that any swing is correct if it brings the club and ball into the right contact to bring off the intended result. But with that definition it must be understood that there are certain cardinal principles which must be present in every swing which brings about good results. It frequently happens, especially with the beginner, that these essential elements are present accidentally. But the beginner can by no possibility repeat the good results. The harder he tries the worse the result. The mechanics of the swing must be learned thoroughly and then anchored by intelligent practice. And that practice must be continued until the right swing can be repeated indefinitely and almost mechanically. All that sounds like hard and grinding work. On the contrary, even a moderate amount of ambition for improvement will, or should be, sufficient incentive.

Here is a conclusion it will be worth while to remember: To show improvement in his game, a golfer must have a good understanding of the makeup of the swing and put in enough practice so that he can concentrate on the game itself rather than on methods of making the swing.

#### Big Race Meet to Be Held at Electra

The announcement which comes from the W. T. Waggoner Estate Racing Association of Electra, Texas of a race meet to be held at the W. T. Waggoner Ranch at Electra will undoubtedly be the cynosure of the horse racing world for the next few weeks. The five-eighths mile track is said to be the best in Texas, where tracks are tracks, and has a steel constructed grandstand with 3,500 seating capacity.

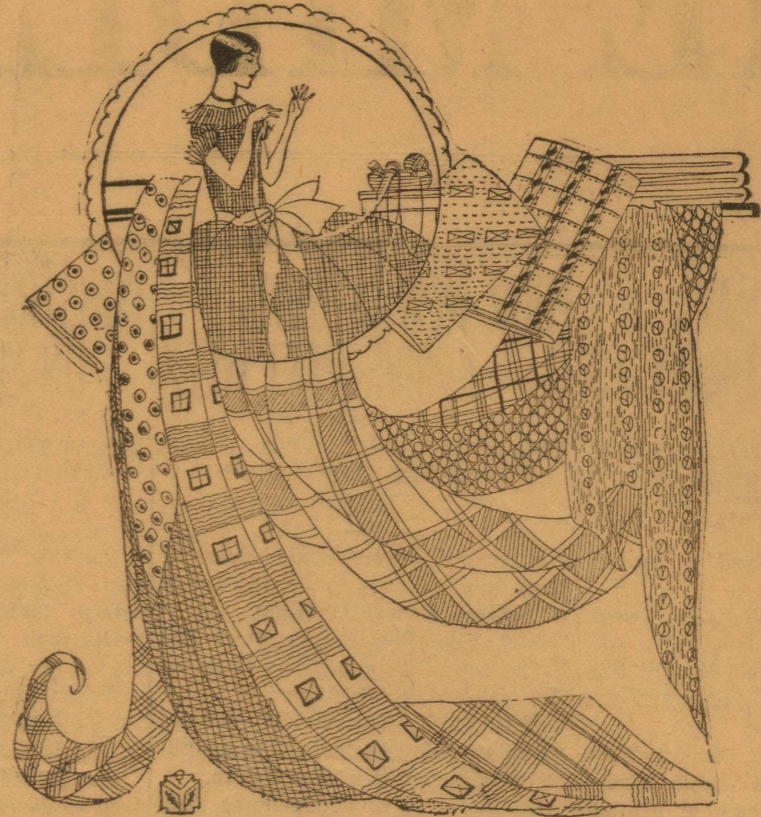
#### TOURING SOUTH TEXAS

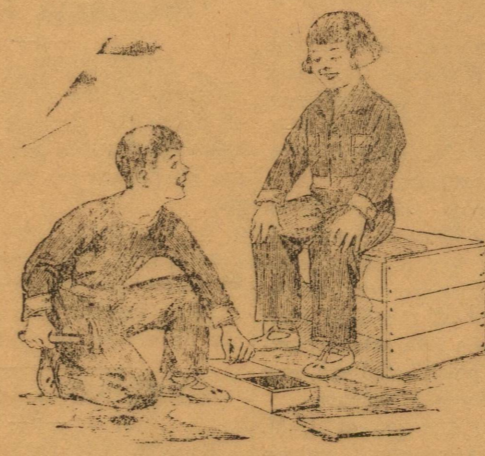

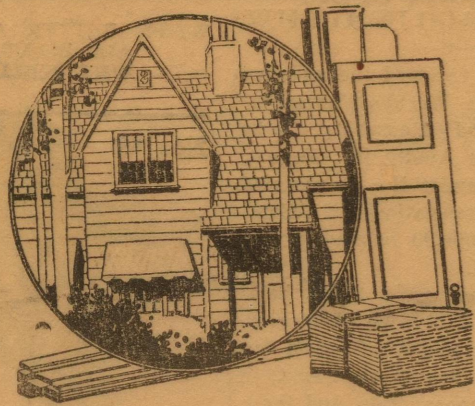

**SEPARATED MILK IN RATION FOR SWINE**

The Michigan experiment station has recently reported an interesting experiment in growing pigs on corn and water as compared to corn and separated milk. Two pigs that got milk gained 221 pounds each in five months. Those on corn and water gained only 9.5 pounds.

At the end of five months the milk-fed pigs were marketed and the two stunted pigs put in separate pens. Pig No. 4 got shelled corn, water and a good mineral mixture. Pig No. 3 got corn and separated milk and though he only weighed 43 pounds at seven months old, weighed 350 pounds at a year old, a gain of 307 pounds. No. 4 gained only 28 pounds, weighing 76 pounds at one year. Then No. 3 was marketed and No. 4 got separated milk and corn for five months. At the end of this time he had gained 274 pounds, weighing 350 pounds, showing that separated milk can bring out even a stunted pig to make good gains. The gains with separated milk cost 6.7 cents per pound, with skim milk at 35 cents per 100 pounds. Gains without milk cost 19.7 to 39 cents per pound.

Although separated milk contains valuable mineral matter, this was evidently not what was lacking in the corn. The main deficiency was in protein and in the growth-promoting vitamins, both of which were supplied abundantly by the separated milk. Many people try to feed pigs on corn alone, while others who have dairy cows separate the milk and throw the skim milk away. Both are making a serious mistake. If separated milk is not available one should use alfalfa pasture, tankage or some other protein supplement along with corn.

Some will say that they get better results on corn alone than were obtained by the Michigan station. This is probably true where pigs are getting some grass or weeds to supply them with mineral matter and vitamins and with some of the supplementary proteins. The main thing to remember is that corn is not a complete feed for growing animals.

Separated milk should be considered as a supplementary feed, not as a complete feed in itself. Where fed in moderate quantities, 2 or 3 pounds of separated milk may take the place of 1 pound of corn. In large amounts count 8 or 10 pounds of milk equal to 1 pound of corn. A good rule is to count 100 pounds of separated milk worth half the price of corn per bushel.—Chas. I. Bray, Colorado Agricultural college.

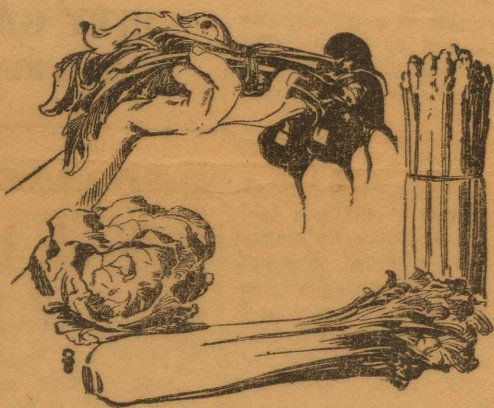

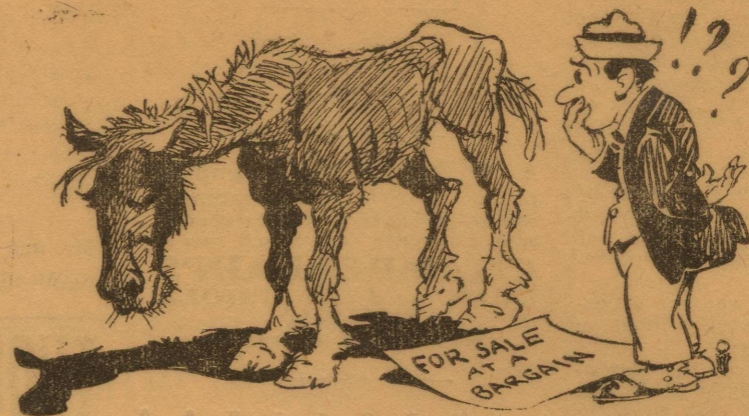
