# **July Report Division** Sanitary Engineering

The July peport of the Division of anitary engineering of the state board of health shows sanitary corrections secured on 28 municipal water supplies; provisional certificates issued to the towns of Hillsboro, San Angelo, Sinton, Sweetwater, Taylor and Terrell for the use of their water in interstate traffic; reports made on more than 300 samples of water sent it for analyses; corrections secured on 36 sewage disposal plants; the ad-option of the standard milk grading ordinance by the city; the construction of a model, sanitary well in the Garin interstate traffic; reports made on field community of Travis county, this well being patronized by water haulers for miles around; plans for sewer system approved; 27 ice factores investigated as to sanitary conditions surrounding production of ice and quality of ice produced; 22 tourist camps surveyed, 14 of which were approved. Swimming pools at Austin, Belton, Denton, McKinney, Tem-Texarkana and Waxahachie ple. were approved; sanitary conditions of 32 institutions of higher learning were investigated; preliminary arrangements made with the U.S. Pub-lic Health Service to make a sanitary survey of the State's oyster beds; and assistance was given in the investigation of 6 typhoid fever epidemics. ved about \$40,000. The policy was for 30,000 and was negotiated for the Southland Life Insurance Co. by A. C. (Tex) Bayless, general agent for the Company at Houston.

It has been the custom in big leagues for some time to insure baseball players. Babe Ruth has been insured for \$150,000 and Ty Cobb, Rogers Hornsby, and Alexander all carry heavy insurance on their lives to protect their clubs. 



### 20-Action of Left Wrist.

No golf ball is hit correctly except with a crisp flirting forward of the club head. This crispness comes mainly from the action of the wrists. There must be nothing of slackness in this action. It is a distinct flick that urges the club head forward to do its work. The feeling is perceptible in all shots with the possible exception of the putter on a short putt. On the longer putts the feeling returns. The center of this whole movement is in the left wrist. The left hand grasps and controls the club and the flirt of the club head comes naturally Try it with a light club or cane. Better still, take a putter but hold it just above the head, the toe of the head toward you. Take your stance as if using a wooden club, which of course will let the end of the club clear the floor by many inches. Go clear back on the back swing and then bring the club down without bending the wrist. About half way down the club will point nearly straight up. This is the place where the practice beings. Complete the swing with a crisp flirt of the wrist. Don't even try this with both hands. This is solely for the left hand. Be sure the action of the wrist is correct; that you can see all the knuckles and that the flirt of the wrist is accomplished without any aid from the forearm, that part of the body simply keeping out of the way by moving forward. That description was used by a

group of beginners and each seemed to grasp the idea at once. The importance of the flirted wrist may be seen in the fact that it gives distance, loft, back-spin and accuracy to the ball. When there is the full sense of getting the left wrist working properly in order to make the club head do its work, comes the time when it is necessary to realize this feeling must be present in every golf stroke. Never yield to the feeling that there must be less crispness to the stroke because the shot is of only twenty yards instead of a hundred. Instantly that feeling is uppermost comes the relaxation of the wrist and the flaccid action that spells disaster to the shot. Play boldly. Never baby the ball. (6, 1925, Western Newspaper Union.)







ter.) The change of sentiment in business circles for the better has been pronounced in the last two months, and practically in the last month. The country is well out of the relapse to pessimism which afflicted it in the spring.

In comparison with other years the general volume of business in the first half of the year was large, but it was not large enough to meet the sanguine expectations of many people. In a number of important lines a considerable amount of unemployment has existed. 

1. Don't try to hear ordinary broadcasting from Australia in midsummer.

No. 10 2. Don't be disappointed if an occasional storm interferes with your radio evening. You can't find a pearl in every oyster nor receive a record breaking concert every night. WAA.

3. If you want louder signals, use a longer aerial, more tubes, higher plate voltage, more sensitive loud speakers and more careful tickler and receiver adjustment.

4. A pleasant signal filling a modern size room should be enough to give satisfaction. Musically, such a signal is ideal. It is wasteful to insist on tremendous signals which are generally less pleasant than moderate signals.

5. If local station drowns others out, a smaller aerial will help in tuning him out, with a small condenser connected between aerial and ground And if all measures to get rid of the local station fail, why not enjoy his concerts? He is working hard for you. Broadcast stations have to be closer to some people than to others. 6. For the longer waves above 450 meters, use a condenser connected between the aerial and ground terminals of your st. 7. A little patience in learning to handle your receiver yields rich returns in satisfaction from fine signals.

8. Read the Radio column of a newspaper or a good radio magazine
