

Paul Vickers in Charge.

The Midland County Exhibit brought to the State Fair this year is under charge of Paul T. Vickers, Secretary of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, and Mrs. Vickers. The products for the exhibit were assembled by J. B. Snider, the County Agent. Mrs. Vickers arranged the display. The County's exhibit was financed by the Midland Chamber of located about six or seven miles Commerce.

The background of the posters or frames in which these letters appear are made of feterita and darso seed. Fred Brown, Midfand high school graduate designed the background. Grain sorghums and cotton are feature in the crop exhibit. Grain sorghums shown include mile maize, feterita and kafir corn.

Cotton is increasing rapidly in im portance as a Midland County proluct. Mr. Vickers said. A total of 22000 acres was planted in cotton this year, 5000 acres of this being sod land or new land. A total yield of 5000 bales is expected.

Wins |Cotton Prizes Some of the cotton samples displayed in the Midland County Exhibit are from the farms of M. W. Whitmire, three miles northwest of Midland. Mr. Whitmire took first in long staple and second in short staple cotton stalks in the individual exhibits this year at the Fair.

Considerable increase in farming acreage in the county is expected for the coming season, Mr. Vickers said. New farmers are moving in rapidly and land is considered cheap in price. 

the organization, just completed. Service to the disabled and to men now in active service continued to be one of the primary obligations of the Red Cross. The increased ac tivities in this regard were attributed largely to the legislation giving new benefits to ex-service men.

Due to new legislation an increase of over 6.000 natients were admitted for hospitalization, a new peak approximating that of March 1922. Since a large number of this group includes patients not eligible for compensation, the solution of their personal and family problems has involved careful

study by the National Organization There are 30,000 disabled ex-service men in Government hospitals every day of the year, and their need has directly led to a revival of the bestknown and perhaps most popular activity the Red Cross sponsored in war -a new campaign for knitted "Red Cross sweaters." Government. For the men still on active duty in the Army, Navy and Marines, the Red Cross during the year maintained Field Directors at all important stations, camps, and hospitals of these armed forces of the country.



Huge Relief Work After Midwest Tornado the Greatest in American Annals.

DISASTERS DROP IN 1925

Ranged From Fire to Earthquake 3 and Covered Wide Area at Home and Abroad.

peace-time project of post-disaster rehabilitation ever known has been accomplished by the American Red Cross in less than a year, as a part of its relief work in the more than 90 disasters in which it served in the

This great program was undertaken following the tornado which struck five mid-western States last spring, killing 796 people, injuring 2,239 more, and causing inestimable property loss. It left a huge area of devastation in its make, presenting a real problem. its wake, presenting a real problem. The Red Cross, however, went to work on the heels of the storm, caring for the injured, sheltering and feeding whole communities, and helping every individual sufferer from the destruction back to normal.

The magnitude of the problem is indicated by comparison of its huge casualty list with that of the entire preceding year, whose combined losses were 735 dead and not quite 2,000 injured, as a result of the record number of 192 catastrophies.

The story of the Red Cross service in the past year, recounted by the report, ranges from fires heading the list of destructive forces with 29 disasters, to mine explosions, tornadoes, typhoons, floods and earthquakes.

The Santa Barbara earthquake was among the outstanding events recorded in the report. The Red Cross had completed its relief organization on the scene within a few hours of the disaster, and in addition had launched a program designed to permanently restore every person affected by it, to his former status once more.

The Red Cross service in the period following the wreck of the Navy airship "Shenandoah" was typical of its promptness and effectiveness. Serv ice in this instance was afforded by Red Cross chapters in the vicinity of the wreck, and by representatives of the national organization. It demonstrates graphically the value of each of the more than 3,000 chapters of the society which are at work in virtually every part of the country, in the facility they afford the national organization in emergencies

There were 61 domestic disaster operations reported in which the Red Cross rendered service either through chapter or national staff personnel during the year. In 34 of these the national organization appropriated a total of \$3,047,256.49, the greater portion of which was received as direct contributions for the relief of specified disasters. The relief operations following the northern Ohio tornado of June, 1924, were brought to a close in May, 1925, after an arrangement had been made with the Lorain chapter to provide expert services to the families of any tornado sufferers who required such assistance in the next two years. In this single disaster the relief work, as finally accounted. reached a total of \$1,019,751.23.

The mid-western tornado of this year, covering a strip of territory 400 miles long involved an expenditure up to June 30 of \$774,000, while the total amount turned in to the fund through the agency of the Red Cross was \$2,645,000. In addition to this sum specifically collected for the pur pose, the Red Cross had expended

from its regular reserves \$124,000. In all these disasters, Red Cross workers have been impressed by the spirit of determination and hopefulness shown by the people. Once they recovered from their grief and bewilderment, they began at once to rebuild, materially and otherwise, and always on a better scale where possible. Another significant feature of these occurrences, as noted in the report of the Red Cross, was the promptness with which the local chapters organized emergency relief before help could be received from outside sources. A direct effect of their example has been to stimulate disaster relief preparedness among chapters all over the country.

The services of the American Red Cross are performed invariably in the name of the American people. On the effectiveness of this representation during the past year, it will launch the minth annual roll call this year on November 11, to continue until Thanksgiving, November 26, during which support through membership will be invited for 1926.

What Becomes of Red Cross Sweaters What becomes of the sweaters which the American Red Cross has asked for? In the first place, they are needed for the 30,000 disabled veterans still in hospitals this winter, the garments being in great demand. The surplus left from the war has been exhausted since the Armistice, hence the new call for the sweater-knitters to resume their needles, a call already being met.

RACE FOR GOVERNOR

POLITICAL WISEACRES PREDICT "MA"—Managed by Jim—AND LYNCH DAVIDSON WILL BE ONLY **GUBERNATORIAL ENTRIES FOR 1926.**

Austin, Sept. 26.—A two-handed battle royal for the gubernatorial honors in 1926, with Lynch Davidson of Houston and Jim Ferguson knight errant for Mrs. Ferguson, the two contestants, seems in the offing. With Lee Satterwhite, Whit Davidson, Eugene Blount and half a dozen other possible candidates out of the way and with the announcement of Wizard Evans that the klan will not take part in the race the field rapidly is being narrowed down to only two candidates,

The Fewer, the Hotter. Should there be only two in the race it would be for the first time in several years that the gubernatorial sweepstakes has had such a small field, but the race probably would be hotter than when there are a number

There would be but one issue in the race—Fergusonism. All of Texas would be lined up in two camps—for and against Ferguson.

A general realization that such will be the issue seems largely the deterrent force that is keeping the other possible candidates out of the race. They know that the more in the field the better it will be for Ferguson and the less chance each individual will have. They know that Lynch Davidson has been a candidate since he was barely nosed out last year and that he has the determination and the means to stay in the race as well as the demonstrated strength to justify his making the race. Consequently the others feel that to get in at this time would but reduce Davidson's chances of beating Ferguson and would not help their own cause.

There is only one other possible candidate who might develop any strength at all and he is Dan Moody, the attorney general. But several forces are at work against Moody's favorable entry into the race.

First of these is the fact that he has just been elected to state office, has had less than a year to prove his ability, and has had no executive or economic training to fit him for the governorship. Should Moody make the race for governor without resigning from his presentoffice he would be assailed for neglecting his duties while campaigning, for drawing the taxpayers' money while engaged in seeking another job at the hands of the taxpayers. Should he resign to make the race he would have to see his office filled by an appointee of the Fergusons, and Jim Ferguson would be certain to use this in the campaign as a demonstration of Moody's faith in the administration. It is well known in political circles that Moody is being urged by his closest friends to keep out of the race and give the anti-Ferguson forces an opportunity to center their strength behind one candidate. Fer-

guson has repeatedly tried to bait Moody into the race and his followers are subtly trying to get him in, hoping to split the strength of the opposition. As between Davidson and the Fergusons the former has much the easier position. The withdrawal of Whit Davidson from the possibility of making the race assures the Houston man many thousands of votes of "either Davidson" people who would have supported either had the other not been in the race last year. Davidson probably has not lost any of his 1924 supporters, and the combined vote of Whit Davidson with his own, plus the general anti-Ferguson vote, gives him a solid position.

The Case of Lynch.

The Houston man has no major problems of any sort confronting him. He has no apology to make for offering for the office. He is known to be rapidly as possible retiring from all business connections, following the policy of the president's cabinet members in that respect. He has the means to make the campaign and to live as governor without having to go in debt to supplement the \$4,000 a year paid as a salary by the state—while several former governors have left the office heavily in debt. In fact, his only problem is to get enough votes to win.

The Fergusons are not fortunately situated. In the first place, there stares them in the face the promise which Mrs. Ferguson made last year that if elected, so that the family name could be vindicated, she would not seek office again. That promise more than offsets any value to her of the two term tradition of the democratic party. Besides, it would not be, in fact, her second, but the fourth term of the Fergusons should she be re-elected.

It seems the plan of the Fergusons is to overcome their promise by announce ing that if their administration is assailed they will seek vindication of the acts of the administration by carrying the campaign to the people for re-elec-tion. Jim Ferguson having virtually so said in a recent interview in North Texas. When saying that, Jim Ferguson knew that his wife's administration, as that of any governor, certainly would be assailed by its enemies, and therefore it was a virtual announcement that she would be a candidate. This is further strengthened by letters which have been mailed out by Ferguson asking for poll tax lists and the names of one supporter for every 25 votes in



The Texas State Fair has a wonderful opportunity to assist in bringing this about. It has buildings devoted to the trades—to showing merchandise of every kind—but Texof the industrial arts and to be shown that industrial manufacturing is now necessary for their continued prosperity. It is all right to be shown beautiful exhibits of dresses, house-furnishings, automobiles and other things that make for the pleasure and comfort of the people, but the masses need more to be taught through our fairs how they may best acquire the money with which to obtain these

The next great enterprise of the Texas State Fair should be the erection of a mammoth industrial building and the substantial encouragement of manufacturers, both in and out of the State, in making exhibits that will show the possibilities of the fullest industrial development of the State.






