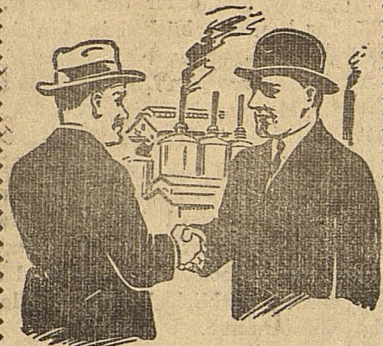

West Texas News

WICHITA FALLS—Three hundred thousand dollars is being expended by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. in improvements and betterments of their Wichita Falls plants. The improvements include the erection of a three story building size 35x50 feet, installation of three thousand lines of underground cable a distance of 6000 feet; and installation of much new equipment. Wichita Falls will have ten thousand telephone connections by July 1 1926 when the program will be completed according to statements of officials of the company.

CANYON—A half million dollar building program for West Texas State Teachers College here is outlined by Dr. J. A. Hill president of the institution who announces he will ask the Legislature for this amount for the next two year period. A \$200,000 Library and Education building, a \$175,000 Science building and improvements to present structures will constitute the program.

QUANAH—This city is advertising for bids for constructing sewer extensions here. The city conducted a "Clean Up" Campaign recently and the passage of stringent sanitary laws has caused numerous petitions for sewer extensions.

SLATON—A new hot water boiler washing plant has been added to the Santa Fe shops here. The plant represents an investment of \$50,000 and will enable the local shops to wash the boilers of all locomotives.

SAGERTON—A campaign for \$100,000 road bonds is being pushed here. The election will be held November 7 and if carried the bonds will be used to build an improve highway from the Stonewall County line to Stamford connecting up the Plains Cut Off Highway. The highway will follow the Stamford and Northwestern Railroad.

DALLAS—West Texas Exhibitors at the Dallas Fair were honored with a banquet at the Baker Hotel given by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Dignitaries present included Col. R. Q. Lee, president of the Organization; Col. C. C. Walsh, A. B. Spencer and Clifford B. Jones, Past Presidents; Porter A. Whaley, Homer D. Wade, Assistant Manager president.

MEMPHIS—The Memphis City Council has been petitioned to call a bond election for the purpose of voting city paving bonds. Thirty five to forty blocks of residential street paving is contemplated in the petition.

BURNET—The first car load of 19 25 pecans to move from Burnet county was shipped from Marble Falls and another car is now being loaded. The nuts found a ready market at a good price.

HAPPY—Material is on the ground and work will begin at once on a high line to serve this city. The line is being built by the Texas Utilities Co. and will be built to this point from Canyon. Another line from Canyon to Hereford will be built as soon as the Happy line is completed.

LITTLEFIELD—T. F. Moffat of Stephens County has closed a contract with the Yellowhouse Land Co. by which he leases a tract of land seven miles from this city for use as a stone quarry. An upheaval in geological times placed here an immense quantity of limestone and Moffat will install a big stone crushing plant which will turn out stone for use on panhandle highways. The plant is located on the Santa Fe Railroad.

VERNON—The Vernon Semi-Weekly Record will be transformed into a daily newspaper November 1 with full leased wire Associated Press reports. R. H. Nichols owner, was formerly editor of the Amarillo daily newspaper.

Business Men Buy Land Here

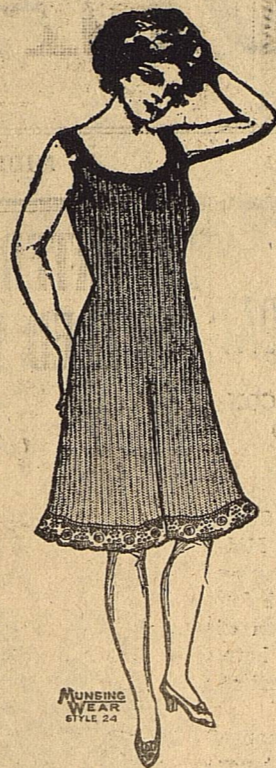

WHITMIRE'S COTTON WINS AT STATE FAIR

INDIVIDUAL EXHIBITS FROM MIDLAND WIN PREMIUMS DOWN AT DALLAS

That Midland is a cotton growing country and M. W. Whitmire is a real cotton grower has been demonstrated. First prize on long staple cotton, second prize on short staple cotton, and fourth on open bolls of cotton were awarded to Midland, and all of these prize winners were entered by M. W. Whitmire.

In addition to that, Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Gwyn entered the peaches that won first prize, they having won second prize last year.

Another first prize went to W. T. Holcombe, on quinces, and it is said that there were a large number of entries.

In the women's department, Mrs. M. W. Whitmire won first prize on hooked rug, and won third prize on crochet rug.

Mrs. Vickers was called on for a reading last Wednesday night at a banquet given by the Fair Association to the Exhibitors.

Mr. Vickers and Mr. Snider made talks to the Exhibitors and to the Club Boys, and Mr. Snider advocated adding a class for Japanese seeded ribbon cane.

CURTIS VINSON WRITES
The following clipping from last Monday's Dallas News, written by Curtis Vinson, is evidence of the impression created by the exhibits at the Fair from this County:

In the agricultural exhibit of Midland County, on display in the Agricultural Building at the State Fair, is found an interesting demonstration of the transition in activities that has been taking place in such a pronounced manner in West Texas during recent years. Once a country given over almost entirely to the cattle industry, West Texas as well as the Panhandle and South Plains section is now becoming—has in fact, already become—one of the most promising agricultural areas of the state.

Midland county is now in the midst of a marked land colonization movement on the part of farmers. Some of the big ranches of that section have already been cut up into small farms and others are being divided up to make way for the plow and hoe, where once only the thundering feet of Texas Longhorn cattle trod. Many farmers are moving into the

country to take up agricultural pursuits, and with this increase in farming population Midland County's agricultural products are gaining in recognition.

Paul Vickers in Charge.
The Midland County Exhibit brought to the State Fair this year is under charge of Paul T. Vickers, Secretary of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, and Mrs. Vickers. The products for the exhibit were assembled by J. B. Snider, the County Agent. Mrs. Vickers arranged the display. The County's exhibit was financed by the Midland Chamber of Commerce.

The background design of the exhibit makes a bid for more people for the county by stressing the advantages to be found there. The slogan carried on the background reads: "Midland—Mid-land in location, but first land in opportunities."

These words appear in the frames set against the whole background of the exhibit. The name Midland is spelled in letters made of cotton lint, while Mid-land in location is spelled out in letters of darso seed. "First land in opportunities is spelled out in watermelon seed letters. The background of the posters or frames in which these letters appear are made of feterita and darso seed. Fred Brown, Midland "high" school graduate designed the background.

Grain sorghums and "cotton" are feature in the crop exhibit. Grain sorghums shown include milo maize, feterita and kafir corn.

Cotton is increasing rapidly in importance as a Midland County product. Mr. Vickers said. A total of 22,000 acres was planted in cotton this year, 5,000 acres of this being sod land or new land. A total yield of 5,000 bales is expected.

Wins Cotton Prizes
Some of the cotton samples displayed in the Midland County Exhibit are from the farms of M. W. Whitmire, three miles northwest of Midland. Mr. Whitmire took first in long staple and second in short staple cotton stalks in the individual exhibits this year at the Fair.

Considerable increase in farming acreage in the county is expected for the coming season, Mr. Vickers said. New farmers are moving in rapidly and land is considered cheap in price. For the last four years, this year included, some of the newcomers have been enabled through their crops to pay for their land in one year, he said.

The canned fruit display of the exhibit includes peaches, grapes, pears, plums, apricots and apples. The peaches shown are from the farm of S. H. Gwyn, two and a half miles northwest of Midland. Mr. Gwyn took first place on peaches in the farm and mill exhibit this year at the fair.

The vegetable display shows bell peppers, tomatoes, turnips, radishes,

kershaw, watermelon, winter squash, string beans, okra and beans. Forage crops exhibited include sudan grass, darso, bird proof maize, red top sorghum, Japanese seeded ribbon cane and black amber sorghum.

Other crops include sweet potatoes, alfalfa, peanuts, Japanese millet, broom corn, Indian corn and popcorn.

Bought Land Here

J. R. Tisdale, of Loraine, was here the first of this week, and bought 160 acres of land from A. C. Francis, located about six or seven miles southeast of Midland. He will move here with his family as soon as he completes picking his crop at Loraine, and intends to improve the new farm.
