# City Is Thronged For Opening

# Increased Production Noted for Permian Basin Oil Area

23,000 Barrels Over Preceding Week Registered

Average daily production in 14 West Texas fields for week ending July 2 was 379, 000 barrels, from 2,256 producing wells, or an approximate increase of 23,000 barrels over the preceding week.

An increase in crude production of 51,373 barrels was registered week ending June 29 over the preceding week over the Permian Basin of

Seventy locations, 34 rigs in process of construction, 143 wells drilling, 99 shut-down wells and 17 completions were listed for a total of

These figures showed increase of 13 locations, 16 rigs and eight completions, and a decrease of seven drilling wells, for a total of 37.

Of the 17 completions, 15 wells were producers, two dry and abandoned. Production from these was 51,883 barrels.

### DREAM FABRIC OF CONCRETE

The consummation of an idea that, to many business men of the Southwest, was of dream tissue stands today in literal brick and steel and concrete. Twelve stories in height, it stands as vindication of a statement made here months ago, a statement that announced to the state and nation that, facing the virgin prairies, a structure, stupendous to even the most imaginative, would be built, and which would centralize about it the bustle of oil production in the West Texas Permian Basin.

It was T. S. Hogan, Midland financier, oil capitalist and former statesman, who stood on a West Texas prairie looking over what to the casual eye suggested a bare wilderness and said to his son that the greatest potential producing area in the world was beneath their feet. He said to himself, "I will lay the foundation for centralization of this industry in a town yet to be decided."

Mr. Hogan selected Midland for this oil capital. He did not stop with this. Investment of millions in the potential production areas followed and fast turnover of thousands of acres. Among the first was a \$2,500,-000 purchase of the John T. McElroy ranch. Leading geologists scoffed at him. One famous strip, 400 feet wide, has already produced more than 3,000,000 barrels of oil in this area.

That Midland is rapidly becoming the oil metropolis of this area is traceable to an inestimable degree to this decision.

Two days are set apart for the opening of the great office building he has built. Visitors from as far as Baltimore and New York are here.

All are honoring T. S. Hogan, the man who dreamed of an empire in West Texas and an imperial capital for that rich territory.

After the execution their bodies were hung on telegraph poles near Atotonilco, the town they raided.







# Stiff Requirements Made in Quest of 'Fool-Proof' Plane

GUGGENHEIM FOUNDATION WILL SPEND OVER \$150,000.00 TO SHOW THE PUBLIC FLYING IS AS SAFE AS MOTORING

NEW YORK, July 3.—(NEA)-Ocean flights, speed trials, altitude hops and endurance attempts once may have been considered tests for airplanes. But not now, and if you doubt it, ask any of the pilots in the Safe Aircraft Competition, that's being held at Roosevelt Field on Long Island.

The spectacular stunts that have made many a plane world famous are as simple as flying a kite in a summer breeze-compared to the requirements for a perfect score in this contest, sponsored by the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics.

Most remarkable, perhaps, is the complete lack of anything spectacular about the tests. There are no loops, spins, wing-overs or any other stunts concerned. In fact, the idea of the whole thing is to discover what most closely approximates a "fool-proof" airplane—one which may be safely used by the average man for much the same purpose that the average man now uses his

Would Prove Safety

Said Harry F. Guggenheim, president of the fund: "The success of commercial aviation will be assured on the day that the public can be convinced, not by statistics but by actual demonstration, that airplanes are inherently no more dangerous than steamships or railways.





#### SANDWICH STOLEN BY DOG SOLVES MURDER AND PUTS TEXAN IN SHADOW OF THE CHAIR

TEXARKANA, July 3, 1929.-Of the 250 persons who had ar- When a hungry dog pilfered a sandplaced Ocie Nix, 22-year-old Bowie county farmer, in the shadow of the electric chair.

Nix has confessed to poisoning Mrs. Vinitia Nix, his wife and the mother of their five-month-old child and will soon face trial on an indictment charging murder.

An investigation that followed discovery of the dog's contorted body after Mrs. Nix's sudden death led to the confession. The dog had pilfered a poisoned sandwich that had been intended for Mrs. Nix.

"Family troubles," says Nix, led Katherine Rawlings, Ft. Worth to the poisoning, but R. G. Waters, district attorney, who promises to have Nix condemned to the death chair, claims it was a desire to collect \$1,400 insurance money.

In his confession, Nix relates how W. E. Connell and wife, Ft. he first thought of poisoning his wife and how he carried out his plans.

"Mrs. Gladys Varner, one of my neighbors, was using poison to kill A. S. Hardwicke, Magnolia Pe- rats," he said. "She told me a very small quantity would kill a person. Edwin Frazier, Robt. Garrett & I decided that was the method to get rid of Vinitia.
