Five Burned In Train Crash

Experts Believe West Coast Flyers Will Be Forced Down

ENGINE IS GETTING NOISY

Flyers Believe They Can Reach 300-Hour Mark

CULVER CITY, July 11.—(AP)—The 219-hour mark of the biplane Angeleno, endurance ship which has broken the flight record for heavier-than-air craft, has been reached.

After 216 hours in the air, L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhardt dropped a note this morning indicating that the motor of their endurance plane might be beginning to show signs of weakness.

"We think the motor a trifle noisy. There was some trouble with the oil pump last night," the note said. The plane refueled at 7 this morning.

MOTOR GETS "NOISY" CULVER CITY, July 11.—(UP)—The staunch motor of the biplane Angeleno gave warning of trouble today for the first time since it started pounding out a world's endurance record July 2.

Polits Pete Reinhardt and Loren Mendell passed the 216-hour mark this morning, but dropped a note with their flashed remark that the motor was beginning to drum noisily, saying they would be able to make 300 hours, they believed.

Motor experts believe the ship had about reached the end of its sustained flight. It was going strong at noon today.

An ambulance was brought to the field today for taking the flyers to a hospital for worst and physical examination after the flight.

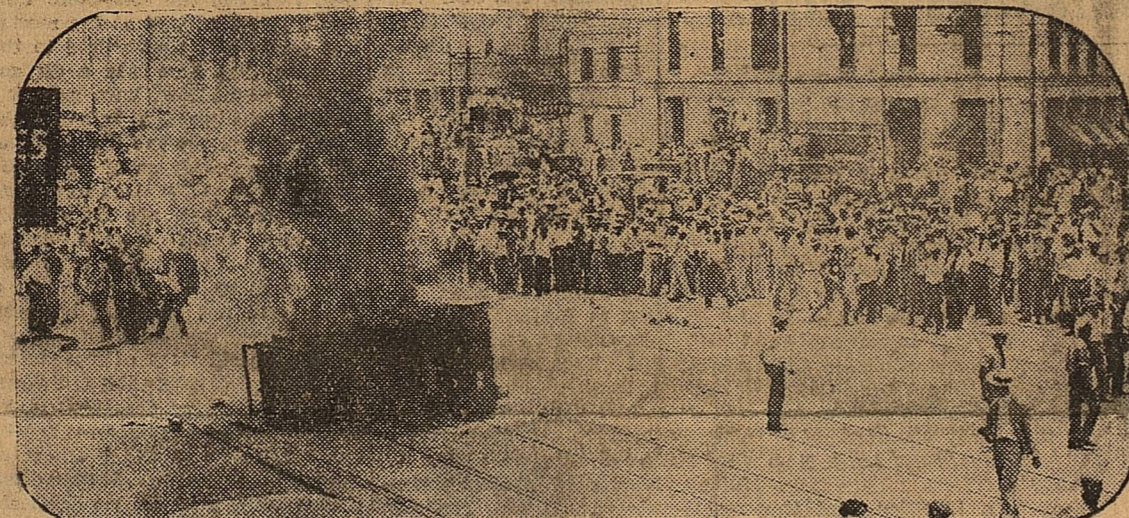

Sensational Man Hunt Goes On In Country to South

MEXICO CITY, July 11.—(AP)—The most sensational man-hunt in years is being conducted throughout Mexico, with troops, police and the public in general seeking to recapture Luis Romero Carrasco who a month ago, according to a confession he is alleged to have made, killed his uncle and aunt, their servant and the servant's baby.

Romero Carrasco was arrested soon after the bodies of the victims were discovered, their heads pounded in with an iron bar. But in being held for trial he escaped from jail.

The escape led to a wholesale shake-up in the jail personnel, on the theory that the criminal "bought his way out." Several jailers are under arrest and a new director has been named.

A reward of \$500 has been promised to whoever captures Romero Carrasco and those giving him refuge will be subject to ten years imprisonment.

MIDLAND RANGES IN GOOD SHAPE REPORT SHOWS

Cooler weather has been recorded during week ending July 10 over this district of the weather bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Light to heavy showers occurred over southeastern Texas, the Panhandle and the south plains territory.

The range was drying over eastern New Mexico and western Texas. Midland range conditions, due to recent rains, continue to lead many other sections of the district. Live stock continue in good condition.

The weather was generally favorable to harvesters in the grain belt. Midland's highest temperature during the week was listed as 94, lowest 53.

13,000 Feet Is Goal Set For High Flight

Thirteen thousand feet above sea level with a 170 horsepower motor and a heavy load is the goal set by Field-Manager H. M. Becherer of Sloan Field for 9 o'clock Sunday morning.

Two passengers will go aloft in the Curtiss-Robin monoplane, which will cruise over the city.

The flight is being made in order that checking of future passenger rates at that altitude may be made.

Becherer has flown the Robin to that height before, and with a heavy load of baggage besides the weight of two passengers.

Other passengers may take the same hop thereafter, Becherer says.

Parachute Jumper Here Jumped from HAD NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH JUST RECENTLY Smoke Balloons in Early Days of Flying

Lieutenant Percy Miller, holder of the unofficial parachute record both for altitude fall and for number of times "over the side," is in Midland today.

Miller has only one leg, yet is known for his dare-devil feats with planes. He has done everything known to the annals of flying except the outside loop which "only a ship with steel wings can possibly stand," as the "silk jumper" puts it.

Miller was in France in the days when ships flew close to each other and discharged a revolver into each others' faces by way of greeting—the days before the Vickers and Lewis guns were rigged up. He lost a leg while in the khaki.

It was in 1923 that Miller made the leap that focused the attention of the country upon him. From a height of 8,000 feet, he went overboard. For 5,000 feet he tumbled before pulling the ring of his chute. The shock of being brought up from this plummet-like fall made him unconscious. Another parachute jumper falling behind him came within 800 feet of reach-

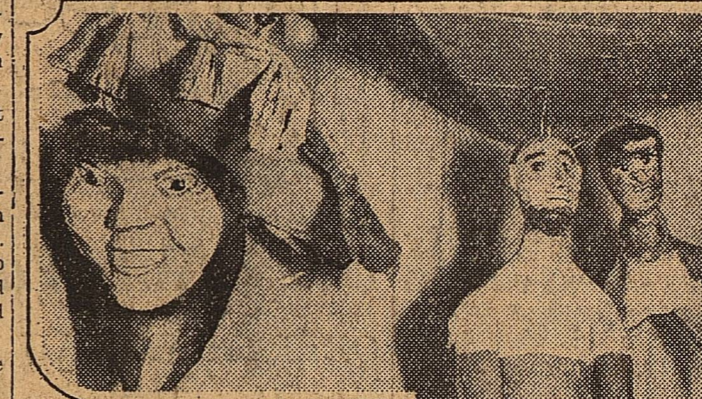
One of the men in the car leaped quickly out and cranked the motor, however, and the car was gone before the license number could be read.

There is no extradition treaty with China, so the only possible prosecution lies with the United States Justice Department.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 11.—(AP)—The suspension of five actors from the Actor's Equity Association and the reinstatement of two others was announced by Frank Gillmore, president, today. While no statement was made as to the cause of suspensions, it was understood that they resulted from making contracts with talking motion picture producers without the sanction of the organization.

Boy Scout Rally To Be At Baptist Church Playground

STATE FAIR TO HAVE 3 LARGER BUILDINGS

DALLAS, Texas, July 11.—One new building and two with larger space will be ready in time for the opening of the State Fair, Oct. 12th, it has been announced by T. E. Jackson, president of the state exposition. A new Livestock Coliseum with an arena 100 by 168 feet and a seating capacity of 6,000 is now under construction.

Work has also started on the balcony in the Agriculture Building. The balcony will add one-third more space to this building. Greater floor space will be arranged for the Poultry Show.

SIXTH MAY SUCCUMB TODAY

Express Ploughed Into Rear of Freight Train

CORIN, N. Y., July 11.—(AP)—Five persons burned to death and a sixth may die as a result of fire which broke out after the east bound Cleveland-New York express on the Erie railroad struck a freight train near here today.

The passenger train locomotive ploughed into a tank car, the contents of which broke into flames and which spread rapidly to a baggage car, two mail cars and a passenger coach which had been derailed by the crash.

HOOVER ASKS FOR PROTECTION IN TARIFF PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, July 11.—President Hoover today advised the Senate Republican leaders to apply the yardstick of "adequate protection" to the pending tariff bill. Senators Watson and Reed discussed the measure with the president but would not commit themselves as to the effect it might have.

LEAHY MUST GO TO CHAIR FOR MATHIS DEATH

HUNTSVILLE, July 11.—Harry J. Leahy, sentenced to the electric chair in the murder of Dr. J. A. Ramsey Mathis in 1926, will go to his death tomorrow unless Governor Moody intervenes. There appears to be nothing to hold up the electrocution.

POLICE RAID BIG BEER JOINTS IN DALLAS TODAY

DALLAS, July 11.—(UP)—Police squads Wednesday night closed down five beer "joints" broke up 1900 bottles of beer and arrested nine men and women. Police believe they have broken the backbone of the beer "racket" in Dallas. The offenders were fined two hundred dollars.

POPPING BOTTLES LEAD TO ARRESTS IN WINK

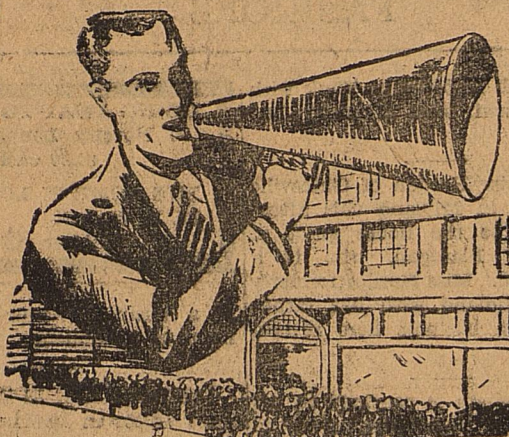
The popping of bottles led to arraignment in Justice Hammah's court in Wink of several men last week.
