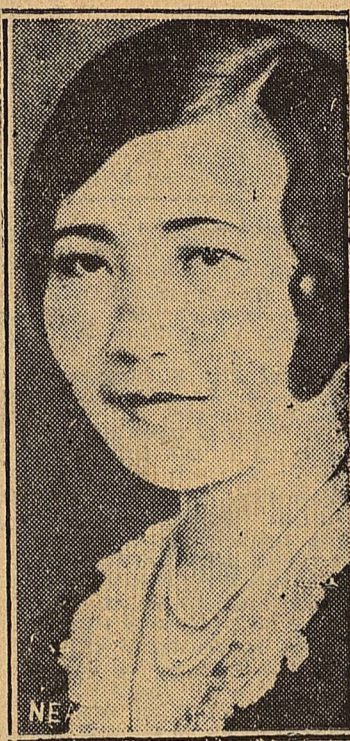

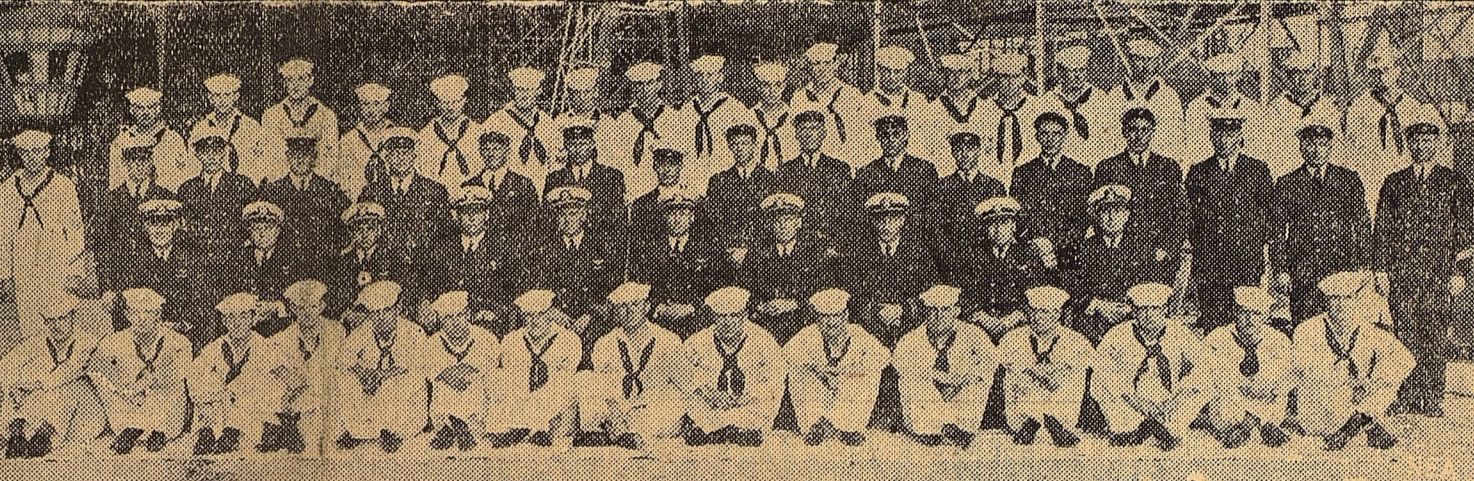

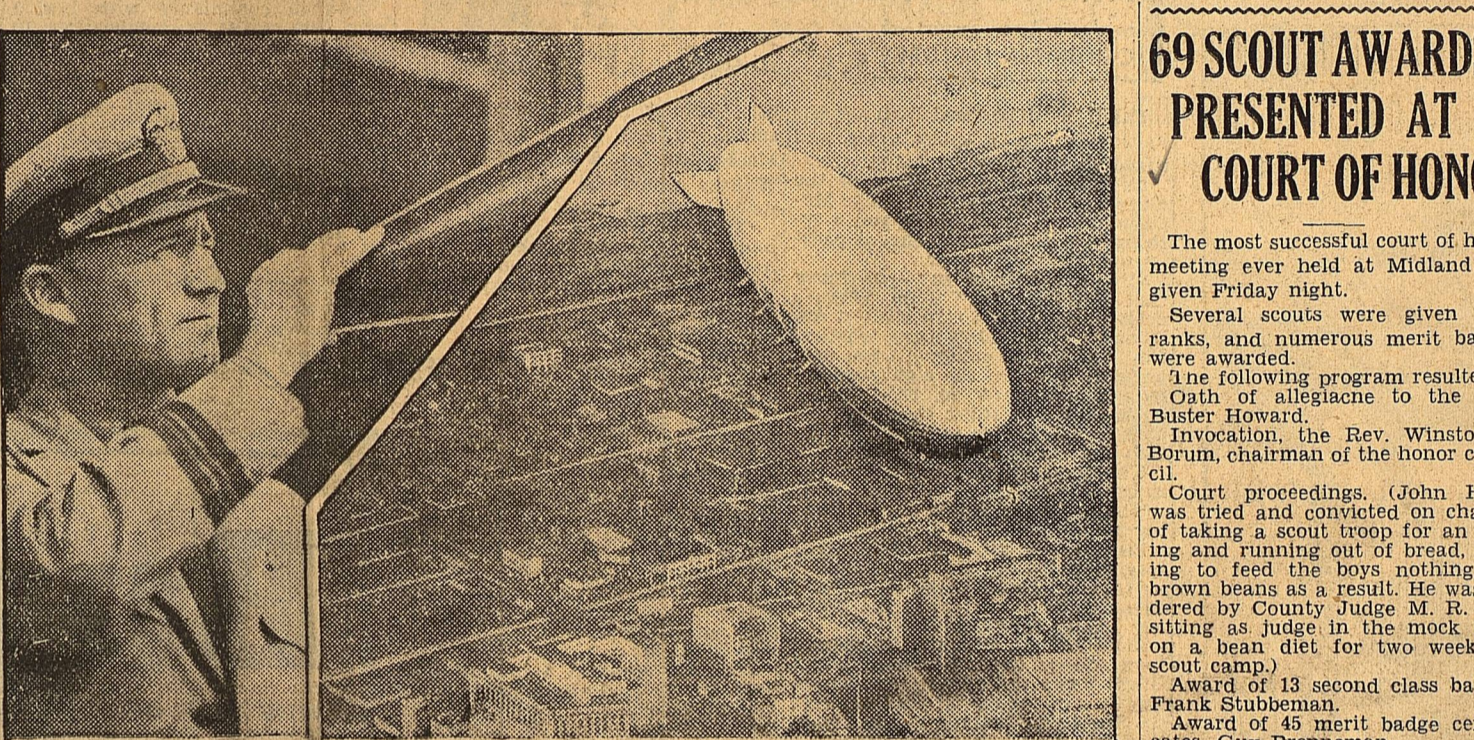

## As U. S. S. Akron Sailed Majestically Over Midland Sunday

## Hundreds View Huge Airship Akron As It Flies Over Midland Sunday

The U. S. S. naval dirigible Akron, flying fast for all her appearance of lazy drifting, passed Midland at an altitude of more than 3,000 feet Sunday afternoon, arriving at Sloan field at 3:40 and rousing the attention of hundreds in Midland a few minutes later.

The ease in which radio operators at Sloan field worked the bag was explained this morning. Sgt. Brock said many short wave transmitters and receivers had been installed in the ship following its mooring on the west coast. When it was through here recently it was broadcasting with a 50 watt transmitter over 945 meters, which offered only about 75 to 100 miles range under ordinary conditions, and practically no certain range under stress of weather.

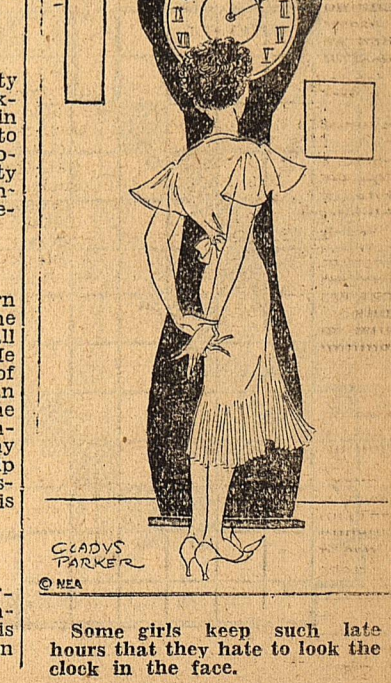
## SWEETS FOR SWEET




