Midland Hope For Federal Building is Given Big Boost

GRAF ZEPPELIN STARTS SECOND MI

COMMERCIAL SERVICE

Carrying mail, express and passengers, the great German airship Graf Zeppelin will leave its hangar at Frederickshafen, Germany, at 5:30 Thursday morning for its second flight to America, according to telegraphic reports received this morning by the Reporter-Telegram from the Associated Press and the United Press.

The flight was held up one day on account of securing permission from the French government to fly over France. It is believed that the stipulation of France that the ship must pass over the frontier between seven and eight o'clock in the mornng would be a handicap to the eppelin.

France is said to be fearful because she believed the airship passed over the ammunition works near Creusot recently for photographic


Man and Dog Are Rough On Rats;

Many More Injured

At Cleveland Today Noon

BULLETIN

(Associated Press) The death toll in the Cleveland Clinic Hospital tragedy late today stood at 85, and the police said this figure would be increased as numbers of the victims from the hospital could not live.

They said the fatalities might The fire has been extinguished and a search is being made of the damaged structure.

CLEVELAND, May 15 .-@—Fire and explosions in the Cleveland Clinic Hospital here today killed from 66 to 91 persons, according to police estimates; and injured scores of others.

According to firemen, the fire started from explosions in the X-ray films storeroom in the basement. Several tanks of oxygen, compressed by heat, let go, adding to the

intensity of the flames. The hospital, a four-story building operated by Dr. George Crile, was filled with patients of prominent physicians at the time of the

Forty-five persons are known to have lost their lives, police said; some having died in hospitals where they had been rushed after being

carried from the clinic. Many are said to have been affected by the deadly bromide gasses from the films, which burn out the sensitive tissues of the mouth, nose and lungs, causing the victims to bleed profusely.



Chicago, May 15.—Everybody is familiar with the detective story sleuth who solves murders by twiddling microscopes and picking up specks of dust with tweezers.

In real life (such detectives aren't so common. The average police force would shoot a sleuth of that nature



Links Gun and Bullet Major Goddard can't do that. But ne can take a revolver and say, beyond the possibility of a doubt. there is the gun with which the nan was killed.

"No two guns are exactly alike," he says. "Any gun inevitably leaves tell-tale marks on a bullet."

Major Goddard is known as the foremost ballistic expert in America. His method of operation, briefy, is this: every gun makes characteristic scratches on its bulletsmarks that no other gun can duplicate. All bullets fired from the same gun have identical marks. Given the gun of a suspect and the bullet found in the body of a murdered man, a test bullet is fired. If its markings coincide with the markings of the bullet from the dead man's body, then it is indisputable that the gun was used by the mur-

A pleasant, mild mannered man. a graduate of Johns Hopkins University and the U.S. Army Medical School, Major Gooddard has a private arsenal containing more than 1000 different weapons. He is familiar with practically every make and

All Guns Leave Tell-Tell Mark, Says Expert

rifle is reamed, or rifled, to give the bullet a revolving motion and keep it on a straight course. A bullet always bears scratches made by the rifling. And no two guns scratch a bullet the same way-ever.

Suppose, however, that the bullet that killed the victim cannot be found, but that the empty metal shell case is found. Major Goddard can solve the puzzle just as easily.

When the charge of powder in the shell explodes, the base of the shell case is knocked hard against the breech plate which contains the firing pin. The breech plate bears tiny marks made by the filing of the gunmaker who smoothed it. The soft copper or brass of the shell case shows all of these marks in detailand they are never the same on two

In addition, the firing pin leaves its mark on the shell-and there too, the microscope reveals this pat-

No .Two Guns Alike

"There is no more chance of two guns leaving identical marks on builets or shells than there is of two persons having an identical set c fingerprints," says Major Goddard. 'Of course, the test shot must b fired while the weapon is in th same condition as at the time of the fatal shot. Corrosion and rust de change a gun's markings.
