



Plane to Hop Atlantic Proves Its Speed First

The way a thing looks to you depends largely on the angle from which you look at it.

For instance: the Welfare Council of New York City, report just issued, points out that the number of job-"down-and-outers" given free shelter by the munici-I lodging house has been rising steadily during the last Tew years of our "prosperity," and is now higher than at any time since the hard winter of 1915-16.

In 1920, for example, the average daily registration at the lodging house was 69. In 1921 it rose to 251, by 1927 It had gone up to 375, last year it stood at 434 and during the first three months of this year it has been 672. All of which suggests that this present era of mass production, stock exchange flurries and high profits may look somewhat different if viewed from the angle of New

York's free lodging house. The report does not try to fix a reason for the great increase in the number of applicants for free lodgings. It points out that there are a good many possible explanations. The number of cheap commercial lodging houses may have decreased, the increase in automobiles may have made it easier for job seekers to come to New York and social agencies may send more applicants to the insti-

tution than formerly. ### ARMY'S BIG AERIAL SHAM BATTLE OVER OHIO TO SHOW WHAT NEXT WAR WILL BE LIKE

By RODNEY DUTCHER, NEA Service Writer.

WASHINGTON, May 18. - The United States army's conception of what the next war will be like is to be demonstrated by a huge aerial sham battle this month over Ohio and contiguous states.

Working in conjunction with ground troops, about 200 army fighting planes will go through the most advanced maneuvers of the kind ever undertaken. If the results are successful the air corps will have gone a long way toward establishing itself as an independent fighting arm and it will be shown that great fleets of planes can be commanded entirely from the air by radio instead of being forced to function individually or under ground direction.

The maneuvers is running from May 15 to May 26 and plans provide a theoretical state of war between two theoretical states, Blue and Red. Blue will be to the west and Red to the east of a north-south line beginning two miles west of Toledo and running through Bowling Green, Findlay, Kenton, London Washington Court House, Hillsboro and Manchester, O.

Mass at Dayton and Columbus Blue air forces will concentrate at Wright Field, Dayton, and Red air forces at Norton Field, Columbus. The Blues will advance against the Red positions covering Columbus and attack the main Red position along the Big Darby creek to the west. The Reds will retire and be chased and reattacked. The Fifth Corps Area staff, other regular officers, high officers of the Indiana Kentucky, and Ohio national guards and reserve officers from those three states and Kentucky will provide the Red and Blue staff personnel. The ground troops will be infantry units from Fort Thomas, Fort Hayes and Fort Benjamin Harrison.

The main show really began the night of May 14, when army planes from over the country, with a personnel of about 280 officers and 225 mechanics and enlisted men, concentrated at Norton and Wilbur Wright Fields. There will be two distinct phases of the maneuvers, May 15 to 21 and May 21 to 26.




### HORNED FROG MAN TO SPRING IN CHI NATL, MEET
