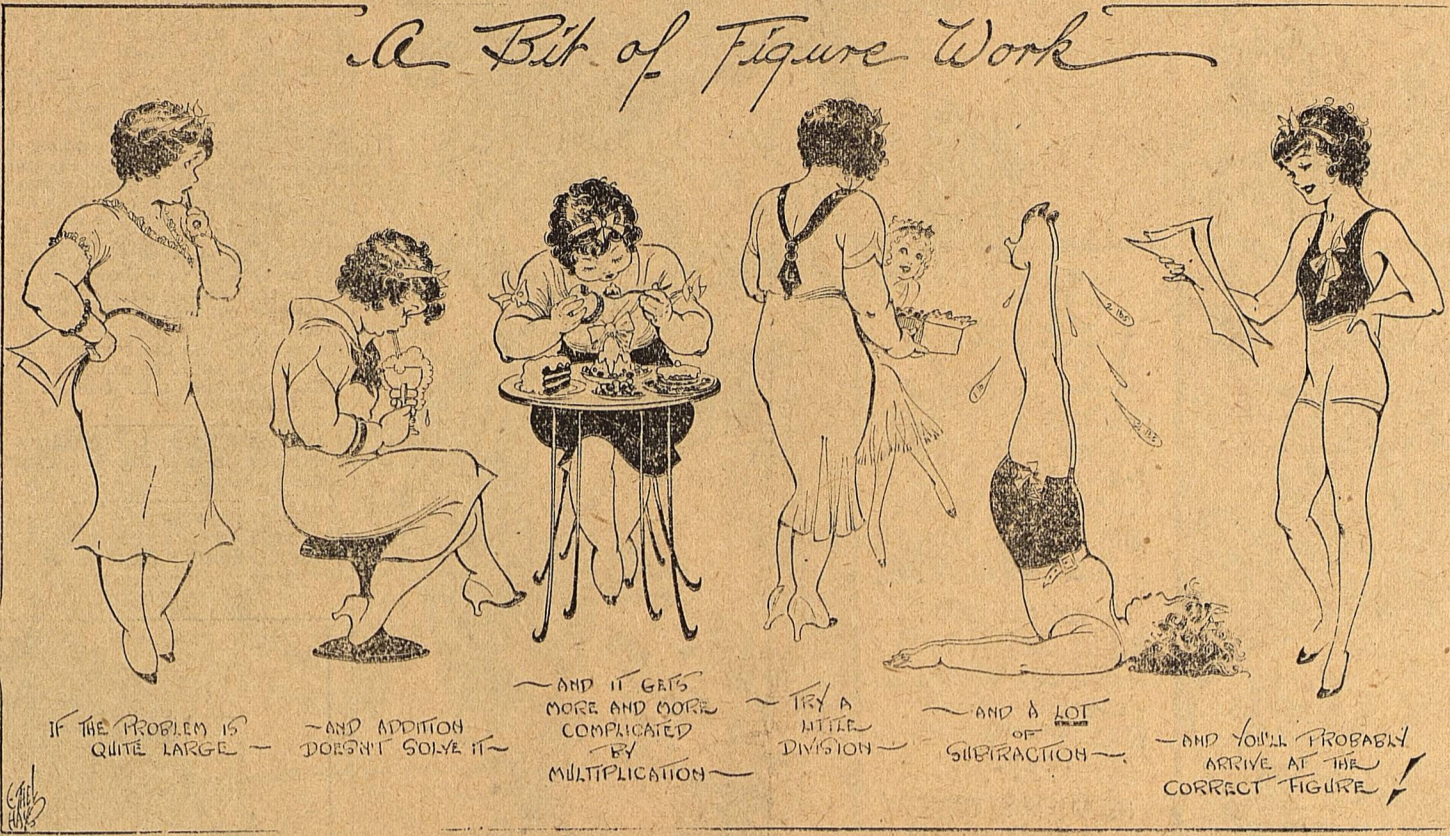

Insects Cause Much Damage

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo. (UP).—A tiny insect pest, as destructive as fire, is costing building owners here thousands of dollars.

Termites, ant-like insects that reduce wood to pulp and cause buildings to crumble, have infested one-third of the business and public structures here, according to lumber dealers, who are waging a campaign to eradicate the pest.

The insects' bore their way through concrete foundations and eat away the timbers of buildings. They can be discovered only by careful examination and usually after great damage has been done. Not infrequently the first intimation of their presence is seen in the collapse of a building after the foundation timbers have been destroyed.

The termite lives and breeds underground, and requires both moisture and darkness to thrive. It feeds on the cellulose found in wood. With a well organized community life similar to the ants, its reproduction is enormous, one queen termite laying from 10,000 to 50,000 eggs a week.

The federal government has estimated the damage caused by termites at more than \$50,000,000 a year. No entirely successful means of exterminating the insects is known.

"Miracle Babies" Declared Healthy

CHICAGO. (UP).—"Miracle babies" of 32 years ago, William F. Fyle and his twin sister, Mrs. Mildred Hulls, today are sturdy and strong.

At birth William weighed a pound and a half, his sister outweighing him by a full pound. Now he weighs 190 and she 122 pounds. As a baby, Fyle was given 24 hours to live.

"There weren't any of these new-fangled doodads called incubators to raise us in, so they simply carried around on pillows for months and fed us like other children," said Mrs. Hulls. "Somehow we survived, and here we are. We weighed eight pounds each when we were a year old, which wasn't to be sneezed at. By the time we were two or three we were as husky as any other children."

Mrs. Hulls had an eight-pound son of her own.



Small Colony Goes to Land

WALL HILL, Miss. (U.P.)—On a 35-acre tract plot of land near here, a little group is putting into practice the "back to the land" theory of unemployment relief and also acting as an experiment in the single-tax theory.

The plan was originated by Abe Waldauer, Memphis, attorney, who gained the support of Col. Kenon Taylor, donor of the land.

The colony started with seven persons of two families, and several other families have joined them.

For the use of the land, Waldauer explained, the colonists will pay the economic rent, about six per cent of the value of the land. Out of this all taxes will be paid.

"I'm not putting these people on a dole; I'm giving them the right to apply their labor to land," Waldauer explained. "We plan to incorporate the colony, and the corporation will hold the title to the land."


"We are going to raise about five or six acres of cotton as our cash crop. There will be a two-acre truck plot. Enough produce will be packed to supply the colony."

An expansion of the plan is contemplated for the future, but no land is available now. Waldauer has applications of five more families who want to return to the farm.





It had been shut in after running 2-inch tubing at 4,146 feet. Pay was topped at 4,065 feet and drilling stopped at 4,175.

GAUGE HOBBS WELL

Midwest Refining Co.'s No. 8 O. Terry, latest producer in the Hobbs field in Lea county, New Mexico, flowed at the rate of 821 barrels on a test late last week.

The well is 1,980 feet from the south line and 660 feet from the west line of section 10-19S-38E, a quarter mile south of Midwest No. 29, State, a new producer.

PECOS TO FIX TAX VALUES

Oil companies and other owners of leases and royalties in the Yates field in Pecos county will seek substantial reductions in tax valuations when the Pecos county commissioners court meets as a board of equalization next Monday, according to a report from Fort Stockton.

Valuations in Yates were reduced about \$4,000,000 last year but still approximated \$20,000,000. More than one-half this amount was assessed against the Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Co. Wildcat leases last year were assessed at 50c an acre.

BIG LAKE WELL CEMENTS

Big Lake No. 6-C University, tenth of the deep producers in the making, was milling on pipe at 7,976 feet. Drill pipe stuck when a bailer was cemented.

Texon No. 4-B University, initially the second largest of the deep wells, was unable to get the mill by the two-inch pipe and was coming out to change to a concave mill.

MANN & CURRIE PAST 3,000

B. C. Mann and Steve Currie's No. 1 fee in Glasscock county had drilled Wednesday morning to 3,010 feet in time without showing other than small amounts of gas at 2,870 and 2,880.

Contract depth was 3,000 feet but drilling will continue until production of sulphur water is encountered. The test is in section 27, block 24, township 3 south, T. & P. Ry. Co. survey.

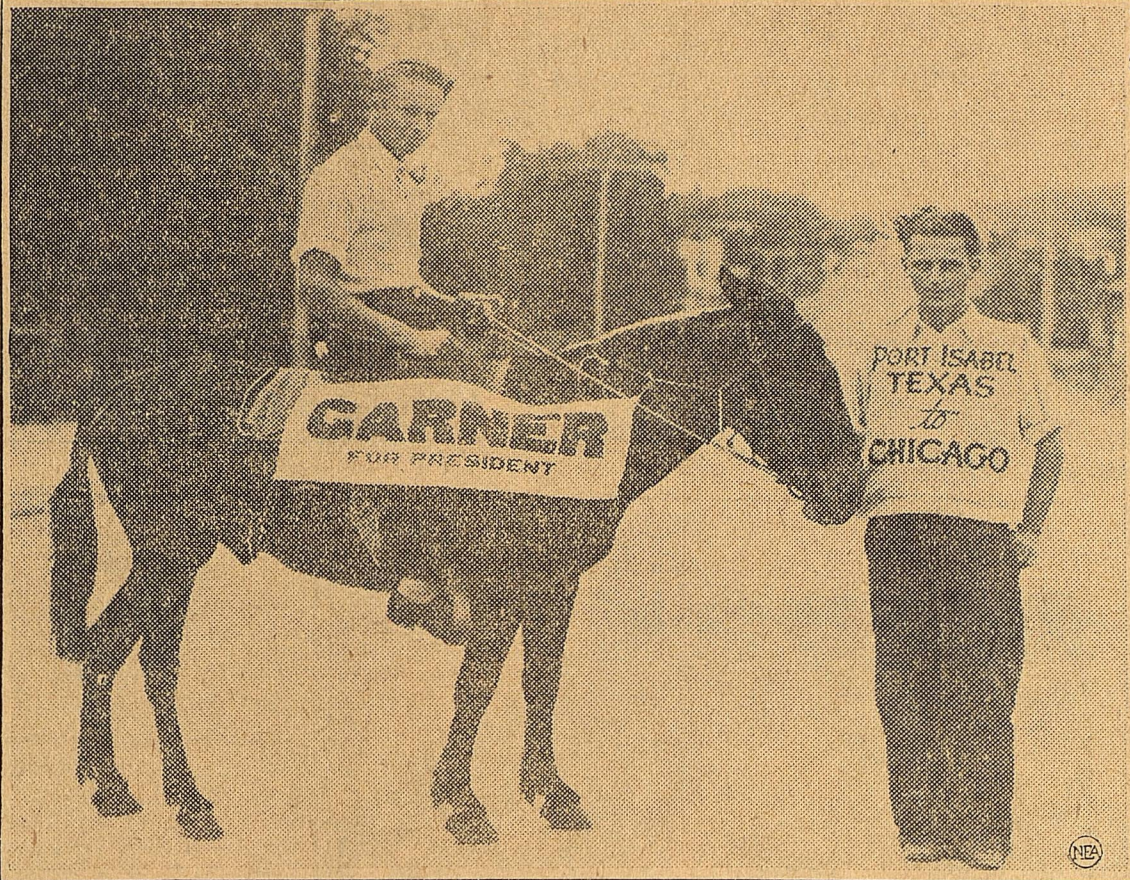

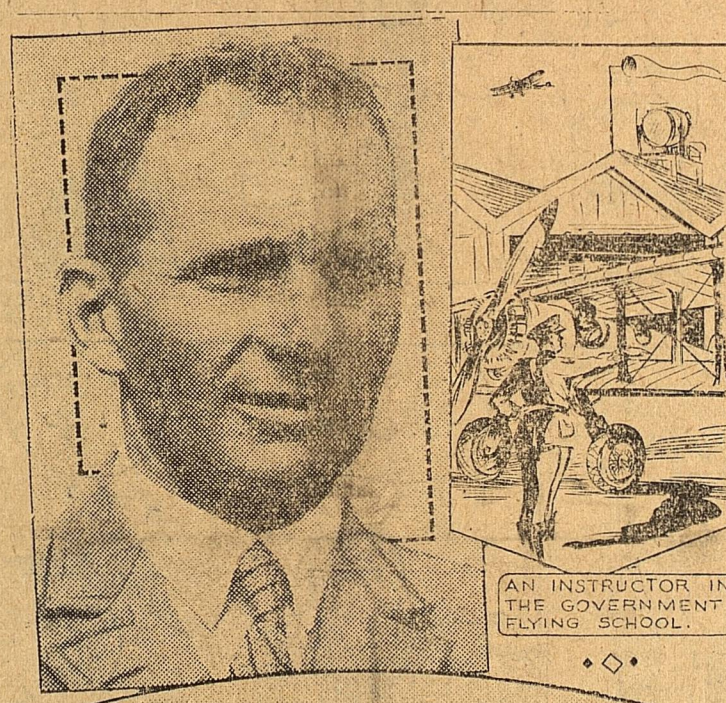
Garner Boosters Bound For Chicago

By DEXTER TED The flight of Capt. Wolfgang von Gronau and his crew from Germany to America illustrates, typically, how an internationally-famous aviator can be completely forgotten in a short time.

There was that August day in 1930 when von Gronau and his five-year-old seaplane circled the financial section in downtown Manhattan. Boat whistles shrieked greetings, the usual welcoming crowd was at the Battery, and when the plane dropped safely into the bay newspapers came out with their usual extras.

That had not been an epochal flight, but it was an achievement. It had taken them from the island, List on Syll, off the German coast, in leisurely hops to the Faroe Islands, Iceland, Greenland, Halifax and on to New York. They started with little ballyhoo, on a mystery flight, and they reached their objectives, across the Atlantic.

The old seaplane had been used by Amundsen on a polar expedition. It was a Dornier-Wal flying boat, something of an antique. The courage of Capt. von Gronau in piloting such an old boat helped to explain the acclaim which he received.

The captain was welcomed at City Hall by Mayor Walker, he wrote stories for newspapers, then went on to Washington to be greeted by President Hoover. He was truly an international hero.

And back home in Germany Frau von Gronau, irked by constant ringing of her telephone, declared: "The fame is too much. Out the phone must go!" Little did she realize how fleeting would be the attention lavished upon her and her husband.

But now he is back where he started, an instructor in the government flying school. He shows German youth how it is done. He is an expert, and almost any day you could find him out on the field, warming up a plane, adjusting instruments and pointing out this and that to the young flyers around him.
